

EXOTIC BENEFICIAL PLANTS

Acacia complanata

Leguminosae. Lovely, rare species from southern Queensland, Australia. Adapted to most soils and conditions, drought and frost resistant. Semi-weeping growth habit, usually branched at base with branches arching downwards. Evergreen shrub to 12' tall and 9' across. Leaves and twigs found to possess toxins akin to Peganum, so grazing by livestockmust be avoided, particularly where bark of Acacia maidenii may be also reached. This poisoning combination has been studied as the Australian 'acacia-huasca' complex.

Acacia maidenii

Leguminosae. Exquisite, stately and hardy tree to 30' with magnificent reddish tint to stems and young foliage and twisted, coiled pods. Frost resistant but drought tender. Grows remarkably fast, even in small pots. One seedling reached over five feet in five months! Bark extremely high in the same compound found in P. viridis. This tree is a must! 12" treelet \$35; seed packet \$5

Acorus calamus 'Calamus Root'

Araceae. Iris-like semi-aquatic plant with aromatic, creeping rootstock. Hardy from Arizona to subarctic Canada. Calamus root has been used in traditional medicine of several cultures and is known in herbal commerce in the Near East for 4,000 years. The Cree chew a handful on long treks when they wish to hike above the ground. Ayurvedic use in India prescribes adding a small bit whenever herbal products are smoked, to neutralize undesirable side effects. European herbalists have recommended it to discourage tobacco habituation, as tobacco smoke acquires an unpleasant taste after calamus has been chewed. Root powder can be dusted or a solution sprayed as a very effective natural insecticide for the home or garden since the active principles sterilize female insects by preventing ovary development.

Actinidia polygama 'Chinese Cat Powder'

Actinidiaceae. Relative of the Kiwi fruit, this plant indeed has small edible fruits. Use of its dried leaves by Asian zoos as a tranquilizer for large cats has raised interest in its therapeutic and recreational uses. Hardy in cold climates but take precautions to protect the plants from neighbourhood cats who seem to zero in on it from great distances.

Alternanthera lehmannii

Amaranthaceae. One of the Amazonian piri-piri plants, used in some areas as an ayahuasca admixture. The plant is treated with great deference, special taboos are associated with handling and using it. Little is known of its ethnobotany or chemistry. Grows as a short, semi-woody herb to 2 feet. Stems and leaves are a beautiful red and it blooms with round globes of white flowers. Makes an excellent container specimen or grouped as a border in mild-winter areas. One of the easiest ethnobotanical specimens to grow as a houseplant, rare, showy and significant. plant \$25

Anadenanthera peregrina 'Yopo' 'Vilca'

Leguminosae. Graceful tree to 30', semi-hardy to a range of conditions. Best to protect from frost or chill when young, but said to be more cold tolerant when older. Does fine in pots as an indoors or greenhouse specimen. Prefers humid warmth and dappled shade. Excellent and relatively easy in frost-free areas. Native to Puerto Rico, the Caribbean and the Guiana Shield where the powdered seeds are still used as the source of the famous ritual snuff of the Yanomama. Since this tree has proven so difficult to raise from seeds, we have made arrangements to have batches of established young trees sent up from the tropics, beginning in late spring. Treelets we received in the autumn of '92 have wintered over well indoors and in the greenhouse. Get an early start and you will have a full season to establish your specimen. Sizes will range from 6" to 12" or more, treelet \$80

Anredera (species undetermined)

Basellaceae. Easily-grown edible vine producing heavy crops of crisp tubers and nutritious, tasty leaves. Very omamental. Does well in pots. Full or part sun. Perennial if frost-protected. The Andean peoples no longer know this to be a food plant, although early records indicate the tubers were eaten in Peru and its name in Quechua implies the leaves were a food. 'Knowledge extinction' is an overlooked effect of cultural and biological disruption. Here is a forgotten food crop worth rediscovering.

Argyreia nervosa 'Hawaiian Baby Woodrose'

Convulvulaceae. Popular indoor flowering vine with rampant growth, tropical appearance. Has huge downy leaves and velvethaired white stems. Flowers are exquisite. Lavender corolla with dark center. Seedpods dry into woody 'roses' valuable for florist trade.

Argemone glauca 'Pua-Kala'

Papaveraceae. Painkilling, sedative juice of this 5' poppy was once used in Hawaiian ethnopharmacology. White latex drips from cut parts, rich in complex non-opiate alkaloids. This rare non-spiny species is known only from Hawaii. Drought-hardy, large white petals.

Argemone mexicana 'Chicalote'

Papaveraceae. Yellow flowers, spiny leaves. The latex of this species is used in Mexican hospitals as an official pharmaceutical preparation. Drought and heat tolerant. seed packet \$2.50

Argemone polyanthemos 'Chicalote'

Papaveraceae. Medicinal prickly poppy species from the southwest. Similar to A. mexicana, but we now favor this one. Very drought hardy annual herb with undulate leaves and spines, large white petals. All parts drip abundant quantities of potent latex, yellow when fresh but rapidly turns to black tar with a subtle, agreeable odor. Wild collected seeds packet \$2.50

Arundo donax 'Giant Reed'

Graminae. This plant has been extensively studied to determine the types of compounds responsible for its widespread use in India's Ayurvedic medicine. It was with great surprise that chemists determined this huge grass to have relatively high concentrations of the same alkaloids found in *P. viridis* leaves, in all parts, particularly the rhizomes. It forms a dense clump to 20' with many bamboo-like canes, useful as beanpoles, fencing and fishing rods. Ideal as a quick windbreak for areas of low rainfall, although it thrives with watering. Hardy from Arizona to Washington.

Atropa belladonna

Solanaceae. Hardyperennial herbto 4'. Important toxic medicinal plant, widely used since ancient times by many human cultures. Source of atropine and hyoscyamine. Fatal toxicity is possible, so the plant should be kept from casual contact, children especially should be informed. Seeds germinate best if soaked briefly (2-3 hours) in vinegar or alcohol right before sowing (rinse first). Full sun. We offer seeds collected in the wild from its native habitat in Germany.

Banisteriopsis caapi 'Ayahuasca' 'Yajé vine'

Malpighiaceae. This is the visionary vine of Amazonian shamans. Extremely rare in cultivation, yet easily grown, attaining over 25' in a sunny window in one summer. Many who have purchased cuttings from us over the past years have found their container-grown vines to be very prolific, raising them outside on trellises, harvesting back the summer growth and bringing the mother tub plant indoors before frost. We are surprised at how well the plant handles winter nights as cold as 40°F , losing leaves but regrowing from even colder snaps.

His tribe numbers less than 250 survivors from a peak of 16,000 or more.

Their rainforest homeland near the Rio Aguarico/Napo confluence has become clearcut for petroleum, lumber, agribusiness and colonialization schemes = Ethnocide.

Brugmansia aurea 'Borrachero' 'Tree Datura'

Solanaceae. Beautiful flowering Angel Trumpet tree with medium-sized white flowers fragrant after dusk. This is the species made famous by Schultes as the progenitor of the bizarre, atrophied cultivars of the Kamsá shamans in the Sibundoy Valley. This clone was collected by the great ethnobotanist, Timothy Plowman near Inza, Colombia at 6500' elev. plant \$10

Brugmansla hybrid Tommie Earl Lockwood's Clone
Solanaceae. During the course of his Harvard PhD thesis (A
Taxonomic Revision of Brugmansia) Lockwood travelled
extensively collecting many species and rare varieties for
exhaustive hybridization work. All of his new crosses and parent
clones were tossed in the compost upon his untimely secidental
death. Tim Plowman rescued this one survivor, label lost and
forever a mystery. Blooms prolifically with huge, nodding,
exceptionally fragrant pure white flowers.

Brugmansia x candida 'Double White'

Solanaceae. Pendant white flowers with double corollas fused together, one trumpet within another! plant \$10

Brugmansia x insignis 'Solid Gold'

Solanaceae. Angel trumpet tree with huge nodding, bell-like corollas. Intensely scented at dusk with the most positively extraterrestrial fragrance imaginable. Easy to grow, blooms quickly even in small pots. Tree to 10-15' in mild climates.; plant \$10

Brugmansia sanguinea "Tree Datura' 'Huanto'

Solanaceae. Best chill-tolerant Angel Trumpet tree, also showiest with 6" corolla red at apex, yellow sides and green base. Will begin to bloom 5 months from seed, but this species can be difficult from cuttings. Sacramental ally of Quechuas, ancient admixture plant in San Pedro cactus brew. Seeds employed by Andean shamans for visions. Medicinal but all parts toxic. Very rare, very choice. Best growth in cool, moist weather. Grows into a small, branched tree laden virtually all year with the large colorful flowers.

Brugmansia species 'Hairy Yellow Tree Datura'

Solanaceae. During an expedition to Ecuador we discovered this undocumented Brugmansia which is intermediate between B. sanguinea and B. vulcanicola (a rare endangered Colombian sp.). The corollas are large, finely-haired, rich golden-yellow and have inflated, hairy calyxes and pubescent stems and foliage. The fruits are virtually identical to B. vulcanicola (large, flat-sided, velvety, greenish-white maturing with a corky surface). Members of an herbalist cult smoke the flowers for divination and seem to use the seeds and fruits as well. This is a high-elevation species which will do well where B. sanguinea thrives. Specimens of this unusual tree grow very broad and low to the ground rather than tall, bearing great masses of stunning, bright gold blooms. One in our garden grows well through normal frosts and survives repeated hard freezes, regrowing and flowering.

Brugmansia suaveolens 'Huge Pink'

Solanaceae. Very fragrant, very showy flowers with nodding corollas. Prolific, branching trees to 20'. Easy to grow. Bloom well in small pots. plant \$10

Brugmansia versicolor 'Salmon/Peach Tree Datura'
Solanaceae. Beautiful Angel Trumpet tree to 15' laden yearround with 10" hanging trumpets opening white then fading to
deep salmon/peach. Sweet aroma scents the early evening air. A
showpiece for any ornamental or ethnobotanical collection.
Does well in pots. Full sun. plant \$10

Brunfelsia australis

Solanaceae. Rare endemic of Paraguay's Rio Parana basin (once a sea during interglacial times). Excellent omamental/medicinal shrub. 11/2" blue-violet, sweet-scented flowers. Adapted to indoor conditions.

Brunfelsia densifolia

Solanaceae. Highly endangered Puerto Rican species known from only one population in the wild. These seeds come from a specimen originally collected by Timothy Plowman on Christmas Day 1970. Bushy tree, very branched to 12' with long narrow foliage and flaring, tubular flowers, cream fading yellow. Very scented. Seeds scarce, a must for collections.

Brunfelsia grandiflora subspecies schultesii 'Chinicaspi' Solanaceae. One of the major medicinal psychoactive plants of the Upper Amazon, widely known and cultivated by natives, who use the cold-water infusion of the bark or leaves. Employed by Quichua shamans to contact the spirits, mastery of which requires consuming this plant 12 times during apprenticeship. Used to cure fevers, arthritis, body pain and as a contraceptive. A weak infusion of the leaves is used by some tribes as a strengthening tonic. In Peru, it is an admixture to ayahuasca. The shrub is many-branched with the large purple corollas fading lavender, then white. It eventually will become a formidable tree, but generally is trimmed as a hedge or bush. Easy from seed, sown in sterile mix, kept warm and moist. May take several weeks. Blooms young in pots.

Brunfelsia jamaicensis

Solanaceae. Endangered species from cloudforests of Jamaica's Blue Mountains. Long, tubular, cream-white corollas with narrow necks and wide, undulating edges. One of the most fragrant of all scents, exhaled in little breaths during the evening. Reminiscent of vanilla and clove. We have kept several in 1-gallon pots, rotating the ones in bloom into the bedroom for pleasure making.

Brunfelsia lactea

Solanaceae. Beautiful fragrant species with creamy white flowers scented at dusk with an overwhelming, deliciously sweet odour. We are fortunate to have a small supply of seeds harvested from a bush raised from seeds collected in the wild by Timothy Plowman, who noted it is 'known from one area in Lunquillo National Forest, Puerto Rico, which is slated to be logged (1976)'. It is likely extinct in nature now. 5 seeds/\$5

Brunfelsia pilosa

Solanaceae. One of the easiest and most vigorous Brunfelsia species. New growth characterized by fine hairs and purple tint. Blooms purple, showy. Hardy to light frost. seed pkt/\$5

Calea zacatechichi 'Dream Herb'

Compositeae. Low, branching shrub to 4 feet. Very hardy perennial, tolerant of drought and poor soil but should be protected from freezing. Thrives in good garden soil. Seeds should be barely covered, kept moist and in full sun. Native to a high altitude pine/oak zone in cloudforests of a limited area in the southern Mexico sierra. After repeated expeditions in search of this elusive wild plant, we were fortunate to finally encounter a small patch of it in seed this year, allowing us to introduce this fascinating medicinal species into cultivation for the first time.

Canavalia sp.

Leguminosae. Immature seedpods of this tropical beach vine have been appreciated by natives as the source of a cuphoric smoking substance. This has been shown to be a not unfounded practice. Plant sprawls widely with leathery blue-green trifoliate leaves and broad, blunt seedpods bearing several large tan seeds. Prefers hot sun, but seems to survive low 50's at night.

Carica pubescens 'Mountain Papaya'

Caricaceae. Papaya lovers who have longed to grow their own, but live in temperate climates will be delighted to know about this close relative of tropical papayas. This high-elevation species native to the Andes grows where you can see your breath in the noon sun all year, but where freezes are rare. In mildwinter areas it can be grown outdoors, or kept in a cool greenhouse in pots or beds. The fruits are small 4" ovals but are steadily produced in unbelievable quantities, ringing the trunk by the hundred. Traditionally used for juice. Easy to germinate.

Catha edulis 'Khat'

Celastraceae. Beautiful ornamental specimen plant with shiny foliage and majestic growth. Tolerant of an unusually broad range of conditions from extended drought and heat to frosts, shade, sun and humidity. Best in well-drained, rich soil. We plant \$25 offer this as a specimen plant only.

Capsicum species 'Ecuadorean All-Purple Dwarf Chile' Solanaceae. Amazing strain of hot pepper with entire plant (stems, leaves, flowers and fruits) tinted purple. Perennial bush to two feet, tolerant of chill, ideal in small pots. Fruits are jalapeño-sized, shiny eggplant-purple and rather hot. Growers as far north as Canada have reported excellent results raising them as winter houseplants, set outdoors in summer, same plants up to five years old! This strain was obtained in the Upper Pastaza valley of Ecuador. seed packet \$5

Capsicum species 'Romanian White Gypsy Sweet Pepper' Solanaceae. Exotic heirloom vegetable from Romania bearing sweet peppers of a pale cream-white colour, several inches long. seed packet \$3

Capsicum species 'Chile Habañero'

Solanaceae. The hot pepper world has been recently acclaiming this to be the hottest known variety, and although it is exquisitely piquant, we know of hotter still. Fruits are chunky and orange, to 2", with good flavor. In Central America these are blended with carrots and a little vinegar to make intensely hot, nontomato salsa. One of the best choices for the gournet chile lover. seed packet \$3

Capsicum species 'Sweet Cherry Pepper'

Solanaceae. This is an unusual form of garden pepper with excellent fruits about the size and shape of large cherries. They are so dense and heavy that there is practically no hollow interior. The red flesh has a flavour which is sweet with a delicious fruity taste. Connoisseurs' choice. seed packet \$3

Capsicum pubescens 'Rocoto Chile'

Solanaceae. Rocotos are a separate species of Capsicum peppers with large violet flowers, hairy leaves and heavy, squat fruit. Thick sweet flavourful flesh, yet the seed core is mighty hot. We have seeds of an ancient Rocoto strain from Cuzco. Tolerant of light frost, becoming a thick-trunked prolific perennial tree over the years. Good in large tubs. Grows over 7' tall and as wide in a season, from seed! seed packet \$3

Cestrum parqui

Solanaceae. Fine specimen plant for pharmacological collections. Related to C. laevigatum, said to be the maconha (Cannabis) substitute of southeastern Brazil. Becomes a branching shrub to 6' with clusters of potent night-scented, greenish yellow 1" flowers. Can be perennial in cold zones if roots are protected. Fast growing. Dense, willow-like foliage, attractive as trimmed shrubs. Contains a unique alkaloid solasoline and the saponins gitogenin and digetogenin.

Chrysanthemum parthenium 'Feverfew' 'Pyrethrum'

Compositae. Compact, spreading perennial herb. Exquisite and very easily-grown omamental/medicinal groundcover, sun or shade, any soils. Becoming one of the rising stars of herbal medicine as fever, migraine & flu remedy and in opium addiction treatment. Sow thinly on surface. seed nacket \$2

Coriandrum sativum 'Cilantro'

Asteraceae. Salsa lovers will know how indispensable fresh cilantro leaves are in the secret flavor of authentic Mexican hot sauce. Gardener cooks will be delighted with this as a culinary herb, as easy as dill or parsley to grow for fresh cutting. South American cuisine relies heavily on cilantro for its unique savory taste in soups and sauces. Get to know this spice! We offer an heirloom ancestral strain obtained from the Zapotecs of Oaxaca. seed packet \$2

Coriaria thymifolia 'Shanshi'

Coriariaceae. Very attractive fern-like, sprawling bush with drooping sprays of flower clusters which leave behind great quantities of small purple berries. These fruits are known to be toxic to humans and animals, but in the high Andes of northern Ecuador there are certain people who eat them for intoxication. One such native explained the effects from consuming an unspecified amount of the delicious, blueberry-like fruits to involve a heavy body at the same time as experiencing 'flying just like a bird'. Grows at high elevations near the equator and is tolerant of near-frost temperatures and intense sun. We are introducing this for the first time to cultivation, so little is known yet of its growth. It should be quite easy to germinate and establish where other Andean species succeed (ie. Brugmansia sanguinea, Trichocereus, Fuchsia) however we suggest they be well watered, protected from hot, dry summers and belowfreezing winters. Seed supply is scarce. seed packet \$5

Cyperus species 'Piri-Piri Sedge'

Cyperaceae. This is an ethnobotanical specimen of great significance. It is a grass-like sedge with 3' tubular reeds forming dense clumps with knotted, medicinal rhizomes. Indigenous tribes of Upper Amazonia cultivate various forms of piri-piri which have widely distinct properties: for liver problems, snakebite, given to dogs to develop good hunting skills, as ayahuasca admixtures and as contraceptives. The remedial effectiveness for such varying uses (between what are such morphologically similar types within just two species, Cyperus prolixus and C. articulatus) has been shown to be attributable to variations in the ergot-alkaloid-producing Balansia cyperi fungus, discovered to infect every cultivar. Easy, rapid and spectacular growth from divisions of this rare treasure. Prefers warmth, light and water. plant \$45

Cyphomandra betacea 'wild Tree Tomato'

Solanaceae. Collected on the land of a reknowned shaman in the Xalapa mountains, whose family use the fruits in exotic cooking. Very fast-growing tree to 8', bearing abundant crops of orange/ red, 3" subacid fruits. Easy from seed, grows well in large pots in full sun with frost protection. seed packet \$3

Datura ceratocaula 'Toma loco'

Solanaceae. Aztec sacramental "sister of ololiuhqui" used as a ritual enthogen. This is a really bizarre plant! Although it is a true Datura species, it is quite unique. The plant itself is almost a vine, with hollow, succulent stalks needing support. Porcelainwhite, 2" corollas and smooth, oblong pepper-like fruits which tum yellow on ripening. When mature, these capsules split open in a rapid contortion, explosively ejecting the seeds. Said to be semi-aquatic in the wild, but grows well in pots.

Datura stramonium 'Jimson weed'

Solanaceae. Interesting specimen plant for medicinal gardens, source of toxic pharmaceutical alkaloids. Annual bush bearing erect trumpets, white or violet with spikey seedpods. All parts poisonous: grow out of reach of children. seed packet \$1.50

Desmanthus illinoensis

Leguminosae. Native North American perennial shrub, excellent erosion control plant, nitrogen fixing, drought hardy, restoration species for disturbed wild habitats. Disease and pest resistant. Recent laboratory analyses have determined the roots contain tiny amounts of unusual indole alkaloids which inhibit growth of tomato and radish seedlings. There is a great potential for the development of a natural pre-emergent herbicide based on this root extract. The same study noted, incidentally, that although the seedling-inhibiting indoles occurin entramely trace quantitie the roots also contain a high percentage of the same effected

found in P. viridis leaves, an alkaloid devoid of the desired herbicidal properties. The plant has a remarkably wide habitat diversity in nature, growing wild in northern areas with heavy winter snows as well as in the deep South. We know many people in virtually every area will be able (and eager) to cultivate this wonderful plant for its marvelous biochemical gifts.

Echinacea purpurea 'Purple Concflower'

Compositae. Easiest species from seed, prolific bloomer. Good as a cut flower and as a non-specific stimulant to the immune system. Although native to North America, it is most popular in Europe, where there are more than 40 pharmaceutical preparations of *echinacea* root. So prized that it is fast becoming yet another wild herb threatened by overcollection. We urge all users to start growing it. Regrows from the severest winters. Grows well in shade or sun. Sow 1/4" deep, keep moist in sun. seed packet \$1.50

Eschscholzia californica 'California Poppy'

Papaveraceae. Plant to 12", sprawling with branches from central crown. Satiny golden petals with femy blue-green foliage. Naturalizes readily even in poor soils. Dried petals smoked for their euphoric effects, medicinal opiate-like alkaloids including protopine and allocryptine, with no morphine content. seed packet \$1.50

Heimia salicifolia 'Sinicuiche'

Lythraceae. Aztec sacred herb once used for trance divination, auditory effects and odd, yellow-tinted vision. Called Sun Opener. Thin, branched habit, quite drought and cold-tolerant but protect from solid freezes. Good hedge plant or grouped in pots. Has lovely, intricate, yellow flowers. Easy from seed: scatter thinly on surface, filtered light, keep from drying out while sprouting. Transplant young.

Hieracium pilocella 'Håret Høgeurt'

Compositae. Low perennial groundcover plant with rosettes of hairy, hand-shaped leaves, spreading by above-ground runners in the manner of strawbernies. We came upon references to this obscure Nordic/Russian psychoactive plant in an old, out-of-print Danish text, Hallucinogenologi. The author claims the plant to be the most potent in the Scandinavian flora. Various effects are given (based on case histories of experimenters smoking 0.5 to 1.2 grams of dried leaves) ranging from relaxation or stimulation to expanded consciousness without hallucinations. This batch is from a fresh crop.

Humulus lupulus 'Hops'

Cannabaceae. Hardy perennial vine grown for the bitter, sedative resinous flowers. Flavouring herb in beer, yet few realize that the mellow effect of beer is not merely from alcohol but is an herbal property of hop resins. Aggressive climber, goes root-dormant during winters. Seed will give a mix of male and female plants. Pre-treat seeds by chilling 2–3 weeks in refrigerator in a bag with moist moss or sterile mix. seed packet \$2.50

Hydrocotyle asiatica (-Centella asiatica) 'Gota Kola'
Umbelliferae. Tropical creeping herb famed as Chinese longevity
and brain tonic. Adaptogenic and restorative for fatigue and
stress, in large doses said to be stupefying and narcotic, producing
giddiness. Good terrarium specimen or as groundcover for
plants in containers. Spreads vigorously with warmth, sun or
shade and moisture. Commercial Gota Kola is dredged from
open sewage ditches in India, so home-grown is highly
recommended. Easy to grow.

Ilex paraguayensis 'Yerba Maté'

Aquifoliaceae. Powerful mental stimulant herb popular in South America. Branches are fire-roasted and dried to give the typical smoky taste of the herb tea. Good looking, low maintenance shrub seldom seen in medicinal collections. Tolerates light frost, drought, hot sun and neglect. Under greenhouse conditions it grows quickly enough to sustain harvests.

Iochroma species 'Borrachero'

Solanaceae. Scandent shrub with scarlet, tubular flower clusters. Elder shamans of Colombia's Sibundoy Valley will seldom speak of this sacred medicinal, yet they all have carefully tended bushes of a very similar species in their secret gardens. Outstanding specimen plant of significant ethnopharmacological status. Likes small pots.

Ipomoea carnea (-I. fistulosa)

Convulvulaceae. Beautiful perennial bush morning glory with large blue-green succulent leaves and clusters of 3" rose-coloured blooms. Much-branched shrub to 6', has done very well in pots in the greenhouse. Easy from seed. Native to the Santa Elena peninsula of coastal Ecuador, where it is theorized as the entheogenic plant which catalyzed the enigmatic Valdivia culture's mysterious flourishing (3,100 BC).

Ipomoea cf. hederacea 'Woolly Mexican Morning Glory' Convulvulaceae. Discovered on a collecting expedition to the mountains of Xalapa, this beautiful high-elevation morning glory has performed ideally in its first year in cultivation, producing abundant small violet flowers with cream centres followed by 100% seed set, even on single plants without pollinators. The seeds test very positive for alkaloids. Entire plant is covered with hairs and the leaves are divided in three to five lobes, rarely heart-shaped. Is a long-lived perennial in its habitat and has grown through the winter in our unheated greenhouse. Highly recommended.

Ipomoea tricolor ("I. violacea) 'Tlitilitzen' 'Badoh Negro' Convulvulaceae. Popular flowering vine Moming Glory, usually grown as a garden annual but often goes perennial in frost-free areas. A colourful fence or trellis cover, fast and easy from seed. Soak in warm water until swollen, then sow 1/2" deep. Set out after frosts with supports. 'Heavenly Blue' (clear blue flowers) or 'Pearly Gates' (pure white flowers) 25 seeds/\$1.50

Ipomoea tricolor ("I.violacea) 'Flying Saucers'

Convulvulaceae. This cultivar has been mentioned and illustrated in the literature on entheogenic varieties, but has nearly slipped into extinction and is not commercially available. One of our customers managed to secure a few heirloom seeds and raised this crop for those interested in preserving a beautiful and very exciting ethnomedicinal treasure. Flowers are huge, to 4" and vary in colour from blue with white streaks to white with many blue spots, very unusual and attractive. seed packet \$5

Ipomoea tricolor (...I. violacea) 'Zapotec Blue'

Convulvulaceae. During a recent expedition into the Oaxacan sierra to visit with Zapotec mushroom healer friends, we were able to collect seeds of the original wild form of what has become the commercially popular 'Heavenly Blue' morning glory variety. This seed strain will be of great significance to researchers and gardeners alike, since it is the genetically pure, wild type from the original area of its traditional, ancient entheogenic use. The colour is an outstandingly beautiful blue.

Justicia pectoralis var. stenophylla

Acanthaceae. This plant's yellow-green leaves are indispensible as an admixture to the Virola and Yopo snuffs. During the past 20 years reports have been made implying it may be used as a psychoactive snuff alone, but only in 1990 did Schultes publish his definitive first-hand proof of this practice among indigenous people. So highly valued that it is planted at the doorstep of the shamans' huts across much of Amazonia. Low, spreading herb with intensely aromatic, coumarin-scented foliage. Shade-tolerant tropical groundcover, fast and heavy leaf production. We introduced this exotic plant in 1988 in its first release to non-indigenous cultivation.

Justicia pectoralis 'Yacu Piri-Piri'

Acanthaceae. We collected this rare, wild Upper Amazon plant along the confluence of the Rio Huayusayacu with the headwaters of the Rio Pusunu in the high rainforest of the remote Cerro Sumaco foothills. Local natives treat it with great respect, undertaking a lengthy fasting diet if they handle the live plant. It is likely the wild parent species from which the variety 'stenophylla' was derived. It is a spreading groundcover shrub to 3' with very dark green foliage, also aromatic. The growth habit and flowers are identical to var. 'stenophylla'. In nature it prefers open streambank sandy humus with plentiful water. Very limited amounts of this species are available this year.

Leonotis leonurus 'Wilde-dagga'

Labiatae. Rare South African plant with spikes of showy orange flowers. Hottentot tribes smoke the sticky aromatic leaves & flowertops as a perferred euphoriant. Fast, easy & spectacular. Perennial if kept from freezing. Good container plant. Full sun. Sow 1/4" deep, keep warm, moist and in sun. seed packet \$5

Leonurus sibiricus 'Siberian Motherwort' 'Marihuanilla'
Labiatae. Fine medicinal herb with ornamental, divided foliage
and tall spikes of purple flowers. Self-sows readily and is everblooming. Alkaloid-rich Malaysian perennial with folk uses as a
potent, smokeable psychic herb. Very easy to grow. Many
satisfied customers write us about their success with this plant.
Barely cover seeds and keep moist. Full sun. seed packet \$5

Mentha requiennii 'Creme de Menthe plant'

Labiatae. Tiny leafed matting groundcover from which is extracted the flavouring used in Creme de Menthe liqueurs. Forms a thick, moss-like mat ideal planted along garden paths to release the scent when strolling by. Very easy and rewarding. plant \$5

Mentha species 'Chocolate Mint'

Labiatae. Peppermint-like herb with distinct aroma of chocolate mint. Hardy to sun or shade, frost tolerant. plant \$5

Mirabilis multiflora 'So-ksi'

Nyctaginaceae. Low, sprawling perennial bush from the high deserts of the southwest. Has clusters of magenta flowers, blooms first summer from seed if sown early. First-year roots have weighed to a pound each, becoming massive with age. Dislikes damp soil. Root chewed by Hopi shaman/healers for divination of illness. Chemical analysis is lacking. Rare. seeds 10/\$5

Moringa oleifera 'Horseradish Tree'

Moringaceae. Excellent but little-known tropical edible tree. The leaves have the highest protein ratio of any plant on earth, taste like spinach when steamed. The seed furnishes a quality, multiuse oil and the root is similar to horseradish spice. The seeds can be sprouted in trays like wheatgrass for harvests of tender, nutritious greens. Considered to be an effective aphrodisiac/tonic in Nepal where it is called 'shobhanjan'. seed packet \$3

Nicotiana glauca 'Tree Tobacco'

Solanaceae. We are very happy to offer this rare tobacco species. Navajo elders prize this particular wild tobacco for ritual use during peyote prayer and other ceremonies, but say it has become very hard to find. We found a small grove of it up in the Sonora Mountains recently where its natural size and hardiness amazed us as much as its potency. It does not contain nicotine but is rich in the less-toxic anabasine. This is totally different from other tobacco species, being a perennial tree with a woody trunk and large, thick blue leaves. The site where we found it gets light snow and is without water much of the year. In cultivation it responds well to fertile soil and watering. Can produce heavy crops yearround for insecticide use (aphids) or as a flavourful smoke with intriguing properties.

Nicotiana attenuata 'Coyote Tobacco'

Solanaceae. California native tobacco used ritually by indigenous tribes, but exceptionally rare in modern times. Spends most of the season as a basal rosette until flowering, often to six feet. We find this species to have the very finest smoking qualities of any tobacco, by far. Tastes like crisp, citrus-sweet herb, with a mild, smooth effect.

Nicotiana langsdorfii

Solanaceae. Rare wild tobacco species, a 4' annual. Ornamental pale green tubular flowers with lovely fringed, undulate bell-shaped flaring mouths. A delicate, unusual beauty for any collection. Potent leaves smoked as a sacred tobacco by the Huichols.

Nicotiana rustica 'Picietl' 'Petún'

Solanaceae. This is the tobacco species of choice among indigenous shamans, being the hardiest and richest in narcotic properties. Eagerly spread tribe to tribe in pre-Colombian times from its presumed origin in Peru across the entire New World from the tropics to the margins of Canada and Chile. Still in wide use among most native peoples as the primary spiritual medicine plant. Huichol shamans blend it with Tagetes lucida to make a potent ritual smoke.

Nicotiana species 'Yumbo native strain'

Solanaceae. This is an heirloom ancestral strain of sacred tobacco from a family of respected ayahuasca healers of the Yumbo tribe in the Upper Amazon. We were very honoured to be given these seeds by one of the elders, who demonstrated various methods of preparation of tobacco for shamanic consumption as ceremonial smoke during ayahuasca sessions, for drinking as a visionary ritual initiation, and for using externally in healing skin infections, bites and cuts.

Nicotiana species 'Mopan Maya strain'

Solanaceae. Traditional smoking tobacco strain of the Mopan Maya, one of the last remaining communities of direct descendants of the ancient Mayas. This potent tobacco is likely the true genetic strain employed by their ancestors, kept growing all these generations: a living heirloom.

Nicotiana sylvestris

Solanaceae. This tobacco species is perennial, hardy to light frost, blooms all year with outrageous sprays of large, fragrant burgundy/pink or cream flowers. Easy in pots. Big leaves act as sticky organic bugtraps in garden or greenhouse. Good smoke. Believed to be one of the parent species which gave rise to N. tabacum (the domestic tobacco) in the Bolivian Andes in ancient times.

Nicotiana tabacum 'Tahuaco'

Solanaceae. This is the most widely cultivated species of *Nicotiana*, and was developed as a home crop in ancient times by native peoples of the Amazon and Andes. By the time of contact and conquest it had been gradually spread into cultivation all across the New World as the most popular of sacraments. To this day it is one of the most valuable, and popular recreational drug crop species on Earth. Sow in pots or rows when soil is warm. Thin to 4' spacing. Pinch before blooming.

Papaver species

Papaveraceae. This lovely annual poppy bears large, lavender-petalled blooms with black spots at their base. The ovary pods are of excellent size and quality, although often stained with the abundant, sticky latex. When dried these pods are valuable for use in flower arrangement. Sow seed thinly near the surface where plants will stay, as it doesn't transplant well. Will self-sow each year. Many people have written to comment on how nice this has been for them. Our highest recommendation goes with this much appreciated lavender poppy.

Papaver peoniflorum

Papaveraceae. Sunning double-flowered poppy. Pink petals with fringed edges in large, double-petalled peony-like heads. Plants are easy and very robust. Exceptionally large pods with white seeds. Will reseed itself and become naturalized in most areas. Choice garden ornamental. The dried pods are ideal for use in flower arrangements.

Passiflora incarnata

Passifloraceae. Native North American passion flower vine. Rampant growth, requires trellis or host bush. Very cold tolerant perennial, regrowing each spring from roots. Dried herb of great value in herbal medicine industry, fetching good prices in recent years. Beautiful ornamental flowering vine. Easily naturalized. Contains same compounds found in the ayahuasca vine.

Passiflora rubra 'Dutchman's Laudanum'

Passifloraceae. Lovely passionflower vine with small, intricate white flowers which leave behind attractive fuzzy white to pink fruits with red stripes. Quite an ornamental specimen. The name Dutchman's Laudanum had been given to this plant long ago and is an intriguing allusion to what is likely an exceptional alkaloid content in this as-yet unstudied species.

Passiflora serratodigitata

Passifloraceae. Rare and beautiful wild species of passion flower collected in the mountainous forests in Puerto Rico. Fruit said to be delicious. First introduction into cultivation. seed packet \$5

Peganum harmala 'Syrian Rue' 'Harmel'

Zygophyllaceae. At last we have secured a stable supply of seeds of this sought-after plant. Well known in Islamic medicine. Seeds produce the dye called Turkish Red, used for authentic Persian rugs. Powdered seeds are burned as an incense to ward off evil eye. David Flattery postulates this to be the Vedic Soma. Grows in desert conditions, needing drainage, occasional water, full sun. Seedlings need protection from sun the first year. Can survive cold winters if roots are lifted and kept domant in dry sawdust till spring. Viable seeds cannot be shipped to California addresses, as it is restricted under Noxious Weed Control Act laws.

Pernettya parvifolia 'Taglli'

Ericaceae. Beautiful but obscure entheogenic plant from the high Andes of Ecuador. Grows in cold, wet, open areas. From a distance, it appears as a fern, but the bushy branches are covered with small true leaves. When in bloom, it bears sprays of small, pure white lily-of-the-valley-like flowers all over the ends of the scandent branches, giving it a lovely aspect. This plant's fruits are known to produce Datura-like intoxication, although little is known of its folk use or chemistry. We were very happy to find this rare, legendary species on a recent expedition to the Andes and have a small stock of the seeds available.

Phalaris arundinacea 'Killer strain'

Gramineae. Very invasive grass spreading by runners, even in poor dry soil or under shade. We suggest monitoring this in containers unless there will be no problem with it taking over an area. Grazing sheep and cattle develop what are called the 'Phalaris Staggers' due to high levels of the same alkaloids found in P. viridis leaves. This toxicity is most pronounced in the young shoot growth after cutting and is at its peak in seedlings eight days after germination. Has been successfully naturalized as far north as Canada. This new strain was selected for maximum alkaloid content, perhaps finding use as a biochemical 'fence' to keep grazing livestock from gardens.

Phalaris arundinacea "Turkey Red strain"

Gramineae. This is a strain carefully selected for optimum, clean, stable alkaloid content when *dried*. plant \$25

Phalaris arundinacea 'Yugoslavian Fresh Cut strain'

Gramineae. This variety has been developed for maximum yield when cut as fresh foliage. plant \$25

Phalaris arundinacea 'Variegated strain'

Gramineae. This is a choice, rare pin-striped variegated form, brilliantly omamental. plant \$15

Physalis ixocarpa 'Tomatillo'

Tomatillos are a classic vegetable of Mexico, very easy to grow and bear outstanding quantities of the lemon-flavored tomatolike fruits. Used widely in green salsa and stews, the flavor sweetens with cooking. Seeds are sown 1/4" deep and ultimately raised 2' apart, finishing earlier than tomatoes. These particular strains are rare indigenous heirloom varieties from Oaxaca. The sizes and colors of these varieties are quite unknown outside of the nature area and will impress anyone familiar with common tomatillos. Preserve, propagate and enjoy an ethnic heritage. Choose from these strains: Giant Green, Medium Yellow or Medium Purple.

Piper methysticum cultivar 'Black Kava'

Piperaceae. In the pre-conquest past of the Hawaiian islands, many cultivars of the sacred medicine "Ava" were grown. Sadly, many have been lost today, but one of the most potent strains is still secretly cultivated. The Black Kava has stems and veins of jet-purple/black and is several times the potency of commoner varieties. We found the leaves of this form to be as strong as roots of other types. We are able to ship rooted plants of this special cultivar in limited amounts again this year. We had in the past wamed growers to expect this plant to require extremely tropical conditions, and although it thrives under high humidity, wammh and filtered light, it seems more adapted to normal houseplant conditions than we thought. Our strain is getting better adapted to pot culture also, and we feel it could be also successfully grown by many others.

Pogostemon heyneanus 'Patchouli'

Labiatae. Classic fragrance plant of India. Leaves are lime-green and curled, with beautiful purple undersides. Oil glands on the surfaces release the aroma. Grows well in containers, suitable plant for a sunny windowsill or greenhouse. Rewarding and beautiful but rare in collections. Recommended! plant \$12

Psychotria viridis 'Chacruna' 'Amiruca panga'

Rubiaceae. Finally we have a supply of seeds of this important South American medicinal plant. These were collected from a very old specimen up the headwaters of the Rio Pitayacu, in the medicinal garden of a man who said it belonged to his late father, who was a very respected ayahuascero of the region. This bush was about 30' tall and full, a magnificent sight. The leaves proved exceptional. It's very difficult to get good seeds and these require several days of tough rainforest hiking to secure. We've made arrangements to obtain consignments of fresh seeds during the season. Sow seeds 1/4" deep in sterile mix, flush soil with rinses of water periodically. Do not allow to dry out. Soil temp. should be maintained between 70° to 80°F, preferably with bottom heat. Medium bright light. Germination occurs uniformly after 3 to 6 months, so be patient. Seedlings bear glossy, coffee-like foliage and are relatively hardy in pots for many months if kept from chill. Can be maintained as a houseplant, making a beautiful bush. Treat as for indoor coffee specimens.

Rhynchosia species 'Chucumullu'

Leguminosae. These Amazonian tree seeds were gathered by the indigenous forest people of the Galeras Mountains in eastern Ecuador, where they are sought after as charms bringing good luck. It is customary among the tribe to carry a few of these beautiful red and black yin-yang patterned hard seeds at all times as protectors and helpers. They will also give someone they care about a couple seeds as a gift conveying wishes of fortune and prosperity. This is considered an extremely auspicious and beneficial gift to receive, and so we suggest you obtain some for yourself and for bestowing on those you love. They are also viable for germinating to grow in tropical conditions; nick or file the seed coat and soak till swollen. Please note that all Rhynchosia, Oromosia and Erythrina seeds are very poisonous and should be kept from children who could accidentally ingest any. 5 seeds/\$5

Rives corymboss (=Tarbins corymboss) 'Ololiuhqui'
Convulvulaceae. Rare in cultivation outside of remote regions in the southern mountains of Mexico, where the seeds figure into religion as a divine life form. The plant is like a morning glory vine, but can become huge over many years. Needs trellis support. Has clusters of small white flowers which leave a single-seeded pod. Seed is very scarce.

Salvia divinorum 'Pipiltzintzintli' (Wasson & Hofmann clone)
Labiatae. Mysterious sacred plant known only from one small
area of the Mazatec Sierra, where native legends claim it was
introduced to them long ago from elsewhere. Grows only from
cuttings, preferring humidity, shade, cool to warm temperature
and moist, humus soil. Keep reporting as roots get crowded. Very
rare. We find it is very happy in our unheated greenhouse in raised
beds, where it flowers in the late fall on six-foot branches. Leaf
production can be considerable. We suggest adding \$12.50 for
shipment by Overnight Express Mail.

Salvia divinorum 'Palatable clone' 'Ska Pastora'

Labiatae. A collaborator and respected ethnobotanist who has been apprenticing with a Mazatec family for years (one of the few outsiders engaged in such firsthand research) using this enigmatic plant reports the local tradition of healing employs 7-10 or more fresh, chewed leaves (held in the mouth as a quid) to attain the dramatic curing episode. Because of the intense bittemess of S. divinorum, it was with great interest that he has discovered this special patatable strain in use there, with every bit of the activity (if not greater) present, although only very slightly bitter. Although S. divinorum itself is one of the world's rarest plants, this clone has been kept within a single family for untold generations high in the remote mountains. The vulnerability of the cultural heritage as well as the genetic material of indigenous medicines can not be more dramatically represented than in this living plant. We are grateful and excited to make this clone available for preservation and research. Available on a limited basis. Solandra species 'Cup of Gold' 'Kiéri'

Solanaceae. Huge, scented chalice-like flowers to 8" across on a stout lianoid, known to many native healers in the neotropics as a dangerous trance-inducer. A similar species is depicted on many of the famous Huichol yarn paintings: it is the tail plant always shown clinging to rocks with the large flower at the end of leafy stalks. Huichol shamans treat the plant with extreme reverence. An apprentice reports gradually being allowed to approach the wild plants closer each year of training, only allowed to have a leaf to take home after several years of such observance. An awesome omamental ethnobotanical specimen plant.

Solanum macrocarpon

Solanaceae. Exotic bushy plant, spreading 5' wide and 4' tall with large leaves. Native to the Mascarene Islands, where natives eat the cooked leaves as a vegetable and use the fruits (when very small) in cooking or eaten raw. This plant is virtually unknown outside of its native habitat and should be tried by all rare fruit enthusiasts.

Solanum sessiflorum var, sessiliflorum 'Cocona Fruit' Solanaceae. Wild Amazonian fruit, prized in native markets. Tropical shrub to 6' with large velvet leaves. Bears early, continuous crops of tangerine-sized, sub-acid fruits with a long post-harvest shelf life, valued for juicing. This is one of the most typical (and delicious) fruits of the Upper Amazon rainforest peoples. The fruits are usually quartered and boiled, the pulpy juice strained and sweetened. It is so nourishing and tasty with the wild jungle as its flavour. Unknown outside Amazonia.

Tabernaemontana divaricata 'Tagar'

Apocynaceae. Glossy leaves and sweet scented white flowers, growing to a medium sized bush. Does very well in pots as an indoor plant, tolerant of shade. Rich in alkaloids, the very bitter medicinal roots are quick to develop even in small containers. Used in Ayurvedic medicine of India.

Tagetes erecta 'Chempazuchil'

Asteraceae. Gigantic ancestor of modern horticultural marigolds, becoming a six foot, branched bush, covered with tangerine blooms and heavily scented foliage. Something to shock your gardening friends with. A traffic stopper. Collected from a remote Zapotec village in the Oaxacan Sierra, where it is widely used in folk medicine and village ceremonies.

Tagetes lucida 'Pericón'

Asteraceae. Very strong scented wild medicinal marigold species with a chocolate licorice aroma when dried. Coumann rich. Known as a wintertarragon substitute. Used in Zapotec purification rituals, and also as a Huichol shamanic trance 'tobacco' said to be of similar character to their main sacramental plant ally. Makes an excellent flavoring for any type of smoking blend. Easy to grow, short peremial clump.

Tagetes species

Asteraceae. Upon our recent return, after fourteen years, to a Zapotec healer high in the remote Oaxacan sierra, we were intrigued to learn of another Tagetes species, quite similar to T. lucida, which has an overwhelmingly potent odor to the leaves and is said to provide one of the local medicinal herb sources. This one is a very dwarf plant, to 12" with almost pure purple leaves and tiny, clustered flowers. Those interested in T. lucida as an herb will really appreciate this species as well.

Tagetes tubiflora

Asteraceae. Marigolds are often mentioned as companion plants for organic gardening to repel pests. Common 'French' or 'African' marigold species have no such properties. The research has proven this activity is only present to a practical degree in one species, Tagetes tubiflora. This plant grows to several feet, having a pungent odour and bears many, very tiny flowers. It is said to outgrow most weeds and has root secretions which inhibit certain bad weeds, pests and soil nematodes. Will naturalize in most areas, making it effective for orchard crops as an understory cover for mowing.

Tithonia mexicana 'Mexican Sunflower'

Compositae. Many branched bush to 5°, bearing continual and abundant large blooms of a stunning orange-red color. The plant is happy in dry or poor soils. Many customers report it attracts swarms of Monarch butterflies. The flowers last well when cut and make excellent garlands. It has been one of the most commented-upon specimens in our gardens. Choice and easy.

Taxodium mucronatum 'Tulé Tree' 'Moctezuma Cypress' Taxodiacea. This is an extremely graceful cypress-like tree, fast-growing when young, reaching 40' in 14 years with watering, eventually much taller. Partially deciduous in cold zones, otherwise evergreen. These seeds were collected from a sacred specimen in the Valley of Oaxaca: 126' tall, 42' diameter, 636 tons est. weight, over 2000 years old! Raising a directly-descendant daughter seedling of this individual is to be encouraged, linking the life experiences of a being growing through the past two millenia of changes with the coming era. Try starting seedlings ahead of time as an Earth Day resolution ritual celebration of dendritic consciousness for the fast-approaching Year 2000...

Voacanga africana

Apocynaceae. Graceful tropical tree with glossy foliage and highly fragrant blooms. Shamans and healers of the West African rain forests employ the rootbark of this tree as a cerebral stimulant for alertness and endurance during tribal celebrations, dances, ritual ceremonies and long hunting trips. Ibogoid-like alkaloids are present in substantial quantities in the rootbark as well as the seeds. Although the rootbark is employed in folk medicine as a stimulant and heart strengthener, the seeds themselves are reserved for visionary use among the elders. Unknown in cultivation outside its habitat, this is the first time seeds have been available. Grow as for Tabernaemontana, a close relative. seed packet \$10

Withania somnifera 'Ashvaganda' 'Kuthmithi'

Solanaceae. Curious sprawling bush with incredible beneficial properties. It is one of the big crop species of Ayurvedic medicine in India, where the root is employed as a tranquilizing narcotic and ginseng-like tonic safe enough for use with children. In other tropical lands, the leaves are used to kill head lice and the entire herb is made into a painkilling tea. The chinese-lantem-like pods bear small orange berries from which a soap is made. Easy and fast from seed, producing a low bush laden with flowers and fruits. Fairly cold-hardy, regrowing from the extensive root system after winter domancy.

Coryphantha macromeris

This is the famous 'dona ana' cactus of native Mexican ethnopharmacology. Clustering habit, forming large mounds of multiple heads. Endangered in the wild. 100/\$5

Echinocereus triglochidiatus

This beautiful specimen forms clustered mounds to a maximum height of 2 feet, bears great quantities of brilliant scarlet red, cup shaped blooms. Trichocereus spp of Ethnopharmacologic Interest Each of these hardy Trichocereus species are excellent as grafting stock for smaller, slower, low-growing cacti. These are also the 'best' types in terms of their known properties for ethnopharmacological specimen collectors. Trichocereus are the fastest growing cacti, very easy from seed. Within 12-18 months quantities of vigorous stock can be raised to sizes which are the equivalent of beginning by vegetative cuttings, but in far less space and at considerable savings. Researchers should note that genetic variation between seedling individuals will give rise to interesting new characteristics (ie. rate of growth, hardiness, bioactivity) unobtainable from cloned populations or cuttings.

Trichocereus hybrids


We had the opportunity to cross-pollinate some of the interesting *Trichocereus*, species in our greenhouse and have good seed available. These represent completely new hybrids and will display a range of genetic expression never before seen. The parent species of each of these hybrids were dwarf, clumping *Trichocereus* species (and hybrids) in the *T. smrzianus* and *T. validus* complex. Flower color will range from crimson red to indescent pink and magenta. These new hybrids are vigorous growers, forming a central, short column encircled with many smaller pups and will be very free-flowering at an early age. We have 2 different hybrids: choose #1 or #2 ... 50 seeds/\$5

Cacti are amazingly easy from seed. Many species will sprout within two weeks and grow rapidly into clean, healthy stock specimens. In some cases this is the only way to obtain rare species, as wild-collecting has threatened many with extinction. Many interesting cactus species have been listed under endangered plant laws, making it illegal to buy or sell any specimens which might have originated as wild stock. Growing cactus seedlings is an easy, inexpensive way to have thousands of specimens of even the rarer kinds, which could not only protect them from extinction, but creates a living 'bank account' of very saleable specimens which increase in value with each year of age. We suggest you sow a cactus investment for your children to inherit. Here is how it's done...

Sow the seeds an inch apart on the surface of moist, shredded sphagnum moss or sterilized, moist, sifted cactus mix. Cover the tray or pot with a plastic bag, which must then be perfectly sealed. Tupperware sandwich boxes with translucent snap-lids are ideal, instead of pots. Place in bright, but indirect light at 65-85° F. No further watering is needed since the mini-greenhouse created by the bag can't evaporate moisture. Beware of extreme heat, which can cook the seedlings. Check to make sure the soil surface is

staying moist. A fungicide may be needed.

Most cactus seeds will germinate in two weeks or so. They will look like little green bodies at first, but relatively quickly the characteristics of the species will show. The plastic bag or lid may be opened occasionally for airing and watering, and as soon as they are 3/4" or so (60-90 days) they may be potted up individually. Handle their roots very cautiously and try to sink the seedling lower into the soil to prevent shocking the transplant with drier surface conditions. Use a general cactus mix and water as needed during warm weather, much less if cool.



Trichocereus pachanei 'San Pedre Cactus'

San Pedro is a large columnar cactus of unusually rapid growth (12-18"/year) and is tolerant of a broad range of conditions. It is especially popular as a specimen because of its near lack of spines and its lovely, hypnotic, huge 10" night-blooming flowers which fill the air with their heavenly, quite unforgettable fragrance. Prefers rich, drained composted soil, abundant watering and full sun. Tolerant of frost. Does well indoors in pots. Easy to cultivate. We generally ship this hardy species year-round. Healthy, well-rooted 6"-10" specimens in vigorous growth.



Indigenous to coastal rainforests of West and Central Africa, the seeds of this beautiful tree have been prized for their powerful stimulant effects. This powder contains between 1% and 3.5% caffeine (usually about 2%). Theobromine is also present in amounts just under one percent.

The effects usually are first noticed as an increase in depth of breathing accompanied by spine tingling rushes of energy which begin in the lower back and swirl up to the base of the head, climaxing with a tightening of the scalp and a feeling of the hair standing on end. It can range from a quick flash up the spine to a full-on, one-by-one opening of the chakras as a kundalini-like mobilization of vital force rises to the crown of the head. QUARARIBEA FUNEBRIS FLOWERS

The Spanish chronicless of conquest times recorded the use of entheogenic chocolate beverages by Aztec priests in ritual, as well as by the public for celebration. The mystery has remained regarding the exact ingredients. Some scholars theorize a standard chocolate potion was the vehicle for ingestion of many medicaments as additives, such as the sacred mushrooms and ololiuhqui seeds. Others hold that there must be some part of the potion itself with such activity. Richard Schultes has published a series of articles implicating the dried flowers of Quararibea funebris. 
