POETRY

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Ezra Pound's *The Pisan Cantos* were written in 1945, while the poet was being held in an American military detention center near Pisa, Italy, as a result of his pro-Fascist wartime broadcasts to America on Radio Rome. Imprisoned for some weeks in a wire cage open to the elements, Pound suffered a nervous collapse from the physical and emotional strain. Out of the agony of his own inferno came the eleven cantos that became the sixth book of his modernist epic, *The Cantos*, itself conceived as a *Divine Comedy* for our time.

The Pisan Cantos were published in 1948 by New Directions and in the following year won the Bollingen Prize for poetry, awarded by the Library of Congress. The honor came amid violent controversy, for the dark cloud of treason still hung over Pound, now incarcerated in Washington's St. Elizabeths Federal Hospital for the Insane. Yet there is no doubt that The Pisan Cantos display some of the finest and most affecting writing in his long poem, marking an elegaic turn to the personal while synthesizing the philosophical, economic, and political themes of his previous cantos. They are now available for the first time as a separate paperbook, in this fully annotated edition prepared by Richard Sieburth, who also contributes a thoroughgoing introduction, making Pound's masterwork fully accessible at last to students and general readers.

Richard Sieburth, a prize-winning translator and authority on literary modernism, is a professor of comparative literature at New York University. He is the author of Instigations: Ezra Pound and Remy de Gourmont (Harvard, 1978) and also edited A Walking Tour in Southern France: Ezra Pound Among the Troubadours (New Directions, 1992). His translations include works by Hölderlin, Benjamin, Scholem, Scève, Nerval, Leiris, and Michaux.

NOTES

The first two systematic glosses of The Pisan Cantos were provided by John Hamilton Edwards' and William W. Vasse's Annotated Index to the Cantos of Ezra Pound (Berkeley: U. of Cal. Press, 1957) and by Achilles Fang's four-volume Harvard doctoral dissertation of 1958, "Materials for the Study of Pound's Cantos." The '60s and '70s saw further exegetical work, much of which was published in Padeuma: A Journal Devoted to Ezra Pound Scholarship, founded in 1972 and edited by Carroll Terrell. The latter coordinated a team of eminent Pound scholars and synthesized several decades of research in his monumental two-volume Companion to the Cantos of Erra Pound (U. of Cal. Press, 1980-84)-to which the reader is referred for more detailed annotation. While ineluctably (and most gratefully) indebted to Terrell's indispensible labors, the notes to the present edition take into account the additional scholarship devoted to The Pisan Cantos over the past twenty years, while also drawing on further commentaries provided by Peter Brooker, George Kearns, Christine Froula, William Cookson, Anthony Woodward, Mary de Rachewiltz, Massimo Bacigalupo, and Ronald Bush. The Greek in the text has been transliterated and the Chinese romanized (in the old Wade-Giles system) to facilitate pronunciation. Canto cross-references are given in bold type by Canto number followed by line number, thus: 78.36. The text of these Cantos is that given in the 13th New Directions printing (1995), corrupt though it may be by purely philological standards. Richard Taylor's forthcoming variorum edition of The Cantos and Ronald Bush's study of the genesis and composition of the Pisans should clear up many questions.

CANTO 74

- 3. Third-century Persian founder of Manicheanism, flayed alive for his heretical teachings by the Zoroastrians. Rejecting all of the Old Testament and parts of the New, Mani (or Manes) claimed Buddha, Zoroaster, Hermes, and Plato as his predecessors and maintained he was the Paraclete promised by Christ.
- 4.6. After Benito Mussolini and his mistress Claretta Petacci were captured and summarily executed by partisans at Dongo, near Lake Como, on April 28, 1945, their bodies were brought to Milan and strung up by the heels in the Piazzale Loreto, thus "twice crucified." As a sacrificial victim, Mussolini (whose unofficial title, Il Duce, is often translated by Pound as "the Boss") evokes the symbolic slaying of Dionysus in the form of a bull (bos in Latin).
- 7. "Twice-born," Greek epithet for Dionysus, born once from his mother, Semele, and then from the thigh of his father, Zeus.
- 9-10. Pound's nickname for T.S. Eliot, whose poem "The Hollow Men" conceives the world as ending "Not with a bang but a whimper."
- 11. Deïoces, the first great ruler of the Medes, built the city of Ecbatana in the sixth century BC; according to Herodotus it was encircled by seven rising concentric walls in a variety of colors. "Dioce" has been heard by some commentators to rhyme with "Duce."

- 12. Canto 74 originally began here, before Pound changed its opening in November, appending the previous 11 lines which were typed on a separate sheet and perhaps at first withheld on account of their explicitly pro-Mussolinian tenor.
- 14. I.e. the Confucian Way or Truth (tao4).
- 14-18. Citations from the Confucian Classics, The Unwobbling Pivot I, 1, and Mencius III, 4, xiii, later translated by Pound: "After Confucius's death, when there was talk of regrouping, Tsang declined, saying: 'Washed in the Keang and Han, bleached in the autumn sun's-slope, what whiteness can one add to that whiteness, what candour?"
- 19. Formed from the Latin periplus, a circumnavigation; defined in Canto 59 as "periplum, not as the land looks on a map/but as sea bord by men sailing." Here, the circuit of Helios, the sun.
- 20-21. The cliffs along the Strait of Gibraltar, traditionally known as the Pillars of Hercules, through which Dante's Ulysses passes before drowning near Mount Purgatory, where Lucifer fell to earth. Cf. Inf. XXVI and XXXIV. More or less due west of Gibraltar, North Carolina was the site of a (Luciferian?) meteor shower in 1944.
- 22. In Italian, a hot Mediterranean wind out of the southeast.
- 23. "OU TIS," Greek for "No Man" or "Nobody," the name Odysseus adopts to trick the Cyclops in Book IX of the Odyssey.
- 26. "Sister moon," i.e. Artemis/Diana?, "cf. St. Francis of Assisi's "Cantico del Sole."
- 28-31. Sigismundo Malatesta (1417-68), soldier and patron of the arts, constructed the Tempio Malatestiano in Rimini as a pagan monument to his love for his mistress (and later wife), Isotta degli Atti (?1430-70). The sculptor Agostino di Duccio (1418-81) was commissioned by him to supply its marble ornaments. Further examples of "precise definition": the paintings of Giovanni Bellini (?1430-1516) and the mosaics in the church of Santa Maria in the Trastevere district of Rome evoking "La Sposa" ("the bride") or "Sponsa Cristi" ("the bride of Christ").
- 33-46. Charlie Sung (or T.V. Soong), named premier of Chiang Kai-shek's China in June 1945 (as reported in Time magazine) and presumably bankrolled by anonymous ("anonimo") sources. As chancellor of the exchequer, Winston Churchill returned to the gold standard in 1925, thus depressing the value of the Indian currency to eighteen pence per hundred rupees. The primary tenet of Marxism was that workers should own the means of production, but Pound hoped to convert Stalin (whom he called "the best brain in politics today" in a May 8, 1945 interview) to his own economic views, which focused instead on the ownership of money or "the means of circulation."
- 48. A copy of the Catholic Prayer Book for the Army and Navy /Pro Deo et Patria was given to Pound by Father Aloysius H. Vath, the Roman Catholic chaplain of the DTC.
- 52. The original German title of Erich Maria Remarque's antiwar novel, All Quiet on the
- 55. For the paradisal properties of sapphire, see Dante, Pur. I, 13.
- 56-59. A paraphrase of Mencius IV, ii, 11, with an etymological reading of the characters mentioned in Legge's note.
- 60-61. W.H.D. Rouse (1863-1950), classical scholar and translator of the Odyssey, discovered in his travels through the Aegean that tales similar to those surrounding Odysseus were still being told about Elias (or Elijah), the Hebrew prophet who tells of
- 64-75. In native Australian mythology, the god Wondjina (his name here rhymed with the Chinese "Ouan Jin" [or wen2-jen2], meaning "Man of Letters") brought the world

- into being by saying the names of things; fearing he had thereby created too many objects, his father had his mouth removed. Douglas Fox, a student of the German archaeologist Leo Frobenius (1873-1938) and who was in correspondence with Pound about his research among the Australian aborigines in the '30s, provided the following commentary on the legend: "As one old man explained, if Ungar [the father] had not very wisely done as he did, then the blackfellow would have been burdened with all the glittering claptrap of the white man's culture and would not have been able to devote himself properly to the important things of life: conversation, dancing, hunting and warfare."
- 75-76. "In the beginning was the Word/the Holy Ghost or the perfect Word: sincerity." Cf. John 1.1, included in the Catholic Prayer Book as "The Last Gospel." Cf. also the "Prayers to the Holy Spirit": "We beseech Thee, O Lord, that the Paraclete Who proceedeth from Thee may enlighten our minds and lead us, as Thy son hath promised, into all truth."
- 77-85. T'ai Shan, or Great Mountain, a sacred site in China's Shantung province, here visually rhymed with one of the mountains in the Apuan Alps to the northeast of the DTC-just as Fujiyama, the sacred mountain of Japan, is glimpsed in the Alpine scenery of the northern Italian Lake Garda, site of the villa where the Roman poet Catullus wrote his salutation to the promontory of Sirmio, the movement of whose waters evokes the onomatopoetic epithet "poluphloisboios" (or "loud-roarings") attributed by Homer to the sea.
- 86-91. Gioacchino Nicoletti, prefect of the town of Gardone Riviera, not far from Salò, provisional capital of the puppet Social Republic which Mussolini established in late September 1943 after having been dismissed by King Victor Emmanuel and replaced by Marshal Badoglio, who negotiated an armistice with the Allies. Pound visited Lake Garda in November 1943 in order to make contact with elements of the Salò regime. Translation: "The Woman... the woman!" [perhaps Clara Petacci, who had followed Mussolini to Salòl, "Why must it go on?" "If I fall . . . I shall not fall on my knees," a defiant statement attributed to Bianca Capello (?1547-87), mistress of Francesco de' Medici, Duke of Tuscany.
- 93. The African legend of Gassire's Lute is recorded in Leo Frobenius' African Genesis (1937); cf. 198 below. The legend includes the apostrophe, "Hooh! Fasa!" or "Hail to the tribe of Fasa" (echoing the Italian fascio?).
- 96-97. "Under six gallows. . . Absolve, may you absolve us all." From the "Ballade des Pendus" of François Villon (1431-?65), whose poem Le Testament provides one of the models for The Pisan Cantos.
- 97-100. Barabbas, Christ's companion in captivity, here associated with two of Pound's companions in Paris in the 1920s, the writer Ernest Hemingway (1898-1961) and the composer George Antheil (1900-59), and with his fellow prisoners at the DTC, whose names follow.
- 105. Lesbia plays teasingly with her sparrow in Catullus 2.
- 107-10. "And the sad thought returns/toward Ussel. To Ventadour/goes desire, retrieving time." Pound's medievalizing Italian may echo Pur. VIII, 1-6.
- 109-19. Pound traveled through the troubadour country of southern France in the summers of 1912, 1919, and 1924, visiting, among other places, the towns of Ussel, Ventadour, Limoges, and Excideuil (where Mme Pujol kept an inn). Urochs are represented in the paleolithic cave paintings of Font de Gaumes, near Les Eyzies.

- 129. Marble from the nearby quarry of Carrara was used in the construction of the leaning tower of Pisa.
- 131. Japanese form of Kuan-yin, the Chinese goddess of mercy.
- 132–35. Bishops of Rome in the first century, among the list of Apostles and Martyrs invoked in the Catholic Prayer Book. The design on the back of the priest's chasuble at a mass held at the DTC may have suggested the image of the scarab at the altar.
- 137–38. Ideogram: hsien³, "manifest, display, be illustrious." Contains the radicals for sun and moon and silk and is sometimes translated by Pound as "tensile light descending."
- 138. "Virtue," glossed by Pound in his Confucian translations as "The virtù, i.e. this self-knowledge [looking straight into the heart and acting hence] is the root."
- 139. "Are lights." From the Latin of the medieval Neoplatonic philosopher (and heretic) John Scotus Erigena (?810–?77): "Omnia, quae sunt, lumina sunt." Cf. 155–57 below: "all things that are are lights."
- 140-45. Shun, Yao, Yu, three legendary early rulers of China, often referred to in the Confucian classics as paragons of virtuous statecraft.
- 146. Large guard towers at the four corners of the DTC stockade.
- 150-52. Cf. Isaiah 1:27: "Zion shall be redeemed by justice, and those in her who repent, by righteousness." As opposed, presumably, to the policies of "David rex," i.e. King David ("the prime s.o.b." omitted from the 1949 Faber edition).
- 155. The "Oirishman" is Scotus Erigena and "King Carolus," the Holy Roman Emperor Charles II, grandson of Charlemagne.
- 158-60. The body of Erigena was supposedly ("soi disantly") exhumed as part of a witch hunt against Manichean heretics—although there is no record of this (it was the bones of his disciple, Amaury de Bène, that were dug up and scattered in 1210). "Les Albigeois," or Albigensians, were persecuted and eventually destroyed in a crusade against heresy launched by Simon de Montfort in the 13th century.
- 161-69. Themistocles won the battle of Salamis in ships built by money loaned by the state of Athens and not by private banks—an early example of Social Credit. The Soviet statesman Lenin is quoted ("dixit Lenin") attacking the war-profiteering of the international arms industry.
- 163. "A time to speak, a time to be silent" (Eccl: 3:7), Malatesta's motto, inscribed on Isotta's tomb in the Tempio.

170. Pound observed the Italian Fascist calendar, in which all events were dated from Mussolini's March on Rome in October 1922. 1945 was thus year 23.

- 171–73. Louis Till, an African-American trainee at the DTC executed on July 2, 1945, here mythologically associated with Zeus's ram, whose golden fleece Jason and the Argonauts hunted in the kingdom of Colchis. Till was the father of Emmet Till, whose cold-blooded murder at age fourteen by two white men in Mississippi in 1955 sparked the Civil Rights Movement in the South.
- 176–77. Ideogram: mo⁴, "not, no," echoing the Greek "No man" and visually evoking "a man on whom the sun has gone down."
- 180. In the Noh play, *Hagoromo* (translated by Pound in 1916), the word refers to the "feather-mantle" left hanging by an "aerial spirit" (or *tennin*) on a bough, where it is discovered by a priest; in order to retrieve her magical cloak, the nymph agrees to teach him a dance symbolic of the daily changes of the moon.
- 184. Russian for "comrade" (referring to another trainee or to Pound himself?).
- 190-91. "Either Cythera [i.e. Aphrodite] or Ixotta [cf. 28 above] or in St. Mary of the

- Miracles." This Venetian church contains sculptures of sirens by Pietro Lombardo (1435–1515), much admired by Pound.
- 196. A quote from Mencius IV, 8, iv.
- 198. "Of Italy betrayed" (when Mussolini was replaced as head of the government by Marshal Badoglio in July 1943).
- 197–202. The Soninke legend "Gassire's Lute" recorded by Frobenius (cf. 93 above) tells of the four destructions (by vanity, falsehood, greed, and dissension) and four rebuildings of the mythical four-gated female city of Wagadu, a city "not of stone, not of wood, not of earth," but embodying "the strength which lives in the hearts of men and in the wombs of women." Its eventual fifth reconstruction in the future rhymes with Pound's eschatological dream of "city of Dioce" (cf. 11 above): "Should Wagadu ever be found for the fifth time, then she will live so forcefully that vanity, falsehood, greed and dissension will never be able to harm her."
- 204. Greek goddess of fertility.
- 206. "In counterpoint."
- 208-9. "That softens[Dante, Pur. VIII, 2]/to the left of the Tower [of Pisa]."
- 211. "Who forgets and lets himself fall," from the Provençal of troubadour Bernart de Ventadorn's "Lark Song."
- 212–13. Book XI of the Odyssey recounts Odysseus's descent (or nekuia) into Hades, where he sees the shades of Alcmene and Tyro. In Book XII, he must navigate his way between the whirlpool of Charybdis and the sharp rocks of Scylla.
- 219. I.e. hamadryad, or tree nymph.
- 220. I.e. "vae solı," from Eccl. 4:10 ("woe to him who is alone"), via Pound's translation of Jules Laforgue's "Pierrots: Scène court mais typique."
- 224. "HELION PERI HELION" ("The sun around the sun").
- 226. Epithet of Diana, the moon-goddess; also the name of the Roman goddess of childbirth.
- 230–35. Basil Bunting (1900–85), jailed as conscientious objector in 1918, conducted a hunger strike in prison. His collection of poems, Redimiculum Matellarum ("A Garland of Chamberpots"), was published in 1930.
- 240. Joe Gould (1889–1957), Greenwich Village bohemian, author of the apocryphal Oral History of Our Times. Edward Estlin Cummings (1894–1962), imprisoned by the French army at the end of WWI, as recounted in *The Enormous Room* (1922).
- 245. "It is finished, Go," Latin formula used at the end of mass, derived from Christ's final words on the cross.
- 247-63. Memories of Pound's 1908 stay in Gibraltar: Raisuli (1875-1925), a Moroccan brigand, kidnapped Ion Perdicaris in 1904 and held him for ransom, causing an international incident; Elson, a missionary with whom Pound stayed in Gibraltar.
- 265. "Color of light."
- 267. From Pound's 1911 translation of the Anglo-Saxon poem *The Seafarer*: "Greyhaired he groaneth, knows gone companions,/Lordly men are to earth o'ergiven."
- 269–76. An enumeration of shades: Ford Madox [Hueffer] Ford (1873–1939), English novelist, poet, and editor; William Butler Yeats (1865–1939), Irish poet; James Joyce (1882–1939), Irish novelist; Victor Plarr (1863–1929), British poet; Edgar Jepson (1863–1938), English novelist; Maurice Hewlett (1861–1923), English novelist and poet; Sir Henry Newbolt (1862–1938), English poet.
- 280. Colonel Goleyevsky, White Russian émigré and former tsarist mılıtary attaché, a friend of the Pounds in Paris in the '20s.

286-92. Restaurants remembered: Paris (Bouiller, Closerie des Lilas, Voisin's), London (Dieudonné), St. Petersburg (the cake shops on the Nevsky Prospekt), Vienna (Schöner's), Bolzano (Der Greif), New York (Mouquin's, Robert's).

288. George Holden Tinkham (1870-1956), isolationist congressman from Massachusetts whom Pound met in Venice in 1936. REI PANTA, "all things flow"

296. William Henry Hudson (1841-1922), naturalist and novelist.

297. Misprint for "Où sont les heures" ("Where are the joys,"), a variation on Villon's "Où sont les neiges d'antan" ("Where are the snows of yesteryear").

298. Henry James (1843-1916), the American novelist, and his housekeeper at Rye, England, Mrs. Hawkesby.

301-4. Henry Brooks Adams (1838-1918); the "monument" who relayed the anecdote was the Harvard-educated philosopher and Rome resident, George Santayana (1863-1952).

305. I.e. "Haec sunt fasti" ("Here then are the festivals listed in the calendar").

306. Bastille Day (July 14), 1945.

307-14. Time magazine of June 25, 1945: an obituary for the popular novelist Amélie Rives (1864-1945), whom Pound knew from London and later in Rome during his broadcasting days; a photo resembling the equestrian portrait of Scottish traveler Cunninghame Grahame (1852-1936); the German chemical factory I.G. Farben still intact, to the strains of the signature WWII song, "Lillibullero"—whereas the architecture of the old hotel Adelphi on London's Strand has been destroyed by remodeling (?).

317-20. Henry Hudson Edwards, the G.I. who made a writing table for Pound out of a packing box; his African-American features are associated with the Baluba (i.e. Biembe) masks from the Congo studied by Frobenius.

328. "Nothing else."

331-33. "Ye shall do no unrighteousness in judgment, in meteyard, in weight, or in measure" (Lev. 19:35). "And that ye study to be quiet, and to do your business, and to work with your own hands, as we commanded you" (1Thess. 4:11).

340. "For all people will walk every one in the name of his god" (Micah 4:5)—Pound extracting a tolerant polytheism ("temples/plural") from the Old Testament.

341-45. Terracina, site on Italy's western seacoast associated with the birth of Venus and, Pound dreamt, locus of a future shrine reestablished in her honor. Virgil's Aeneud (1, 404) records that Anchises, father of Aeneas, recognized Aphrodite from her gait when she approached him in human guise.

348. A cluster of stars said to be composed of the seven daughters of Atlas.

352. "Chthonia gea, Mêter" ("nether earth, Mother").

359. "TITHONOI." The goddess Eos transformed Tithonos into a grasshopper (or katydid) so that she might hear her lover's song forever.

361. "In coitus illumination."

362-70. Aphrodite-like Olga Rudge, henna-haired, dressed in the latest fashions of Drecol or Lanvin, like a figure out of Manet's painting of the bar at the Folies Bergère-the painterly tradition of 19th-century France ("la France dixneuvième"), represented by Edouard Manet (1832-83), Edgar Degas (1834-1917), and Constantin Guys (1802-92), continuing on into the Fauviste work of Maurice Vlaminck (1876-1905), according to his friend the French poet and critic writer Fritz Vanderpyl (1876-1950).

372. "It would rest without further tossing" (Inf. XXVII, 63).

373-74. When seized by the partisans at his house at Sant'Ambrogio above Rapallo (overlooking the Tyrrhenian Sea), Pound picked up along the hill path a eucalyptus pip which he kept with him at Pisa as a talismanic mnemonic device.

375-77. Memories of Parisian restaurants leading to memories of his walking tours in southern France (cf. 107ff.).

379-81. "The beautiful Tower" (of Pisa), associated with the so-called Tower of Hunger, also in Pisa, where Ugolino della Gheradesca (?1212-89), accused of treason, was imprisoned with his sons and grandsons. Dante (Inf. XXXII-XXXIII) pictures him starving to death.

382. Presumably to elude the military censor, Pound refers to Hitler and Mussolini only by their initial letters.

384-85. "Frobenius the privy councilor/who created thunder in Baluba." While exploring a remote region of the Congo in 1905, Frobenius' party came under attack; they were saved, however, when an enormous thunderstorm erupted. The local Baluba (i.e. Biembe) tribesmen therefore referred to him in their drum language as the "white rainmaker."

386-87. Jean Cocteau (1891-1963), French poet and playwright; T.S. Eliot (see 9).

388. "Poor and old never did I read a letter" (from Villon's "Ballade Pour Prier Nostre Dame")

390. From Villon's "Paradis peint où sont harpes et luths" ("Painted paradise where are harps and lutes") in "Ballade Pour Prier Nostre Dame."

393. "Great NIGHT of the soul."

395. "Companion[s] of misery," referring to Pound's fellow prisoners, here named.

401. Dukes Mixture, the name of the tobacco ration alloted to the trainees, bags of which served as the unit of exchange in commercial transactions among the prisoners.

403. "And I too in the pigsty," referring to Circe's transformation of Odysseus' crew into swine in Book X of the Odyssey.

405. "I went into the pigsty and saw the corpses of souls"

410. Carrol Crawford, a fellow prisoner, named after the revolutionary leader Charles Carroll of Carrollton (1737-1832), just as many other African-American trainees in the DTC bore the names of early American presidents.

411. "THELGEIN" ("to enchant, betwitch, cheat").

414. "Nor fair-tressed Circe, well!," "kaka phurgak' edôken" ("she had given them evil drugs"—Od. X, 213).

416. Misprint for "veleno" ("poison").

419. The son of a blacksmith, Mussolini was born at Predappio, in Romagna.

419-25. Allen Upward (1863-1926), cultural anthropologist and world traveler, wrote in a 1915 poem, "I withstood the savages of the Niger with a revolver:/I withstood the savages of the Thames with a printing press." The cover of his comparative study of religions, The Divine Mystery (1910), featured the seal of Sitalkas ("Prohibitor of Corn-Growing'); he committed suicide in the end. "Until I end my song"-cf. Eliot's The Waste Land, "Sweet Thames, run softly, till I end my song" (from Spenser's

427. Matteo da Pasti (d. 1448) and Antonio Pisano (?1397-1455) both made intaglio medallions of Sigismundo Malatesta and his circle.

435-44. Snippets from the Confucian Analects

445-46. "And at the crossing of the three roads, Cunizza/and the other woman: 'I am the Moon." Reminiscence of a visionary encounter recorded in the drafts of the Italian Cantos 74-75 composed by Pound in January-February 1945 and later abandoned. In these drafts, standing at the triedro ("trihedron") or symbolic crossing of three paths near Sant'Ambrogio (in turn evocative of "Trivia," the Latin epithet of Diana as goddess of crossroads), Basinio Basini (1425-57), the court poet of Sigismundo Malatesta and persona of Pound, sees the apparition of Cunizza da Romano (1198-1279), lover of the troubadour poet Sordello and, because she freed her brother's slaves, symbol of Kuanon-like compassion. Dante places Cunizza in the Third Heaven of Love (see Cantos 6 and 29).

449-50. "Night of the soul," here associated with the wisdom addressed to posterity ("ad posteros") by the Spanish mystic St. John of the Cross (1542-91).

455. "The old woman in [Voltaire's] Candide" who, in a parody of the Odyssey, undergoes a series of Job-like misfortunes in the course of her travels.

457. "Paradise is not artificial," cf. Charles Baudelaire's study of drugs, Les Paradis artificiels (1860).

458, "Splintered."

462. Lake Nemi, site of the sacred grove and temple of Diana, guarded by a priest who held the post until killed by another who sought the office. Cf. Frazer, The Golden Bough (1890).

466. Either Nietzsche's Dionysian hero Zarathustra or Zoroaster, the religious teacher of ancient Persia. Both are obsolete ("desuet"), unless this also refers to Lake Nemi.

467. The "small castle," a hill near Pound's house in Sant'Ambrogio.

471-75. "Immemorial of Athena/glaux, glaukôpis" ("little owl, with glinting eyes/olive trees"). Pound was quite struck by the explanation given by Allen Upward (cf. 419 above) of the Homeric epithet glaukôps ascribed to Athena: "The property of the glaux lowll and olive leaf, to shine and then not to shine, 'glint' rather than shine. Certainly a more living word if one lives among olive yards."

476. "North Wind, East Wind, South Wind."

477. "There's the bogeyman."

479-80. "The Little Well/at Tigullio," beach at Rapallo.

483. "The descendants of Remus the magnanimous."

489-90. Cf. Pound's translation of the Analects VII, XIII: "In Ch't he [Confucius] heard the 'Shao' (cf. 519 below) sung, and for three months did not know the taste of meat: said: didn't figure the performance of music had attained to that summit."

491-92. "Ligur," alludes to the "clear, shrill" song of the sirens in Homer. Pound glimpsed the combined processes of the sun and the legendary emperor Shun's song (cf. 520 below) in the components of the Chinese ideogram shao.

493. Japanese verse form of five lines.

495. In Pound's first Canto, Elpenor, the ill-fated member of Odysseus' crew who died falling off the roof of Circe's house, asks that he be remembered by the epitaph: "A man of no fortune and with a name to come."

496-97. President John Adams' fulminations against banks of discount struck a sympathetic chord in Pound—the most recent example of their financial machinations being the revaluation of gold from \$21.65 to \$35 an oz. during the Roosevelt administration.

500-8. Jewish financiers: Meyer Amschel Rothschild (1743-1812), founder of the House of Rothschild, Henry Morgenthau, Sr. (1856-1946), banker and real estate

magnate, Henry Morgenthau, Jr. (1891-1967), Roosevelt's Secretary of the Treasury, Israel Moses Sieff (1889-1972), English banker and reputed anonymous owner of the London Daily Mirror.

507. Cf. H. Gordon Selfridge, The Romance of Commerce (1923).

514. "oversalted, spoiled."

515-16. Cf. 150: "to redeem Zion with justice."

517-31. Foundational moments of Chinese history (the shao or succession dances marking the peaceful accessions of the legendary emperors Shun and Y'u to the throne), here juxtaposed with the Old Testament, apparently in an attempt to reveal the foundations of Judaic law (betrayed by modern-day Jewish financiers?) in Leviticus 19:35 (cf. 331 above). Jeremiah 31:38-39 contains instructions for the rebuilding of Jerusalem after a new covernant has been established with the Lord ("the city shall be built to the Lord from the tower of Hananeel unto the gate of the corner"). In Jeremiah 32:8-9, the prophet, shut up "in the court of the prison" in Babylon-occupied Jerusalem, is inspired by the Lord to purchase a field "in Anathoth, which is in the country of Benjamin" for seventeen shekels of silver, a first step toward the reestablishment of the destroyed kingdom of Judah.

528. Mount Chocorua in eastern New Hampshire, Olga Rudge's childhood summer

539-40. "If those who use a currency give it up in favor of another," from Aristotle's Politics, 1275b, 16.

546. Deleted in the 1949 Faber edition.

552-67. Pound was a proponent of the stamp scrip introduced in the Austrian town of Wörgl, which he visited in 1935. Called Schwundgeld or "disappearing money," this locally issued currency lost its value if not spent within a certain period of time—an incentive against the hoarding of money, designed to increase the circulation of goods and services.

570. The N.E.P. or New Economic Plan, launched by Lenin (in 1921) to reinvigorate the Soviet economy; it did not, however, include the Poundian nostrum of the work-certificate (credit extended to workers for work done) and was thus doomed to failure.

577. Cf. 340.

578-83. Aristotle, Nicomachean Ethics, 1095a.

585-92. Confucian ethics, as embodied by China's legendary emperors. From The Unwobbling Pivot VI.

593-94. When asked what he would have done had his father been guilty of murder, Emperor Shun replied that he would have taken his father ("son père") on his back and retired into anonymity on the seacoast—an example of Confucian filtal piety.

597. "Hail to Great Japan."

598-600. The title characters of two Noh plays translated by Pound in 1916, the former an old blind man vainly sought after by his daughter, the latter a ghost returning to praise his slaver.

601. "Because it is impossible." From the Church Father Tertullian's insistence on faith over reason.

605. "KORE, AGLAOS ALAOU" ("Daughter [i.e. Persephone], the radiance of the blind one [i.e. Tiresias?].

606-9. Baron Wester Wemyss (1864-1933), monocled admiral of the fleet and signer of the WWI armistice on behalf of the Allies, here all wet.

- 610. Silvio Gesell (1862-1930), finance minister of the first (independent socialist) Munich Councils Republik in 1919, of which the anarchist Gustav Landauer (1870-1919) was the education minister before being arrested and assassinated by the Social Democratic authorities. Pound was a student of Gesell's radical monetary theories.
- 614. "The money is there," a statement made to Mussolini in 1943 by Gianpetro Pellegrini of the Salò Republic's Ministry of Finance when offering him a handsome monthly sum for his personal expenses (initially declined).

619. Persephone, goddess of the Underworld.

620. "That leans."

621. Pontius Pilate, Roman procurator of Judaea (c. 26-37).

625-26. Alfred von Tirpetz (1849-1930), German admiral who developed U-boat warfare against the allies in WWI, warning his daughter against the sirenlike ("SEIRENES") charms of high-ranking naval officers.

626. The solar swastika of Hindu tradition?

630. "In lieu of."

633. "CHARITES," in Homer, The Graces.

637. "To the coast."

639. "A white-colored shell" (cf. Botticelli's painting The Birth of Venus).

642-43. "The southwest wind blows." The Noh play Suma Genji, translated by Pound in 1916, climaxes with the "supernatural apparition" of its hero Genji ("a sort of placespirit") on the seashore of Suma—here rhymed with the theophany of Venus.

645. Cf. 212.

646. "Europe and unchaste Pasiphaë." Europa was raped by Zeus in the form of a bull; Pasiphaë, wife of King Minos, was the mother of the Minotaur.

647. The Southeast and East Winds.

648. Cf. 445-46.

650. "The Tarpeian Cliff," a place in Rome where criminals and traitors were hurled to their death. At 76.45, it is a Roman restaurant.

651. Common Roman wine.

652-53. Cf. 577. "Come spirit/come."

654. Aristotle, native of Stagira.

655-56. The West and East Winds.

658. "Brododactylos," Aeolic form (via Sappho) of Homer's "rosy-fingered" dawn.

661. "Against the light." Evokes a photograph of Olga Rudge.

662. Cf. "Pisanello lacking the skill/To forge Achaia" [i.e. to recreate Greece] in Pound's 1920 poem "Mauberley."

664. "Venus, Cythera, or Rhodes" (cf. Horace, Odes I.vii.1)

665. "Ligurian wind, come."

666-75. Aubrey Beardsley (1872-98), English illustrator, associated with the Symbolists and Decadents; John Kettlewell, a student at Oxford in 1913, when Edward, Prince of Wales ("Edvardus") began his studies there; William Lawrence (1889-1915), younger brother of T.E. Lawrence (1888-1935), invited Pound to speak on Cavalcanti at Oxford in 1913. Lines 667-74 were deleted in the 1949 Faber edition.

676. A German-initiated project to build a railroad linking western Europe to the Persian Gulf. 1888-1904.

677-80. Pound may have been shown T.E. Lawrence's recent photos of the ancient cliff

city Arabia Petraea by his brother William. T.E. Lawrence attended the 1919 Versailles Peace Conference with the Arab delegation, but was disgusted with the power politics played by the English prime minister, Lloyd George ("L.L.G"), and its French convener, Georges Clemenceau ("the frogbassador").

685-91. Thomas Collins, lecturer in English at Oxford, took part in the discussion after Pound read his paper on Cavalcanti there in 1913, quoting a line of Sappho ("phanatei moi," or "he seems to me") to prove her superiority to Cavalcanti's line "causing the air to tremble." Magdalen, a college of Oxford University. "The Hound of Heaven," a celebrated poem by Francis Thompson (1859-1907), published in 1893.

704. "Battling" Siki, Senegalese in origin, heavyweight boxing champion of the 1920s.

711-12. "That guy Stalin," whose boyhood nickname was Koba, or "the bear."

713. Ernest Rhys (1859-1946), English editor.

717. I.e. "buggered."

720. The muses of history and dance, respectively.

721. Probably Harley Granville-Barker (1877-1946), English actor and playwright.

724. "Essomenoisi," cf. Od. XI, 76, "for generations to come."

725. "The grove wants an altar."

726. Lucrezia Borgia (1480-1519).

727-30. "A pleasant quarter-hour (in the Malestiana Library)." Located in the town of Cesena, the library was directed by Manlio Torquato Dazzi, who assisted Pound during the early '20s in his research into the life and times of Sigismundo Malatesta.

730-33. Quotes from earlier Cantos dealing with historical themes.

734-37. G.R.S. Mead (1863-1933), editor of a quarterly review devoted to occult subjects such as reincarnation. The Fortean Society was similarly dedicated to the investigation of unusual and unexplained natural phenomena.

744. "The Birth" (of Venus), by Botticelli.

745-47. The Palazzo Capoquardi Salimbene, Olga Rudge's residence in Siena during the '30s, contains a panel painting with a child's face which reminded Pound of their daughter, Mary.

749. From Pound's 1945 Italian translation of L'Asse che non vacilla. His 1947 English version (The Unwobbling Pivot X) runs: "The unmixed functions [in time and space] without bourne." Cf. 80.673.

752. "In a prepared place," from Calvacanti's "Donna mi prega," also translated by Pound as "in a sacred place" or "the formed trace."

753. "Spider brings me good luck."

754. "EIKONES," pictures, images, icons.

755-56. Cf. 30 above.

759-81. Early memories of New York City: "black Jim," a servant at the boarding house on 47th Street run by the Weston branch of Pound's family, later replaced by the Ritz-Carlton. Among its residents in the 1890s: the architect John Fouquet, the real estate agent John Quackenbush, known for his goatee ("barbiche"), the musician Kate Chittenden. Other New York sights and sounds: Mouquin's, the French restaurant; former presidential candidate George Francis Train, now an urban vagrant; the various baubles Pound's Aunt Frank had brought back from her European voyages.

782. One of Pound's ancestors, Joseph Wadsworth, stole the Connecticut charter and hid it in the Charter Oak.

783-88. Various stops along Pound's and Aunt Frank's 1898 and 1902 grand tours of

Europe, the visits to the Al Hambra in Granada and "the gallery of Queen Lindaraja" leading to Gibraltar and Tangiers. Cf. 247–63 above.

789–90. James Joyce located Calypso's island near Gibraltar and the Pillars of Hercules.

His novel Ulysses ends with Molly Bloom's memories of her girlhood in Gibraltar.

794-803. "See Naples [and die]," Italian proverb in praise of the city's beauty, here contrasted with the loveliness of northern Italy: the romanesque Church of San Michele in Pavia, the romanesque church of San Zeno Maggiore in Verona (which contains the column signed "Adamo made me"), the frescoes in Verona's San Pietro Martire, (twelve) Apostles" in Verona, where the headwaiter pointed out "Here is the tea" to the young busboy (the "piccolo").

799-800. "And 'make the air tremble with clarity," a signature line of Cavalcanti's, as given in one of the manuscripts Pound consulted at the Capitolare Library in Verona for his 1932 edition of Cavalcanti's Rime.

809–12. George Washington Carver (?1864–1943), African-American discoverer of many new uses for peanuts ("arachidi"). During the war, Pound tried to persuade a number of bureaucrats in Italy that the cultivation of peanuts would solve Italy's food shortages—just as he later had syrup-producing American maples planted near Brunnenburg Castle in the South Tyrol, but in the process only managed to introduce poison ivy into the region.

819–25. Pound's daughter, Mary, was raised in the Italian Tyrol; through her he met the Bacher family, whose wood carvings blended folk art with an intaglio technique worthy of Pisanello's medals of Malatesta.

828. Lines refracting the poems "Clair de Lune" and "Fountain Court (à Arthur Symons)" by the Symbolist Paul Verlaine (1844–96).

836–38. "And is not an attribute. . . it is an agent." Medieval scholastic distinctions found in commentaries on Cavalcanti's "Donna mi prega," a philosophical canzone that investigates the relation of memory to desire. Pound's full translation of Cavalcanti's poem provides the centerpiece of Canto 36 and its "light philosophy" suffices the entire Pisan sequence.

839. Pound observes in his essay on Cavalcanti that the rose form made by the magnet in iron filings is a perfect example of energy realizing itself as pattern.

839-40. Cf. Ben Jonson's "Her Triumph" (in his 1624 Celebration of Charis): "Ha' you felt the wool of beaver/Or swan's down ever?/Or have smelt o' the bud o' the briar?/Or the nard in the fire?" John Dowland's setting of this poem was published by Arnold Dolmetsch (cf. 81.100-13).

842. The river of forgetfulness in Hades. In Dante's sacred geography, however, the stream is placed on the summit of Mount Purgatory. Cf. Pur. XXVIII, 127–31: "On this side it descends with virtue that takes from one the memory of sin; on the other side it restores the memory of every good deed. Here Lethe, so on the other side Eunoe it is called; and it works not if first it be not tasted on this side and on that" (Singleton). In the autograph draft of Canto 74, the final lines originally read: "We who have passed over Lethe/seeking Eunoe." Under the guidance of Matelda, Dante drinks of the waters of Lethe in Pur. XXXII and of Eunoe (from the Greek, "well-minded") in Pur. XXXIII.

CANTO 75

- 3. Gerhart Münch (1907–88), pianist, composer, and arranger, native of Dresden, Germany, recently fire-bombed by the Allies (hence the allusion to Phlegethon, the flaming river of fire in Hades?). Münch provided an "abbreviation" for the violin of Francesco da Milano's sixteenth-century version of "Le Chant des Oiseaux" by the French composer Clément Jannequin (?1485–1558), whose score (in Olga Rudge's hand) is given below.
- 5-6. Dietrich Buxtehude (1637–1707), German composer; Ludwig Klages (1872–1956), German anthropologist; Hans Sachs (1494–1576), German Meistersinger.
- 8-10. Notes: "Sidelights from Salassi [?]: —The Song of the Birds—Francesco da Milano (16th century)—Gerhart Münch (20th century) [by metamorphosis]—Violin Part—Part 1."
- Final ideogram. Chinese seal characters, perhaps a phonetic transcription of Münch's name (mu-ch'i). The 1933 date coincides with Pound's organization of music festivals in Rapallo featuring Münch and the violinist Olga Rudge.

CANTO 76

- 3. "Where memory liveth," from Pound's translation of Cavalcanti's "Donna mi prega."
- 4. Olivia Rossetti Agresti (1875–1961), daughter of Pre-Raphaelite William Michael Rossetti and broadcaster for Radio Rome, referring to Mussolini.
- 6. Wife of Amphityron, glimpsed by Odysseus in Hades.
- 7. Three tree nymphs.
- 9. Three muses: Walter Savage Landor's Dirce, Sigismundo Malatesta's Isotta, and Cavalcanti's Giovanna, referred to by Dante in the Vita nuova as "she who was called Primavera" [i.e. "Spring" or she who will "come first," i.e. before Beatrice].
- 11-31. Reprise of the visionary encounter on the salita (or "hill road") near Sant'Ambrogio recorded in the drafts of Italian Cantos 74-75; cf. 74.445-46.
- 13. "On the slope and at the crossing of three roads."
- 16. "Beneath our cliffs."
- 19–20. Rapallo lies on the via Aurelia, which runs along the coast from Rome to Pisa to Genoa. The older road ("la vecchia") runs below the church of St. Pantaleone at Sant' Ambrogio. In the drafts of Italian Cantos 74–75, Sigismundo Malatesta and his court poet Basinio are traveling along the via Aurelia toward Genoa when the vision of Cunizza occurs.
- 21–22. Three apparitions: "Cunizza there at the crossing of three roads,/and the barefoot woman." In the drafts of Italian Cantos 74–75, "la scalza" is a barefoot country woman who suddenly appears halfway up the hill path from Rapallo to Sant'Ambrogio, fleeing her home that has just been destroyed by bombs and seeking refuge in the church of St. Pantaleone; at 74.446 and 30 below, she declares "I am the Moon." The third apparition here ("and she who said") had also been evoked in the Italian Cantos of Jan.-Feb. 1945: she is Caterina Sforza, Countess of Forlì (1463–1509). Legend has it that while defending the fortress of Ravaldino against the Orsi, she mounted the battlements, defiantly raised her skirts, and boasted that she "had the mould for casting more children."
- 24-26. "This rotten wind," blowing over the city of Toulouse, north of Mount Ségur, the
