

Tarot - The Royal Road

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Preface

I wrote this manual, titled The Royal Road, back in the mid-1980's. At that time, I could find very little information on the Thoth Tarot, and Crowley's book proved a far bit over my head for those early stages of my development. Still, I wanted a resource I could use, especially when reading for myself, as well as one I could give to a friend who also wanted to learn to read this deck. So, I scoured bookstores for the few books I could find on the subject, took from them what resonated with me, and added my own insights and experiences as time went by. I did a rewrite in 1991, but haven't touched it since then. As I look through some of its pages, I realize it's probably time it went through a whole new rewrite in order to add updates and insights I've gained with this deck over the past 11 years. However, I fear that will have to wait now until I have a considerable block of free time; perhaps during a winter vacation spend snowbound at home.

In this website, I have classified the Tarot as an Art separate and apart from the Craft. This is deliberate on my part. The Craft is our spiritual path. The Tarot is not an integral tenet of that path, but rather a tool to aid anyone who has an open mind and seeking heart. You don't have to be Pagan to read the cards, though we may have a headstart in understanding the energies, elemental influences and, with the Thoth deck at least, the astrological and numerological correspondences of the cards. The most important aspect of learning to read, however, is teaching yourself to stay open to possibilities; to step away from yourself and allow the Higher Power to work through you via the cards.

I am very intense on the subject of ethics and responsibility where reading the cards is concerned. Hope and guidance can come from a properly interpreted spread; but great damage can be done when they're read haphazardly or with a hidden agenda. As a reader, you have a responsibility to the person for whom you're reading, to the Power channeling knowledge through the cards to you, and also to

yourself. The Rede and the Karmic Laws are not suspended when you sit down to do a reading.

Take what knowledge you may of this work, but realize the many hours that went into compiling and writing it. I have no problem if you want to use this work in your own study, or if you want to use pieces of it on your own website. All I ask is that you credit me as the author. Other than that, I hope it serves you well.

Personally, I want to thank a very special friend of mine who helped make it possible to move this book to the website. Mike spent many long hours proofing, scanning, and doing the coding on most of this tome of mine. I appreciate his dedication to the task, and congratulate him on a job done most excellently! Introduction

The Tarot has been used as playing cards and as predictive tools in Egyptian, Indian, and European nations for centuries. The ancient mystery orders used the Major Arcana as gateways to higher self knowledge via meditation. This book can be of assistance with the Tarot as either a predictive measure or as a tool for self-actualization. However, I do not endorse the use of the Tarot as a toy, and strongly caution against it.

This book is not a history of the Tarot through the ages; that will have to wait until a later date. Instead, this manual will hopefully be of assistance in interpreting the meaning of each card itself, as well as to how each relates to the others. In order to give you a broader foundation, the cards are presented with not only the accepted interpretations, but also with reference to Astrology, Numerology, Planetary and Elemental Influences, the Hebrew language, and card symbology. This will enable you to provide a fuller, more personal interpretation.

The Thoth deck is packed with symbology, perhaps more so than any other deck on the market today. At times the colors and figures can seem overwhelming. Most of the cards have both an outer and an inner symbology; the inner symbology is best understood in a meditative state. It is because of their rich symbology, as well as the fact that it was designed by Aleister Crowley, that many people see this deck as a 'dark' deck. However, no object is inherently evil in and of itself. It is the practitioner who determines whether it will be used for good or evil; the cards themselves are neutral, simply absorbing your energy.

For this reason, I advise NOT to attempt a reading when you are depressed or angry. The cards will reflect your negativity and give an inaccurate reading. This is true for any extreme state of mind, including joy and elation. Your mind must be clear to read the cards accurately. Remember, you are simply the channel and the cards the medium in an altruistic purpose.

It goes without saying that you should never purposely misinterpret or skew a reading. There will be times, especially when reading for people you love, that you will want to speak to them through the cards. You must resist this temptation. Remember, you are only the channel.

Interpreting the Tarot can be a source of great joy, but you must always treat the cards with dignity and accept the inherent responsibilities. I've listed below a few of these responsibilities which were gained through years of experience.

- The Tarot has an aura unto itself. Except for those sensory cues that aid you in emptying your thoughts and emotions, keep the "trappings" confined to magic festivals and faires. You have a responsibility to introduce your clients to the higher aspects of the Tarot, and to dispel society's fears of us.
- Always try to make your client feel comfortable. A first-timer doesn't know what to expect. This can be a fearful step for him, for he is asserting both his need and his independence in seeking your help. Take time to talk about his worldly affairs.

Explain in simple, mundane terms what you are doing and why. Let him know what he can expect, and eliminate any unrealistic expectations.

- Many clients will want to fashion you into their own personal "guru." Do not allow them to fall into this trap. Each person must walk his own path, no matter how fearful or distasteful that may be. Do not tell them what to do (although this is probably what they want). You should advise him only of current trends and possible outcomes. All decisions are theirs to make. Telling them what to do deprives them of the lessons they must learn and puts you in the unenviable position of working through their karma yourself!
- Limit the number of readings any person can have in the course of a month. Frequent readings are inadvisable for two reasons. One, it is a sign that the person is becoming too dependent upon you and is beginning to abdicate his decision-making rights. Two, events must have time to develop. Frequent readings can confuse the issue. The spread can begin to look like garbage, and the client will go away believing you are a fraud. I limit readings to no more than twice a month, and attempt to keep it to once a month.
- You have a responsibility to help the person reach his full potential. In this regard, accentuate the positive in a spread and soften the negative. Phrase the hard times as challenges, and reinforce the belief that for every ending there is a new beginning. You are there to give hope and love. Remember that above all else.
- Always treat the cards with dignity. They are a voice through which your Guide speaks to you. This channel is an all important one, for through the cards you are attempting to help another. The burden of responsibility should not be taken lightly.

**Understanding Your Deck
or... What to do before you try reading the cards!**

Choosing a Tarot Deck

Perhaps the most difficult task when you begin is in finding a deck that "speaks" to you. There are many decks available; be prepared to go through several before you find "yours." Your deck should immediately feel familiar, and you should be able to intuitively understand the symbolism. Above all, you should feel comfortable using it.

After finding your deck, take the time to perform a cleansing and centering ritual with your cards. This ritual eliminates any negative energy the cards may have absorbed through the manufacturing, wrapping, handling, and merchandising processes. It will also bathe the cards in your energy, and attune them to your intentions.

Following is the ritual I have performed on my cards. Use it if you wish; modify it as it suits your purpose.

Cleansing and Centering Ritual

Ritual Ingredients:

- Orris root (whole or crushed)
- The cloth that will protect your cards
- A quiet place where you will not be disturbed

Ritual:

- When you are in your quiet place, meditate on your purpose until you feel at one with it.
- Take each card, one at a time, and hold it and the orris root firmly between your palms.
- Gently rub the card with the orris root, saying, "All negative energy from this card is dispelled. This card is now attuned to me and will only be used for the good of all."
- After you have cleansed all 78 cards, wrap them in the cloth.

The Cloth

The color of the cloth you choose is not important. Pick a color that is attuned you or to your spiritual goals. Some examples are listed below.

Red for physical
power or love

Yellow for friendship

Blue for spiritual
healing and serenity

Purple for recognition of and
praise to the Higher Power

White for purity

Black for spiritual power

Although I have listed the color black, I caution against using it. This color has its own drawing power, and you may find yourself drawn into unnecessary situations. It also tends to reinforce the misperceptions of non-pagans.

Other points to consider regarding the cloth and your cards include:

Ensure that is large enough for a full layout.

ALWAYS keep your cards wrapped. This prevents influence from surrounding vibrations.

ALWAYS do your reading on your cloth for protection against surrounding vibrations.

If possible, store your wrapped cards in a wooden box.

Never allow anyone to handle your cards except the person for whom you are doing a reading.

Structure of the Tarot

The Tarot consists of 78 cards, divided into two categories: the Major and Minor Arcanas.

The **Major Arcana** consists of 22 cards, know as Trumps. These are the spiritual cards of the deck, dealing with the inner persona. They represent the universal forces of Nature, and trace an individual's spiritual progression as depicted in the Qabbalah, i.e., the 22 steps of the path from the material world back to the spiritual kingdom of God.

Spiritual readings are done using *only* the Major Arcana. Although they give insight into hidden talents as well as to an individual's karma, be cautious when giving a spiritual reading. Many people will turn a blind eye when confronted with truth. This is when you need to stress the positive and explain the negative in terms of positive challenges. Realize that the self-fulfilling prophecy is a psychological fact. If an individual is told something often enough, he will incorporate it into his personality. Remember, your goal is to help people become more than they are, not to give them the assurance that it's OK to stagnate.

The **Minor Arcana** consists of 56 cards representing the physical/material side of life. It is divided into four suits, with the numbers corresponding to a deck of regular playing cards. Each suit has four Court Cars: The Knight, the Queen, the Prince, and the Princess. The suits represent each of the attributes listed below.

One of the four elements: earth, air, fire, or water

A facet of daily life

The three signs of the zodiac ruled by the named element

One of the four letters of the Tetragrammaton

The **Suits** and the their respective attributes are listed in the table below.

Each set of **Court Cards** is also ruled by a particular element. The assignments are as follows.

All Princesses are assigned to the element of Earth.

All Princes are assigned to the element of Fire.

All Queens are assigned to the element of Water.

All Knights are assigned to the element of Air.

With reference to elemental values, we can assign "names" to each of these Court Cards. These names reflect each card's essence, its personality. Thus, the ruler of a particular Court set works through each of the Royal's elements. For example, The Princess of Wands would be Earth working through the Element of Fire (Earth rules the set of Princesses' and Fire rules the suit of Wands.). This would show some grounding (or smothering, dependent upon the surrounding cards) of a message or aspect relating to a business enterprise. Knowing these elemental attributes This is particularly helpful when choosing a Significator. Understanding the essence of each of the court cards will assist you when interpreting them in a spread. Through the court cards you will be able to judge how the individual is dealing with events, and whether the ensuing events will be negative or positive for the individual in question. The table below lists the "names" of each of the Royalty.

In addition to the elemental values, each card is also assigned a Numerological correspondent and an individual numerical value. It is important to keep these two concepts separate in your mind.

Numerical values are derived from the face value of the card, with the notable exception of the Ace.

Major Arcana cards are number 0-21, using Roman numerals.

Minor Arcana cards 2-10 take the full face value of their card. Thus, the Two of Wands would hold a numerical value of 2.

Aces ALWAYS take the numerical value of 5.

Princesses ALWAYS take the numerical value of 7.

All other court cards (Queens, Princes, and Knights) ALWAYS take the numerical value of 4.

Numerological Correspondents

The Numerological Correspondent helps to clarify the essence of the card. Numerology deals mainly with the number 1-9; beyond 9, the numbers are written in unreduced/reduced format. Therefore, "10" would be written as 10/1 (the essence of the working through the God Power of 0). In this way, all 78 cards are represented by their own unique Numerological correspondent.

Although a working knowledge of Numerology is helpful, it is not necessary in order to interpret the cards. The Numerological attributes simply help to give a richer reading.

Astrological Correspondents

The last major set of attributes pertain to the Astrological values. Each card is represented by a specific Astrological correspondent. These include the sign of the Zodiac, planets, and elements. Again, knowledge of Astrology is not necessary, but helpful.

Perhaps a brief summary of all the general attributes would be helpful at this point.

Major Arcana cards, numbered 0-21 in Roman numerals, are spiritual in Nature.

Minor Arcana cards, numbered 2-10, are divided into four suits which encompass the aspects of mundane life, and take the face value of the card.

Each suit has an Elemental ruler.

Each set of Court cards is assigned an Elemental ruler which works through the suit of the particular Court card.

Each card is assigned a(n):

Astrological correspondent

Numerical value

Numerological correspondent

In addition to the attributes previously listed, the ACES also have attributes that are theirs alone. They denote both season and direction. They are the time cards of the Tarot.

In order to determine in which week of the season represented an event will occur, look to the first numbered (Minor Arcana) card **preceding** the Ace. For example, if the 5 of Pentacles immediately preceded the Ace of Wands, you could expect a change near the fifth week of Spring (April, May, June). Since the card preceding was the five of Pentacles, the change would be in the individual's financial, business, or career sector.

Some readers believe that the directions each Ace rules also represent the direction from which the change will appear. Following is a table denoting each Ace, the respective season, and the respective direction.

Card Placements: Dignified vs. Ill-Dignified

Although there is disagreement on this point, I believe that each card has two separate and distinct meanings. When a card is Upright it is said to be "Dignified" and showing positive aspects. When the card is in the Reverse position (upside-down) it is said to be "Ill-Dignified"

and showing negative aspects. I further believe that the Ill-Dignified cards may also represent the inner, hidden self. This aspect consists of emotions, thoughts, and dreams that the individual has not been willing to acknowledge in reference to his question. With reference to an event, Ill-Dignified cards usually represent a time delay.

The following examples show a few of the differences in meaning that occur between Dignified and Ill-Dignified cards. Please understand that these are not set in stone, nor do they cover all possibilities. They are generalizations, at best.

As you study the definitions of the cards in the second half of this manual, you will be tempted to label different cards as either good or bad. Try to avoid this; there are no "good" or "bad" cards. Even cards such as the Devil, Death, and The Tower have positive effects. These cards test our strength, patience, and moral fiber. They are the cards of abrupt change, and often the rewards gained because of them are worth the hardships endured.

You should also be aware that there are alternatives to everything I've stated on this page. Some readers *firmly* believe that all cards should be read for upright meanings only, that reverse positions have absolutely no meaning. Everyone is entitled to their beliefs. Find which method is right for you, and if down the road it no longer feels correct, do not be afraid to change. The Tarot is a learning tool, as much for you as for the individual who is coming to you for assistance.

Choosing a Significator

Power Positions

The first concern in a reading is the seating arrangements. Each of the four cardinal points has its own distinctive "power," and there has developed two modes of thought of how best to utilize these energies in a reading.

One mode of belief is to have the individual face West. You, the reader, would then be facing East. The reasoning behind this lies with the belief that East is the direction of all beginnings and, as such, is a strong power position. Also, the Querent may be more open and accepting of what the reader tells him if he is facing West, traditionally the Watchtower of Water, the ruler of emotions and a naturally nurturing, feminine energy.

The second mode of thought is to have the reader face North, the original Power Position, and the individual face South. My problem with this mode lies in my placement of Watchtowers. For me, North is Earth. I see (and feel) this as a grounding of the reader, at a time when the reader needs to let go of his "little" self. It also puts the querent facing South, the position of Fire, traditionally the ruler of strength, action, and fiery emotions.

Either of these modes is as valid as the other, however; as is any other that works for you. Only personal, practical experimentation will help you make that determination.

Choosing a Significator

Find any five readers, and you will find five different ways to choose a Significator. A Significator is that one particular card that symbolizes the person asking for a reading. About the only thing readers will agree on is that the Significator should be a Court card, and even then some take exception!

As far as human attributes are concerned, each of the court cards represents a coloring and temperament for a man or woman. Knights and Queens are said to represent men and women who have been or are married. Princes and Princesses represent men and women who have never been married. Princesses can also represent children, male and female.

Many readers base their choice of significators on the physical characteristics just outlined, much the same way as Cartomancy readers choose their significators. They will actually thumb through the deck in search of the Knight or Queen, Prince or Princess whose symbolic coloring and marital status most closely resembles their clients. If it works for them, OK. However, I prefer to let the Tarot itself choose the Significator.

My method involves matching the *personality traits* of the Court Card to the individual, *not* the physical characteristics. I base this method on the firm belief that the Tarot deals with inner vibrations and emotions. These are intangible, changeable qualities. The appearance of an individual usually has very little bearing on a situation, but how a person feels about it **does** impact most significantly. Therefore, I allow the Tarot to choose the proper Significator and clue me in to the emotional disposition of this individual. Remember, you are only the channel; keep yourself open to all possibilities. Allow the Higher Power to speak to you and through you.

Natural to this method is the possibility of more than one significator, dependent upon the individual's question. This ambiguity is necessary because each of us has more than one personality, depending upon the circumstances at the time. For example, we may behave soft and gentle in our domestic role, yet assertive and

aggressive in the office. It would then make sense that the Significator for a question pertaining to domestic life would be different than the one chosen for a question about the career sector.

My beliefs concerning Significators demanded this unique method of discovering the correct one. I found that letting the Tarot choose the appropriate significator opened a clear and unbiased channel. It also provided me with a litmus test as to the difficulty of the reading, or if I should even attempt one at all. Three failed attempts to find a significator meant that I should postpone the reading. It disappoints a few people and even angers some, but responsibility and integrity are foremost when doing a reading.

I will outline my method in the following paragraphs. Again, as with everything in this manual, experiment with it. If it doesn't feel right, don't do it. Use what you can, and change what needs to be changed for you.

1. Read the individual's body language. This is important in knowing how much you can safely say.
2. The next step is to have the person shuffle his question into the cards. Ask him to concentrate on his question as clearly as possible as he shuffles, shutting off all other thoughts. Tell him to continue shuffling until it feels right to stop.
3. While he is shuffling the deck, you should clear your mind and focus on the task at hand. I always say a little "prayer" that I may be a clear channel and give to the individual what he needs.
4. When he has finished shuffling, ask him to cut the deck into four stacks to his left.
5. At this point, lightly touch your fingertips to the tips of his fingers. This enables you to "feel" his energy. The fingertips are the nexus of the life-force. You may feel heat, electricity, or emotions. Don't worry if it takes you a few times to experience this, just keep practicing.

6. After you have picked up on his vibrations, place your fingertips on the four stacks. One should feel radiate his vibration. That will be the stack with his Significator.

I find that this ritual works best if your eyes are closed from the time your hands first touch his until you have chosen the appropriate stack. This way, you avoid unnecessary sensory interference.

Types of Readings

Although there are various layouts that can be utilized in a reading, all questions posed will be one of two natures, Spiritual or Mundane.

Spiritual readings use only the 22 cards of the Major Arcana. They give a much more intensely personal response to questions dealing with personality, spiritual growth, and past lives. Therefore, caution should be heeded before attempting this type of reading. Due to the inherent intensity, the readings can invoke powerful, profound emotions in some individuals. These emotions can make for a very uncomfortable session at times, inhibiting your ability to keep a clear channel. If this occurs, it's best to stop the reading and offer apologies; nothing productive is likely to be discovered if you find yourself "caught up" in someone else's emotional state!

There are other reasons for exercising caution about doing a Spiritual reading for someone. These reasons are based on human nature. No one likes to be told all the negative aspects of his personality, even if he did come to you asking "What's wrong with me?" In the middle of the reading, he is apt to either start disagreeing with you or offering excuses -- neither of which is conducive to a good, accurate reading.

In addition to the above cautions, it should also be noted that you do not give a Past Life reading to someone who does not believe in reincarnation. The subject is merely a curiosity at best and a joke at worst to these people, and can only serve to promote a "circus atmosphere" in the individual's eyes.

Despite these cautions, Spiritual readings can and should be given when appropriate. They're invaluable in helping an individual understand where he is now, how he got here, and where he's headed. Spiritual readings can point out latent talents and gifts, and help an individual find the Path best suited for him.

Not all questions answered by this type of reading will fit neatly into a niche called "Spiritual Questions." Often, the question to be answered can seem rooted in the physical world. It will be up to you as the reader to decide which type of reading, Mundane or Spiritual, can best answer the question, as well as which type of reading will be best received by the individual. Queries such as, "Why am I always scraping by for money?" may sound rooted in the physical, yet the answer may actually be found within the personality, experiences, and/or karma of the individual. Judge the nature of the individual as best you can. If the individual is skeptical and/or not spiritually inclined, a reading with a spiritual foundation would likely be lost on him. This individual wants the more practical, material responses of a Mundane reading. Allow the Tarot to speak to the individual on his level of understanding, not yours; don't overwhelm the individual. Remember, a preschooler learns nothing from a high school class.

Mundane Readings

Mundane Readings are the most basic readings, dealing with practical, day-to-day issues. They utilize all 78 cards of the Major and Minor Arcanas, and will probably answer the majority questions you'll ever be asked. Examples of the types of queries they answer include those concerning love, money, and career, as well as other earth-rooted questions.

You'll find a multitude of layouts for Mundane spreads readily available. Chief among these are the Celtic Cross and the Modified Celtic Cross. Others include the Daily Spread, the Astrological Spread, the Planetary Answering Spread, the Sixteen Card Spread, the Thoth Spread, and the Cabalistic Spread.

Each layout has its own merits and drawbacks. It's not absolutely necessary to find one single spread and use it exclusively every time

you lay out the cards. Even though I, personally, find it advantageous to have a thorough knowledge of one particular layout, I experiment with others layouts from time to time. An alternative spread can help you see things from different angles and new perspectives at times, especially when the cards seem unclear or not particularly helpful on a given question.

Past Life Readings

The Past Life reading can give insight into the very basic question of "Why am I here?" It can help to point out hidden talents, attitudes, and karma that the individual has brought into this lifetime. It can also gives clues as to what should be accomplished in this lifetime.

A modified Celtic Cross spread is used for this reading; only cards in Positions One through Six are laid out on the table. The positions and definitions of each position are outlined below.

SIGNIFICATOR This is the Major Arcana card chosen to represent the individual. It is symbolic of the Soul's essence; it's true being.

POSITION ONE Covers the Significator. This card represents the individual's current state of being.

POSITION TWO Crosses Position One. This card represents the talents (and Karma) the individual has brought into this lifetime.

POSITION Is placed below Positions

THREE	One and Two. This card represents the individual's purpose for incarnation, his destiny.
POSITION FOUR	Is placed to the left of Positions One and Two, and represents the lessons of the most influential lifetime and their impact upon the current lifetime.
POSITION FIVE	Is placed above Positions One and Two and represents the individual's future in this lifetime.
POSITION SIX	Is placed to the right of Positions One and Two and represents the next lifetime, if nothing changes the patterns laid down in the current life so far.

Spiritual Readings

The Spiritual reading is similar to the Past Life reading in they both use only the Major Arcana and both deal with the inner person, the soul essence of an individual. However, while the Past Life reading is an excellent way of discovering latent talents, seeing the pros and cons of an issue in the overall scheme of the Universe, and in realizing where one fits into that Universal plan, the Spiritual reading can cut to the heart of a particular problem area. It can illustrate most graphically the situation entrapping an individual. The Spiritual reading can give insights into what is causing a problem or pattern,

what can be done to break the cycle, and the type of growth that can be expected after the issue is resolved. This type of reading falls under what I call "Psychotarotology," for it calls on the Reader to blend the spiritual essence of the cards with an innate instinct for human psychology.

Be aware that this spread does not always "work" for every individual. Further, there are times in life when answers are seemingly purposefully withheld from us. During these times, we must use our intuition and the knowledge we've gleaned from our past experiences to make decisions. It is at these times that trust in ourselves and the gods is most important.

SIGNIFICATOR	This is the Major Arcana card chosen to represent the individual. It is symbolic of the Soul's essence; it's true being.
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POSITION ONE	This card Covers the Significator; it symbolizes the person as he is now. It could be representative of his current emotional state or a dominant personality trait.
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POSITION TWO	This card Crosses the person for better or worse. It symbolizes what has caused the crisis and often reveals the outer aspects of the test.
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POSITION THREE	This is the Basis card, symbolizing the why the crisis has occurred.
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POSITION FOUR	This card represents the Past, and shows emotions and/or behaviors that should either be avoided or utilized during this crisis period.
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POSITION FIVE	This card Crowns the person. It's position represent a path that either may have been tried or will yet be tried.
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POSITION SIX	This is the card of the Immediate Future. It shows the immediate consequences of this test if the person continues on the path he is currently following.
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POSITION SEVEN	This is the card of Personal Negativity. It represents the emotion and/or behavior that is binding the person to this test; why he can't seem to move pass it.
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POSITION EIGHT	Position Eight shows the Influence of Others
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on the situation. It reflects current influences over the situation and whether or not the person should heed them.

POSITION
NINE

This is the card of Hopes and Fears. It should tell you how the person really feels about the crisis.

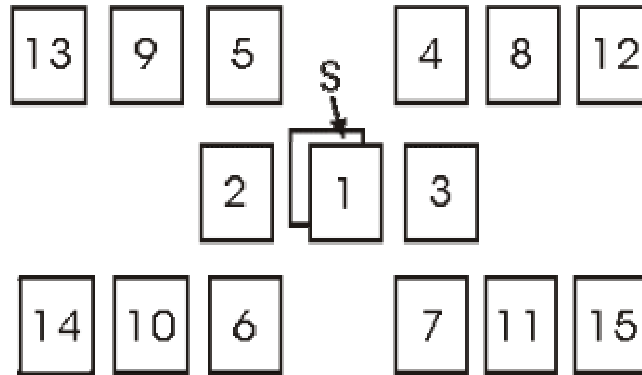
POSITION TEN

This last card demonstrates the Final Outcome of the test if no other variables enter into the situation.

Instructions for Sixteen Card Spread

1. Lay out the spread as diagrammed.
2. Begin the reading with Card Number 1. This card represents the primary concern and present situation.
3. Cards 2 and 3 should be read next. These cards give further information into the primary question. They also give insight into personality aspects, especially if one or both cards are Major Arcana cards.
4. Cards 14, 10, and 6 (in that order) should be read next. These cards give background information; how the situation evolved.
5. Cards 7, 11, and 15 (in that order) are read next. These cards show the influence of others on the situation.
6. Cards 4, 8, and 12 (in that order) are read next. They show the direction of progress in the situation. They should be read with reference to cards 7, 11, and 15.

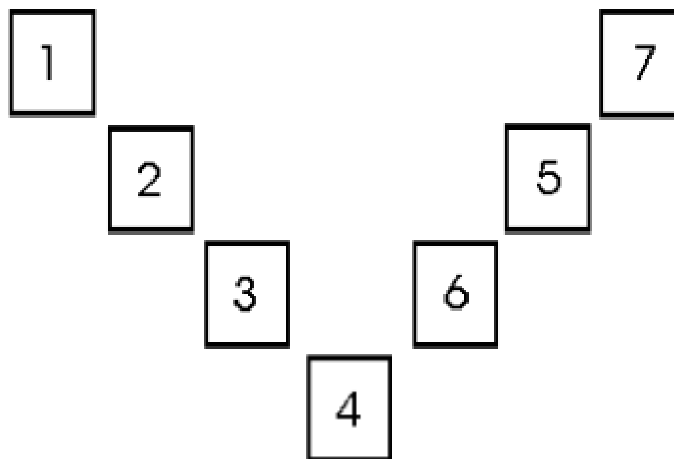
The direction of progress towards change is indicated if at least two of the cards in set 7, 11, and 15 and two of the cards in set 4, 8, and 12 are Minor Arcana Cards. However, if more than one card in either set is a Major Arcana card, then the situation will definitely progress in

the direction shown. A majority of Major Arcana cards in these two sets symbolize that no alternative action may be taken.

7. Cards 13, 9, and 5 (in that order) are read next. These cards show alternate possibilities, if any.

NOTE: If the card set 4, 8, and 12, or the card set 7, 11, and 15 consist primarily of the Major Arcana, the card set 13, 9, and 5 will indicate how the outcome may be mitigated or assisted.

The Seven Card Ellipse Spread

This spread is good for asking about a project. The basic question that will be answered is "What is to be done?"

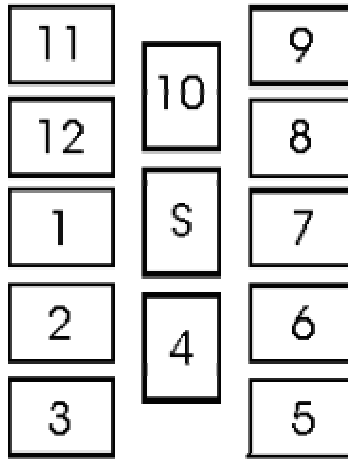
1. Shuffle the cards and fan them out in front you, face down.

2. Draw seven cards. Do not turn them face up.
3. Shuffle these seven cards and lay them out as shown in the diagram on the preceding page.
4. Turn them over, one by one.

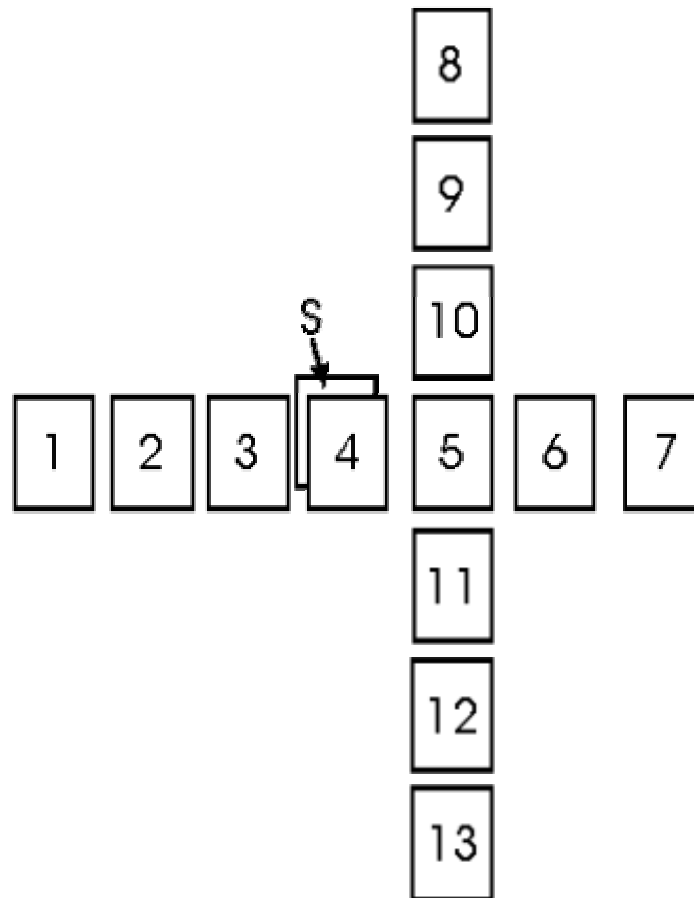

Each card is read and interpreted on its own, without reference to the surrounding cards. For a more in-depth reading, deal four cards per each position and read from within each block. The cards may be dealt either four-at-a-time per position, or by following the diagram four times around, whichever seems correct at the time.

The Cabalistic Spread

This layout is designed to give an overall picture of a situation. It includes the past, present, and future circumstances, as well as the feelings and attitudes of the people involved in the situation. Any question posed with this spread must be general in nature. This is NOT an answering spread.

- Card 4 is placed on top of the Significator. It represents the individual's state of mind. This card should be read

BEFORE the other cards.

- Cards 13, 12, and 11 should be read next (starting at 13). This card set gives the **influences of the past three months** on this situation. Card 13 is considered to be the farthest away in time.
- Cards 1, 2, and 3 should be read next (beginning with 1). This card set symbolizes **present circumstances**.
- Cards 10, 9, and 8 should be read next (starting with 10). These cards represent **future circumstances**. Card 8 is considered to be the farthest away in time.
- Cards 5, 6, and 7 should be read next. These cards represent the **feelings of other people involved in the situation**. These cards often contrast with the information in Card 4.

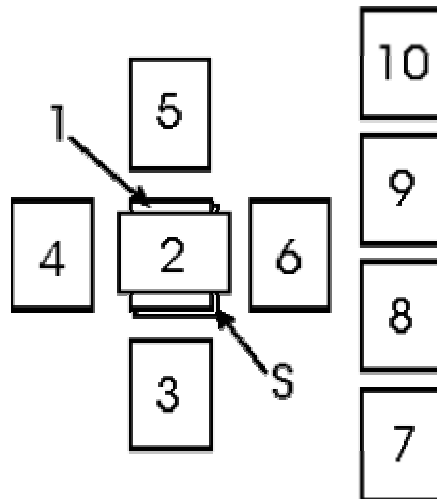
NOTE

There are three ways to read this layout, and the spread should be read all three ways.

- Reading the circumstances upon their own merits, card by card.
- Read the spread in light of the feelings of others.
- Contrasting the above with the attitude of the individual.

When the layout is read in each of the three ways, it produces a good, accurate picture of a situation. You will be surprised at how the 'feeling' of the reading changes as you approach it from each of these different angles.

Spreads and Interpretations



The Celtic Cross Spread

Significator: This is the first card laid on the table, chosen from the four-stack cut as previously defined. Card 1 lays on top of the Significator.

Card 1: Represents the situation as it is now.

Card 2: Represents what is crossing the situation, for good or bad.

Card 3: Represents the basis of the question.

Card 4: Represents the past. It could be either the distant past that is influencing the situation, or a situation that is currently passing away.

Card 5: Represents what crowns and could possibly come into being, i.e., an alternative course of action.

Card 6: Represents the near future. If Cards 5 and 6 are complementary, Card 5 does not represent an alternate path, but strengthens the probability of Card 6.

Card 7: Represents negative emotional/personality aspects that are influencing the situation; i.e., "what holds him back."

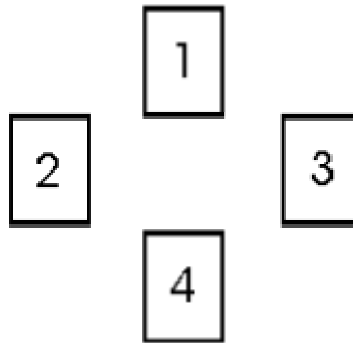
Card 8: Represents the influence of significant others upon

the situation.

Card 9: Represents the clients deepest hopes/fears about the situation.

Card 10: Represents the final outcome.

The Clarification Spread

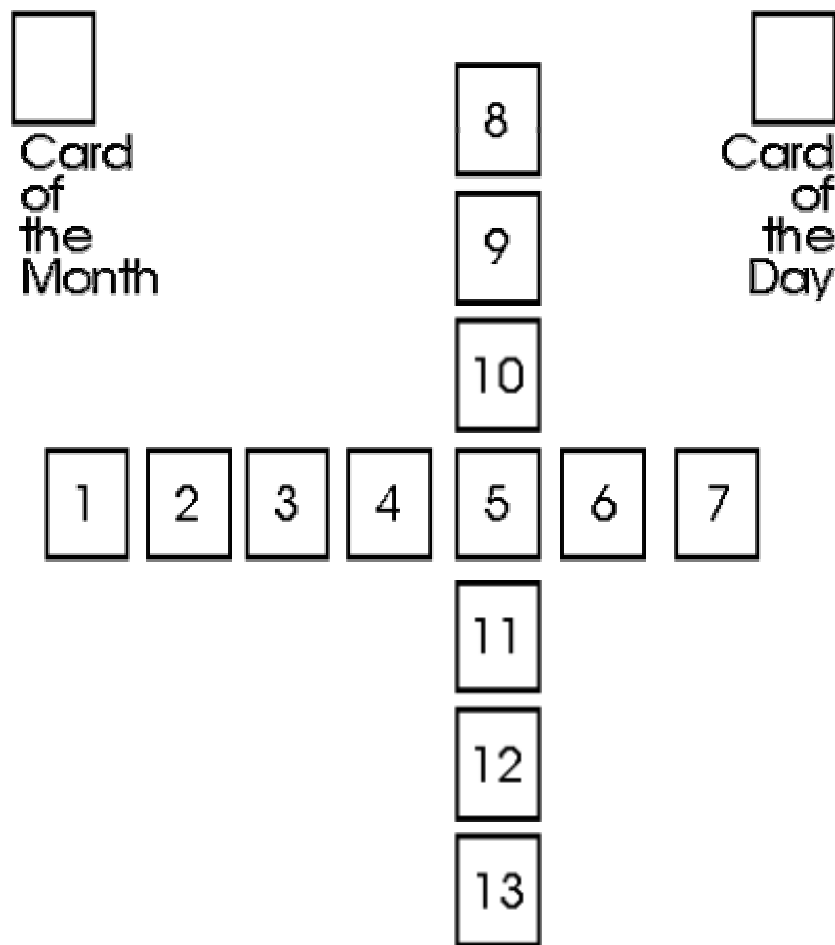
1. Shuffle the cards and cut them into two piles. The pile on your left represents the passive, emotional side. The pile on your right represents the active, intellectual side.
2. Shuffle the left stack again. Lay the top card in Position 2, and the bottom card in Position 3.
3. Shuffle the right stack again. Lay the top card in Position 1, and the bottom card in Position 4.

Interpretation

1. The card in Position 1 shows the actual basis of the question; what is really going on.
2. The card in Position 2 shows what you are open to. It shows the people, events, and energies that you are attracting.

3. The card in Position 3 shows what you are outwardly expressing to others. It shows your influence on your environment.
4. The card in Position 4 shows the answer. It shows the way in which the problem can be overcome, or suggests a way around it. III-Dignified cards in this position show the possible end of a negative condition or attitude.

The Daily Spread

1. Determine which card will represent the current month.

Lay it, dignified, on the left side of the table.

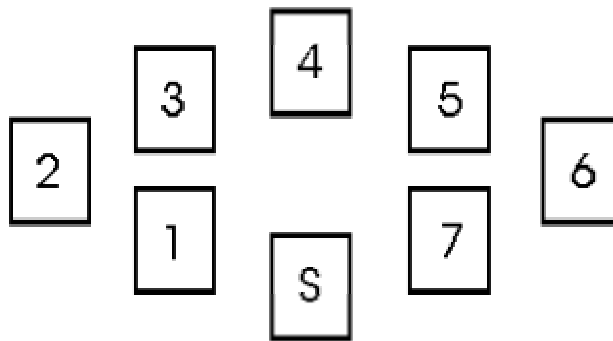
2. Determine which card will represent the current day. Lay it, dignified, on the opposite side of the table.
3. Lay out the cards according to the diagram above.
 - A. Cards 11 through 13 represent events leading up to the day in question. They should be read bottom to top (Card 13 to Card 11).
 - B. Cards 1 through 3 represent events of the morning of the day in question. These three cards should be read from left to right (Card 1 begins).
 - C. Cards 5 through 7 represent events of the afternoon of the day in question. They should be read from right to left (begin with Card 7 and end with Card 5).
 - D. Cards 8 through 10 represent the evening of the day in question, and should be read top to bottom (begin with card 8 and end with card 10).
 - E. Card 4 serves a dual purpose. It shows the outcome of any special project that might be under consideration it also is the general "tone-of-the-day" card.

This card must be read on its own merits and according to Dignity. It is important to realize that an Ill-Dignified card in this position DOES NOT necessarily mean that a project will turn out badly, or that it will be a rotten day. Some cards are better aspected when they ARE Ill-Dignified.

This Spread is useful for answering specific questions about settled future events like parties, job interviews, etc.

NOTE: This Spread is NOT useful for every day interpretation. Day-by-Day interpretation using this spread will only cause confusion.

This layout is used primarily as an Answering Spread. It does, however, give a good overall picture of the current situation. Although

at first glance this spread seems deceptively simple, but it you may find it actually more difficult to read than the others you find here. Following are some notes on how to interpret this layout.

Card Number 2 holds an answer to the question, but this answer must be interpreted in light of the majority of cards in the spread.

Every card in this Spread should be read on its own merits, relative to the definition of its placement. It should also be read in light of the majority of cards in the spread.

The cards can be paired and read in juxtaposition. For example, the Moon position should be paired with the Sun position; Venus should be paired with Mars; and so on.

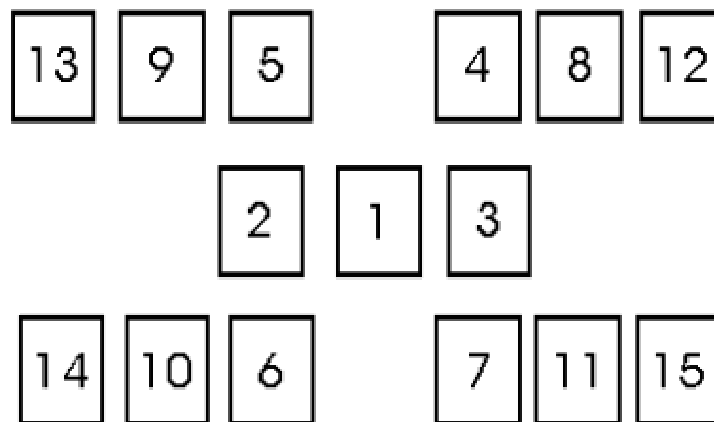

A majority of Pentacles indicates general business matters in general, possessions, and material success or failure.

A majority of Trumps indicates higher forces at work, therefore, the individual is not fully in control of the situation. This majority is a strong indicator of spiritual or karmic matters.

A majority of Court Cards indicates meetings, society and many people surrounding the individual or situation.

Significance of Rulerships

Air represents the elemental quality of The Fool, and is emphasized by the Hebrew Letter, Aleph, also meaning Air. These rulerships signify the breath of new life that this card represents, as well as the natural confusion of situations that are "up in the air," another aspect of this card.

Uranus, the Planetary ruler, represents the eccentricity and impulsiveness inherent in The Fool. Think of the stereotypical traits of the Aquarian, and you can begin to understand the nature of this card. It represents rebelliousness and revolution; unorthodoxy, and unconventional behavior.

The translation of the Hebrew Letter is Ox, but the shape of the Hebrew letter itself suggests a plowshare. Both are symbolic of a metaphysical phallic influence.

The Numerological Value is 0. This represents the formlessness of the Infinite. It is the God number; the number of wholeness.

Overview

Represented within The Fool are the elements of both male and female. As the Divine Force is neither male nor female, yet embodies the elements of both male and female, so it is with The Fool. He manifests qualities of both sexes, while maintaining his ability to transcend the polarities at will. He is the breath, the very essence of Life itself. He represents eternal youth, with all the risks, recklessness, and faith in his own immortality that embodies youth. He lives totally in the present. He believes and acts as though Life is made solely for fun and pleasure. He has perfect faith that everything is right and is as it is meant to be. The Fool is a card of innocence and naivete. It represents

**the impulse that comes from some strange,
unexplainable, unexpected sphere.**

This is the purest and most glorious image of the Moon. It is untouched by mundane desires and petty sexual idiosyncracies. It represents the role of the Priestess, as the connecting link between our conscious and subconscious minds, between our physical bodies and our ethereal souls.

The Hebrew letter for The Priestess is Gimel, which translates to Camel. The camel, which can go for long periods without water, is representative of self-sufficiency; symbolic of an inner reservoir of strength, wisdom, and power.

The Numerological Value of The Priestess is 2. This is the number of balance, of harmony. She is the balancing power between two opposites, light and dark. However, she has no preference for either, but merely awaits the result of a focused effort of the conscious mind. This symbolic balancing can also be seen in the form of the Priestess, herself. The upper half of her body is female, expressing the receptive,

subconscious, and reproductive power. This is further accentuated by the upturned crescent moons behind her head. The lower half of her body is male, symbolizing the active male principle, straight, direct, and aggressive in its purpose. This symbolism is accentuated by the bow and arrow laying across her lap.

In spiritual terms, the Priestess represents the middle pillar between the Father in his most glorious aspect, and the Son in his most perfect manifestation. She is the direct connection, the most spiritual form of Isis and Artemis, clothed only in a radiant veil of light. Crowley and others believed that this veil of light represented not the divine light of Spirit, but rather was the veil that hides the Spirit.

Overview

The Priestess is the second of the Hebrew Mother Letters, Mem, and is a symbol of the highest initiation. It is symbolic of the higher qualities of the spiritual within us. She is representative of one who is not only in touch with the intuitive abilities, but has perfect faith and trust in them. She is manifested in the individual who accepts total responsibility for himself; who is independent of anybody or anything in the higher sense of living.

Significance of Rulerships

The Empress is ruled by the elemental, Water. This defines Her essence as that of female energy, accepting, giving, nurturing. Whereas The Priestess seems to represent the ethereal female qualities, virginal, and transcendent of mundane sexual advances, The Empress is the embodiment of the archetypal Mother. She is the nurturer, the life giver, as water itself nurtures and gives life to all creatures.

Venus is the planetary ruler of The Empress. This is Venus in its highest expression. Here it seeks to bring beauty and elegance, balance and harmony, into whatever environment it appears.

The representative Hebrew Letter is Daleth, which means Door. it is one of the seven Double letters, signifying the contradictions of existence. On the glyph, the Door can be seen positioned behind the Empress, and is known as the "Gate of Heaven."

The Numerological Correspondent is Three. This represents growth through imagination. The Infinite Formlessness was 0, the God power, omnipotent and omniscient. The number 1 represented the conscious mind, communication, but not production. The number 2 was the subconscious mind, reflective, receptive, but lacking reasoning. It takes the number 3 to combine the single numbers of 1 and 2 into something that is concrete. In this respect, the three can be seen to represent the Christian Trinity as well as the Wiccan Trinity of Light, Life, and Love. In the Tetragrammaton, the way of the Empress, the Number Three card, is the direct path uniting the Mother and the Father. This can be seen in examples all around us everyday. Neither a man nor a woman alone can produce the child, but the combining of each can produce a third, which is a mixture of both parents (hence, a uniting), yet separate unto itself.

Overview

The Empress represents the highest of spiritual qualities, and the lowest of the material. She is symbolic of the deepest kind of unconditional and nurturing love. This is illustrated in the card by the mother swan feeding her young with her own blood. She is the ultimate expression of all that is feminine, mysterious, receptive, and magnetic. To her arms is where we all long to return for safety, security, love, and comfort.

Significance of Rulerships

Fire is the Elemental ruler of The Emperor. Leadership, strength, power, and energy are all qualities illustrated by this card.

The Planetary ruler is Mars, which rules the Zodiac sign of Aries. Here again we see the traits of leadership, energy, and assertive power.

The Hebrew letter is Tzaddi, which means Fishhook and signifies that which produces. Therefore, this card is symbolic of a combination of dynamic, physical energy and the concept of authority. The word is derived from the old Sanskrit language and is still in use today in modern language. For example,

the words Tsar, Caesar, Senate, Senior, Signor, etc., all echo the old Sanskrit roots of TZ or TS. If you examine these words, you will see the reflection of the card, The Emperor, within them; all of them refer to male positions of power.

The Numerological Correspondent is 4. Once again we see the issue of production brought into play. The number 4 in Numerology is symbolic of the builder, the organizer.

The number 4, because it is made up of straight lines, is a sacred number. This principle can be seen in the straight lines of the cross and the square. In its divine sense, it stands for law and order, the material realms, reason, and logic.

One interesting note before we go on to the overview of The Emperor. Christ was not the only spiritual leader to die on a cross. Krishna of India, Thamus of Syria, Flesus of the Druids, Mithra of Persia, and Quexalcotl of Mexico all died on crosses. Also, the equal armed cross, with its crossbeams crossing the umbilical center, traditionally represented man. It was only after the crucifixion of Christ that the crossbeam was raised to the heart center.

Overview

This card represents worldly power and achievement, at the expense of individuality and creativity. It is a card of conservative, old world traditions; of law and order, leadership, and authority. Individualism and revolutionary ideas are not tolerated. However, much can be achieved under this card, for it represents a definite commitment to building something worthwhile for society. This is the ultimate paternal card.

Success comes either through self-mastery, discipline, and willpower or through another who is in a position of authority.
ILL-DIGNIFIED:	Can symbolize the card of a fanatic. Inability to think for oneself or take responsibility. Extreme dislike of any kind of authority, either through

individuals, governments, or corporate entities. An inability to deal with power, or with those in power. Lack of discipline and self-control; immaturity.

When the Emperor appears reversed, it can also symbolize that one aspect of the personality is overly dominant. This aspect could be an emotion or a strict adherence to a philosophy. Psychologically, this card reversed often shows up in the spread of one who is neurotically bonded to a parent or other significant person, or who has unresolved conflicts with a father or other authority figure.

Significance of Rulerships

Earth is the elemental ruler of The Hierophant. This imbues the card with stability and practicality. It represents mastery over the basic and fundamental essences of the universe.

Venus rules the Hierophant, as does Taurus. The rulership of Taurus is illustrated by the elephants pictured behind the throne. Venus here is the enlightener, and Taurus lends dependability to the enlightenment so that the Hierophant can be taken seriously in what he says and does, rather than being dismissed as an eccentric fanatic. He is the spiritual master; the liaison between man and god.

The Hebrew letter for the Hierophant is Vau, which translates to Nail. Nine of these "nails" can be seen at the top center of the card. Also called thorns, they represent the Hierophant's mastery of the trials, troubles, and tests of the number 5 cards in the Minor Arcana. This is echoed again in the five petals of the rose surrounding his head. In the Qabbalah, Vau is defined as he who joins, marries, and heals.

The Numerological Correspondent for the Hierophant is the number 5. This is the number of decision making based on insight and intuition. It is a number of communication and travel. To the ancient ascetics,

the number 5 was the number of mediation. The number represented Man, with his five (developed) senses. The Hierophant has gained mastery over his five senses, so that the sixth can be developed. It also represented the four elements (Earth, Air, Fire, and Water), plus the fifth element of Ether (Spirit). The Hierophant's mastery over the four basic elements has allowed him to transcend them and become the intermediary between Man and God.

Overview

The Hierophant is interested only in uniting the material with the spiritual. He has mastered the tests of the "fives," and developed the sixth sense of the spiritual realms. He is the initiator. With him are the elements of the new age of initiation -- the child within, and Venus standing ready before him with sword in hand. No longer will she simply be the companion of the male force; she is now a force of her own to be reckoned with. The Hierophant stands smiling, but it is debatable over whether the smile is one of joy, or if it comes from considering the mysteries and dangers awaiting the new initiate.

Significance of Rulerships

The Elemental of Air rules The Lovers. There is very little solidity or stability with this card. This is the card of intellect, communication, and interrelationships.

The planet Mercury rules The Lovers, and Gemini is its Astrological correspondent. This emphasizes both the communicative aspect of the card, as well as its duality. The entire card is composed of opposites, with various polarities represented. Things are together, and yet not together.

The Hebrew Letter which represents The Lovers is Zain, the Sword. The dualities involved with Card 6 are shown again. In the intellectual sense, the sword is the instrument of analysis, cutting through the confusion to the essentials. This is the lesson of this card; to look at things through their opposites, and in so doing, to intrinsically know them.

The Numerological Correspondent is the number 6. This is the number of synthesis, integration, and balance.

Overview

The Lovers appears deceptively easy to interpret. However, there is a great deal of hidden lore pictured within the card. On the surface, it appears to be the marriage of two royal personages. The pink coloring of the card lends itself to the idea of love, romance, and marriage. However, it also speaks of dualities. The entire card is composed of opposites. The old mystery orders held that this card pictured the

Hennetic marriage; that within it was told the Assyrian legend of creation and the fall of Man. This legend proffered that Cain was the child of Eve and the Serpent, and Abel the child of Adam and Eve. Because God would not hear the children of Eve and the Serpent, Cain slew Abel to get God's attention.

Significance of Rulerships

The fiery aspect of water rules The Chariot. In this aspect, water becomes hot, passionate, and ardent, but the water acts to dampen the fire and keep it hidden.

Moon and Jupiter both rule The Chariot. The Moon rules the hidden emotions and intuition; Jupiter rules expansiveness. Therefore, this card represents one who moves expansively and fearlessly to the hidden side of himself, turning to embrace the emotional and intuitive side of himself.

Cancer is the Astrological ruler of The Chariot. This gives an even deeper insight into the psyche of this card, for Cancerians are emotionally sensitive, and very protective both of loved ones, and of their own feelings. Thus, we can see the water at work upon the fire, submerging the emotions for fear of rejection or ridicule.

The Hebrew letter is Cheth, meaning a Fenced or Enclosed Field. Again we find reference to emotions, ideas, and feelings being kept close inside oneself. These are self-imposed restrictions and limitations.

The Number 7 demands control of the senses, elevation and purification of desires. The goal is for self-mastery; achievement of complete dominion over the physical body. However, this must be accomplished completely through free will, there can

be no force or coercion. The number 7 gives a deeply analytical and introspective element to the Chariot. Again, however, all analysis is done internally, and rarely is spoken aloud to others.

Overview

This card symbolizes new beginnings. It can point to a journey or to a change in home, especially a long-distance move. Care and caution should be taken to analyze the situation before any action is taken. Once a course is decided upon, it should be followed consistently. This is a goal-oriented card; achievement demands single-focused concentration; a one track-mind.

In addition, The Chariot also counsels calmness. Tranquility and peace must be maintained, regardless of any external changes. Fears must be faced and overcome.

Significance of Rulerships

The Elemental rulership of Adjustment is Air. It is a mental card, but tinged with the element of water. In it we see the intellectualism symbolic of Air mingled with the emotionalism of Water.

Planetary rulerships are Venus and Saturn. This symbolized the final balance, the equilibrium, the "adjustment" of all.

The Hebrew letter for Adjustment is Lamed, which means Ox, an animal characterized by practicality. It also means To Teach, which is exactly what this card

does for us. Adjustment teaches us to find the balance in our lives with reference to our own little world and to the universe as a whole. It is the feminine complement of The Fool. In The Fool, possibilities are only potentialities; in Adjustment, they become actualities.

The Numerological Correspondent for Adjustment is 8. This letter represents strength, willpower, and effort. It confers the ability to channel energy to effect change.

Overview

The card Adjustment was originally called Justice. Crowley decided that this was not the correct name for it, for Justice implied a human condition, not one of Nature. Since Nature was never seen as fair and just, but rather "exact," it was deemed that this card should be called Adjustment. It represents balance, harmony, and justice; our adjustment to the natural world around us.

Symbolism

- Crown:** Her crown is made of ostrich plumes, associated with Maat, the Egyptian goddess of Justice.
- Scales:** The scales descend from her crown. This signifies the delicacy of the nature of balance. Alpha and Omega are symbolized in the scales, representing the ability to see both sides.
- Spheres:** Represents opposites, and the need to maintain balance.
- Sword:** The Tarot symbol for Air, for the

ability to discriminate between opposing factions. It also represents the pointed price of true balance.

Significance of Rulerships

Earth is the Elemental ruler of The Hermit, and the Astrological ruler is Virgo. This rulership symbolizes the aspects of fertility, creation, and the ability to manifest ideas. The Hermit is determination; whatever needs to be done is not only accomplished, but accomplished with the highest amount of perfection possible. Think of the Taurean Bull, determined, decisive, and resolute. These qualities are manifest in The Hermit, as well. However, with the influence of the Virgo Earth, they are tempered with love, compassion, and care.

Despite the influence of the Earth signs, the Moon is the planetary ruler of The Hermit. This alignment emphasizes The Hermit at his best -- when he is alone and solitaire. It accents the mystery of The Hermit as the loner, the dreamer. He is the wayshower; but to accomplish his ends, he needs to know the way himself. This inner search is by necessity a solitary goal.

The Hebrew letter for The Hermit is Yod, the first and fundamental letter of the Hebrew alphabet. Upon it, all other letters are formed. Yod translates to Hand, and represents service to others. This need to be of service to all those around him is also seen in the Numerological Correspondent.

The Numerological Correspondent of The Hermit is 9. This is the number of completion, fulfillment. It is also

the number of service to mankind. Thus, The Hermit, having found his answers, seeks to give these answers to all who seek. He offers a helping hand to anyone who would take it.

Overview

The Hermit can represent a temporary withdrawal from the world, usually as a retreat to find inner balance; to analyze information and make decisions. Although committed to perfection, he is not consumed by it.

Even though he is wise and wants to show others the path, he is not cherished or even respected. His ways are not orthodox. He is not satisfied with society's norms, nor does he make any pretense of being so. His ways are not for the many, and because of this he represents union at the deepest level with the seeker. If the seeker is not willing to make this commitment, The Hermit will just as willingly turn away and remain alone. He prefers aloneness to superficial relationships. He is happy within himself. He has found his answers, and the only relationship he really needs is the one he shares through his own inner voice.

Symbolism

Lantern: The lantern in the center of the card symbolizes his responsibility to show others the path. In the center of the lantern is the sigil of the Ace of Wands. It is representative of the Hebrew letter Yod, the secret fire.

Wheat: The wheat in the background is symbolic of Virgo; of fertility and abundance.

Hermit: The posture of The Hermit represents the shape of the letter Yod. In essence, The Hermit is the secret fire, the fundamentals of which life is made created.

Orphic Egg: The Orphic egg, and the spermatozoa both represent fertility and creation. The spermatozoa is symbolic of birth in the outer world; the Orphic egg symbolizes spiritual rebirth.

Cerberus: The three-headed dog, Cerberus, is the guardian of the gates of hell. The Hermit has tamed him. This is symbolic of the ability to resist temptation, to do what is right. It is also symbolic of white magic triumphing over black magic.

Significance of Rulerships

Lightening is the Elemental Ruler of the Wheel of Fortune. In its symbology we sense the essence of the card: "electrifying" opportunities and energetic changes.

The Planetary Rulership of Jupiter gives a little more insight into these opportunities. Jupiter is the planet of expansion, growth, and luck. It is symbolic of good fortune; offortune which comes from some strange and unexpected quarters. It is not "earned" fortune, but rather blind luck.

The Hebrew Letter is Kaph, which means Palm of the Hand. Kaph is chosen because the fortune of a person may be read in the lines of the palm of the hand. Kaph is sometimes translated as the "Grasping Hand" because it signifies he who wants it all and unabashedly "goes for it."

The Numerological Correspondent is 10. This is the first card in the new cycle, and is a repetition of the number 1. Therefore, just as a wheel turns, so the Wheel of Fortune represents cycles, repetition, and rotation. This simply means that all that is currently manifest will pass away; that change is the only constant, and therefore all things will come to pass, each in its own proper time.

The number 10 represents a new start. When translating double digit numbers, we take the number on the right, and discern how it "works through" the number on the left. In the number 10, we have 0 working through the 1. Zero represents the Universal

Force, and 1 represents new beginnings, thoughts, and ideas. Therefore, in the number 10, we have the promise that, regardless of how many changes we must go through, the Universal Force is always with us.

Overview

This card represents fortune and luck. It is the card of the risk-taker; of one who is willing to gamble on an opportunity and turns it quickly to his own advantage.

The card also symbolizes the only constancy of life: change. Regardless of the current situation, remember that it is not forever. The Wheel will turn; the cycle will change; and all that is now will pass away, giving birth to the new. In this light, it can also be seen to represent the Wheel of Transmigration, the Wheel of Karma; of events coming to pass are beyond control. Whatever is occurring is that which has been earned by deed and thought. For in the law of Karma, there is no such thing as blind luck, but merely that which we have earned over aeons of Life.

ILL-DIGNIFIED:	Wishful thinking and dreams, but no practical action to make things happen. Waiting for external forces to take action. Hesitation, indecision, and a general feeling of loss of control over a situation. Resistance to change. Help (fortune) from outside sources and thus, only temporary relief.

Significance of Rulerships

The Element Fire rules the card called Lust, formerly named Strength. It symbolizes the dangerous hypnotic quality of that element. There is danger of losing control, of being burned, consumed by the leaping flames of power.

It is only correct that the Sun should run this card. The Sun, the perfect symbol of the element Fire, symbolic on its own as power and strength. Its force

has wide ranging impact; nurturing those upon whom it shines, and destroying those for whom it withholds its life-giving rays.

The Astrological Correspondent to Lust is Leo, the Lion. He is the beast represented on the face of the card itself. He symbolizes the self-assurance, confidence, and wild flamboyance this card represents. He also symbolizes the power inherent in the card.

The corresponding Hebrew letter is Teth, the Serpent. This is the feminine aspect of strength, of power -- the Hindu Goddess Kali -- the complement of the male symbol of the Sun. This card, therefore, represents the original marriage as it occurs in nature. There is no attempt to direct its course.

The number 11 means literally, the number 1 working through the number 1. However, 11 is also known as a Master Number. A Master Number takes on its own vibrations, and does not have to be reduced. They carry more import, and are much more powerful than reduced numbers. The number 11 symbolizes leadership and power.

The number 11 can also be parsed as follows: 1 plus 1 equals 2 (The Priestess); and 10 plus 1 equals The Magus. In this light, again we see the complement of the polarities, male and female, and the power and strength of both polarities reflected equally.

Overview

Lust is symbolic of the many myths of the ages. The myths of the "old order," as Crowley calls it, are all based on the non-human paternity to a champion. Some of these include the story of Romulus and Remus who were sired by Mars; Buddha, who was fathered by an elephant with six trunks; and even

Christ, who was fathered by the Holy Spirit in the form of a Dove. These stories are all illustrated by the woman astride the Lion.

The card also implies strength, but strength which comes through energy expended in the unrestricted enjoyment of experience. It is not only power, but the pure bliss and euphoria of power itself. In this essence, Lust is symbolic of the knowing that only through fully experiencing life can true creative potential be achieved, for only then can true focus and concentration be directed.

Symbolism

Nakedness: Feminine power

Lion: Masculine power

Seven Faces: Symbolize different aspects of the personality which now unite in one wild experience. Beyond caring for morality or society's norms. These are the energy forms of the new world order to come.

Ten Circles: These are located throughout the major portion of the card and represent the passing away of the outdated ideals of the old order. The 10 circles at the top of the card are the new ideals which will replace the old.

Interpretation

DIGNIFIED:	<p>Strength and courage to be oneself. Control of passion and baser instincts; able to enjoy and indulge life without losing control. Great amounts of energy (sexual and/or creative). Can also indicate an illogical but irresistible attraction to another person.</p>

Significance of Rulerships

The Elemental Rulership of The Hanged Man is Water, which is also the translation of the Hebrew name for the card. However, rather than representing water itself, The Hanged Man represents the spiritual function of water, namely baptism and death of an old way of life.

The Planetary Rulership of Neptune symbolizes the masks we wear. Neptune represents darkness, confusion, ambiguity, and mystery. Rather than face these dark aspects and conquer them, many people prefer to conceal them. These masks of self-confidence are worn until they are forced to come out

of hiding and show their true selves.

The Numerological Correspondent of 12 refers to that time when hiding is no longer possible.

Overview

The Hanged Man refers to obstacles, burdens, limitations, and outmoded thought patterns that are held steady in our lives. These things need to be given up so that progress can continue, but often they are the things most dear to us. This makes the surrender all the more difficult. However, when the submission to the higher self is achieved, it often enables us to take two steps forward for every one that seemed to be taken backwards. It is important to understand that this is not a card of action. Merely seeing and understanding those conditions which are causing stagnation will begin the action of transformation.

In a spread, The Hanged Man can also pertain to timing. There may be a sense of waiting for the right time to act with reference to a situation. There may also be feelings of disorientation; as though the individual is "on the outside looking in;" of seeing and experiencing things in a different manner from everyone else.

Significance of Rulerships

Water is the Elemental Ruler of Death for a number of

reasons. First, water represents fluidity, the ability to change and adapt to circumstances and situations. Second, Death also symbolizes rebirth, and it is in water that life begins. Third, water has the ability to change form -- it can be liquid, solid, or gaseous. Thus, it is ideal to represent the changing aspects of the Self.

The Planetary Ruler is Pluto. This planet symbolizes our feelings about death, the mysterious and occult. Pluto rules the Underworld, the subconscious drives of the Self, especially the sex drive.

Scorpio is the Astrological Ruler. It is traditionally assigned rulership of both life and death. Scorpio was historically ruled by Mars until the discovery of Pluto. In the case of the Tarot card Death, we still retain rulership by Mars, which gives the fiery spark of energy to water in order that it may bring forth life.

The Hebrew letter for Death is Nun, which means Fish. This may seem an odd representative for this card until one considers that Fish is a symbol of life underwater, and that this card Death pertains as much to life as it does to death. It is the card of rebirth, of transition, of transformation.

Overview

The Death card is wrongly attributed as the most fearsome card in the Tarot; it is probably the most misunderstood card. While it can presage a physical death, this is a rare occurrence. It does presage change, sometimes forced change, and that can be cause for fear and apprehension. However, as we have seen with previous cards, the only constant in the universe is change. When we can no longer face the decisions that create change (as in the Hanged Man), change must be forced upon us. The Death card tells us that the time for change is NOW. If we

don't take steps to start it, those steps will be taken for us. However, drawing this card indicates a readiness for change, even though that readiness may not be apparent. The act of letting go of the known can be a painful experience. Always remember that once these things are released, pure liberation follows.

This is a transition card. There are feelings of anxiety; pressure from some aspect of life that needs to be changed, whether that aspect be a job, a relationship, or whatever. Although it may appear that there is destruction, this tearing down is necessary in order to rebuild for the new which will take its place.

It is important to once again emphasize that if this change is not willingly begun, circumstances will rise to a point so as to make action absolutely necessary. This could take the form of being fired, divorce, etc. There can be no procrastinating with this card. The call is for total and complete change. The time is now for Death and Rebirth.

Symbolism

Skeleton: Symbol of death and rebirth

Scythe: Cutting away the old

Lily Plant: Rebirth; resurrection

Fish: New life; swiftness of change

Scorpion: Willingly submitting to change, despite danger or harm.

Snake: Symbolic of death and rebirth; of progression.

Phoenix: Birth of the new. This is the third and highest

aspect of transformation.

Significance of Rulerships

Firelight rules the card of Art, representing manifestation, of the melding of opposites into a whole new form.

Jupiter is the Planetary ruler of Art. In it again is echoed the themes of growth and progression. Jupiter represents expansion, a widening of the horizons; luck in its purest form.

The Astrological Ruler is Sagittarius. it symbolizes the union of fire and water; again, the theme of unification of opposites which necessarily leads to a third new form.

The Hebrew letter is Samech, which means Prop. A better translation may be "Tent Peg," the center point, the basis at which all new life begins.

The Numerological Correspondent is 14, the vibration of the fusion of discordant elements. The 14 vibration sets up testing situations which all an individual to verify thoughts, ideas, and beliefs. Holding them up to analysis, the individual may discard parts and recombine them with new, to bring about a new set of beliefs created from two possibly discordant original ideas.

Overview

The card Art can be summed up in the words that appear on the disk behind the androgynous figure: *Visita Interiora Terrae Rectificando Invenies Occultum Lapidem*. It means "Visit the interior parts of earth: by rectification thou shalt find the hidden stone." This is seen as a division of two elements. It was to be a talisman to be used whenever necessary, for its form was of both pure adaptability and rigidity of purpose. "Visit the interior parts of earth" is both a direction in the scientific alchemical formula, and also a directive to go within the self. In this vein, finding the "hidden stone" is a reference to revelations that can arise from deep meditative trances and dream states; the inner voice that counsels and guides.

When this card appears in a spread, it is an indication of positive personal growth. It signifies a willingness, desire, and ability to listen to the inner voice. It speaks of the blending of the unconscious, inner world of dreams with the conscious, outer world. Neither world dominates the other, but both act to change the other, thus creating a new whole. A way to remember this card is the old saying: "The sum of the whole is greater than the sum of its parts."

Green Robe: Fertility, creativity

Fire and Water: Death; rebirth

Alchemy: Symbolizes the scientific and educational aspect of the card

Union/Sun, Moon: Union of polarities: male/female; light/dark

Skull: Skull represents the subconscious; the bird atop the skull represents intuition

Significance of Rulerships

This card is grounded in the element of Earth. In one aspect, it represents a return to nature. In another, the earthy pleasures; the sensual and sexual.

Saturn is the Planetary ruler of The Devil. Again there is a division of meaning. In one aspect, there is revelry and celebration in the feast of the Harvest. However, in order to enjoy the feast, one must be disciplined and goal-oriented. Therefore, Saturn also represents discipline and responsibility.

Capricorn is the Astrological Correspondent for The Devil. Capricorn represents persistence, perseverance, ambition. It is concerned with the

material world; with building and creating things of the earth. The Hebrew letter representing the Devil is Ayin, or Eye. It speaks of the illusory value of the world. The eye is to see not only what is obvious, but to the hidden, as well. The Numerological Value is 15, the vibration of the material side of life. It is indecision, bondage, scattered energies, and the amassing of worldly things.

Overview

The Devil is simply creative energy in its most powerful, most materialistic form. It represents the abolishment of the limitations we force upon ourselves. The card is power, but power that can easily be abused. Notice the reversed pentagram on the goat's forehead; it symbolizes that everything represented on the card is of the material world.

This card is not inherently evil. It speaks only to us of limitations. It asks that we free ourselves from the fear which keeps us bound in ignorance. It implores us to use our ability to discern reality from illusion, and act to upon the reality, always keeping in mind the humor of the situation. For life is but a fleeting moment, and should never be taken too seriously.

A note on the central goat figure: The goat, or goat-headed figure has been attributed to many gods throughout the ages. The Knights of the Temple identified it as Baphomet; to the Egyptians he was Set, God of the South; the Etruscans pictured Dionysus wearing either a goat's or bull's horns; Pan was also seen as a goat. The reference to the form is symbolic of the high places to which the goat can climb. Most religions found it desirable to hold rites, rituals, and services on a high mountain. There were just as many justifications for this: to feel closer to "God," to symbolically turn away from the confusion

of the world and turn instead to the purity and absoluteness of the barren, rugged high terrain. This symbolism is carried in the card of The Devil. There is the feeling of being in a high place, up in the air, where there is no flora or fauna, but only barrenness.

- Smile: Symbolic of the need to face reality with humor

Significance of Rulerships

In this card, Fire is symbolic of the destruction of existing conditions. However, as fire consumes and destroys, it also purifies.

The Planetary ruler is Mars, the planet of War. Here again we have the element of destruction. However, in war not only are environments destroyed, but also human life. This ruler is symbolic of Shiva, who destroys her followers so that they may gain Nothingness, and thus perfection. It is the destruction of all that is stagnant within our lives, and is therefore holding us back. Even though we cling, we will be blown away for our own growth, our own progress.

The Hebrew letter is Peh, which means Mouth or, by association, Speech. This is a reference to the Tower of Babel; of the confusing element of words. We get lost in words. We use words to our own advantage until they bind us so tight to that from which we would free ourselves, that we soon find ourselves deluded into believing that the stagnation is right and proper. Words can lead to confusion, delusion, and chaos.

The Numerological Value of 16 is key of awakening, and this is exactly what this card represents. It is an awakening through the utter destruction of all that we have built. We are forced to look beyond the surface. We are forced to trust in a higher power, in the higher power within ourselves. We are forced to heal ourselves of the diseases of stagnation and ignorance.

Overview

The Tower symbolizes the complete and utter destruction of an existing way of life, belief system, or sense of security. It demands trust and understanding that what is lost during a time of great trial and test will be replaced by something greater and more glorious. This is a time for casting off all that we do not like about ourselves. It is a time when our ego is shaken to the very core. Anything that we attempt to cling to for security or stability will be blasted away from us. It is a time of healing, though we may not be able to discern this

through the heartaches and troubles that seem to engulfing us. However, it is a time of drawing out the poisons and healing ourselves from within.

Symbolism

Tower: The inner being; also symbolic of physical structures

Fire: Destruction of the tower, of outmoded beliefs; of ignorance

Dragon: Purging the inner self by fire

Dove: Love, peace; female power

Lion: Male power

Snake: Rebirth; transformation

The Planetary rulership is that of the Star. It calls for us to recognize the beauty and magnetism in who we are and who we would grow to be.

The Astrological Rulership is Aquarius, sign of the Water Bearer. It is also the symbol of humanitarianism, compassion, service to others, selflessness, and all that nourishes life.

The Hebrew letter is Heh, meaning Window. A better translation would be 'Visionary.' The Star opens a window upon a world beyond this one, where the true visionary sees what needs to be done to help

others, and starts the process of healing.

The Numerological Value is 17, which signifies good for-tune, attainment, accomplishment, achievement.

Overview

The Star is hope and inspiration; beauty and creativity. It is a feminine/nurturing card. She is the energy of the Universe, pouring this energy out into the earth below. Through this she creates a new age of love and compassion for all. She is the guiding star that leads us to the best in ourselves.

Symbolism

Star: The true nature of all is Love. Spinning Star: love as catalyst

Arms: Within her arms, she surrounds all with her healing power

Liquid: Symbolic of renewal of strength, energy, and power by giving the same to others

Crystals: Feelings and emotions becoming crystallized

Colors: The blue, purple, and pink colors shown are the healing colors of the complete Self

Significance of Rulerships

Water as the Elemental Ruler imbues The Moon with the feminine qualities of reflectivity, passivity, and receptivity. However, in this glyph, Water takes on the murky depths of confusion and testing. There is the chance to become lost in it, to drown in the emotions it

evokes. There is the danger of being caught up once again in old patterns of thought and behavior, and thus repeating cycles over and over again without gaining the awareness to break the cycles.

The Planetary Rulership of the Moon over this card is only natural. This is the moon in her waning phase. It is the emotion-wrenching catalyst to delve deeper into one's soul. Beliefs and creeds are called into question. The Dark Night of Soul begins. There is danger of becoming so involved in the search that one forgets the goal. This is the moon in her most illusory glory.

The Astrological Rulership is Pisces, the last of the 12 signs of the Zodiac. Upon it rests the Gateway of Rebirth, which is illustrated in the card. Pisceans are well-known for exhibiting many of the negative characteristics of the moon, including moodiness, giving into illusion, struggles with the emotions, starting first in one direction and abruptly turning another, only to turn back just as abruptly.

Qoph translates to "The Back of the Head" and pertains to the potentialities within the cerebellum. In essence, this is a reference to memories, of which emotions are always entangled, and therefore come under the reign of the moon.

The number 18 is one of the numbers of completion, for one plus eight equals 9, the ultimate number of completion. It points out that this is a time of final testing.

Overview

This is one of the most dangerous cards in the Tarot. It is dangerous because it warns of our journey into the dark side of ourselves. There are temptations and illusions which attempt to cloud our vision and turn us away from our original goal. This is the completion of one form of life, and the promise of a new, more enriching one. However, in order to gain awareness one must pass through ignorance. To gain understanding, one must first become aware of the confusion. This is a testing card. The drawing of The Moon means you stand on the brink of an momentous experience. During this time, it is most important to listen to the inner voice for guidance. But caution and

awareness should be paramount in order to avoid being deluded by illusions.

Symbolism

Scarab: The scarab bears in his jaws the Sun, which is a symbol of hope and light after the dark midnight of confusion and testing

Guardians: The guardians of the narrow way are Anubis in double form. He guards the Threshold of Life, which is also the Threshold of Death

Ankhs: The Anubis are holding ankhs, symbol of Mercury, representing communication between two people working in cooperation

Jackals: Symbolic of the danger of being consumed by emotions

Nine Yods: These can be symbolic of two things. First, they can be seen as tears of joy at the new awareness found after inner exploration. Second, they can be seen as tears of heartache and pain that accompany the journey

Bottom of Card: Ascent of light into the darkness; awareness conquering ignorance

Waves: Natural rhythms; moon power over emotions

Interpretation

DIGNIFIED:	Trust in inner guidance; imagination, intuition. Pay close attention to dreams for messages from the subconscious. Careful analysis of all offers of help and advise in order to avoid deception or misrepresentation.
ILL-DIGNIFIED:	Deception; illusion; inability to discern reality from fiction; escapism. Emotions confused, frantic, and skewed; "moonstruck." Often appears in the spread of a compulsive liar.

XIX -- THE SUN

Significance of Rulerships

In this glyph, Fire is not the destructive element that it was in The Tower. Here, the Dark Night of Soul has been endured; the trials and tests have been passed; the light of the Sun has vanquished the dark of midnight. Fire is now the source of the illumination of life.

This rulership of the Sun is at its male creative peak. It is the center of life; it illuminates all, and within its sphere is now the power, leadership, and onus of responsibility. It is the basic life force channeled and focused to the highest level.

The Hebrew letter Resh translates to the Face. This is in reference to the openness and lack of mystery inherent in the card. The mysteries of the Moon and dark recesses of Soul have been purged; now it is time to bask in the open warmth of the Sun.

The Numerological Value is 19. This is a number of new beginnings. Obstacles have been overcome, rewards are enjoyed. There has been a transformation and rebirth. It is a time of freedom and prosperity. No longer is the goal "out there--somewhere"; it is here and now.

Overview

The Sun is one of the most beneficial and uplifting cards in the Tarot. It minimizes all negativity. The polarities are seen once again in the card, but in this glyph, they are now liberated partners dancing upon the green fertile earth. There is freedom, joy, energy, and enthusiasm. It assures that now all energy will be turned toward cooperative efforts, rather than toward struggles over dominance, power games, and oppression. They fly towards the rose of realization on butterfly wings, symbolizing their freedom and liberation in this new age. All that they want has been achieved. No longer is any goal far off on the horizon. They are free to enjoy the fruits of their labor, to savor what has been gained from the pain of self-sacrifice and soul searching.

Significance of Rulerships

This is the first time we have had the rare fifth element assume rulership over a card. Ether is of the Spirit. It is not manifest; it is simply "out there" waiting to assume form.

This is also the first time we have had an interplanetary rulership over a card. This is because the Aeon suggests life in transition. There are no set influences; no concentrated focus or direction. Rather, each of the planetary bodies has influence until the manifestation is revealed in distinct form.

The Hebrew letter, Shin, translates to the Holy Fire. This is spiritual awareness in its highest form. It also refers to the deposing of the old Egyptian god of the Air, Osiris, by the new Egyptian Fire god, Horus.

The Numerological value of the card is 20. This sums down to a 2, which is another, higher representation of The Priestess. Here again we see the Seer, who perceives of East and West, North and South, above and below. All senses are in tune with the Cosmos, in perfect balance.

Overview

The Aeon is the old card of Judgment. It is the final judgement; the rebirth of consciousness. The old ways have died, and the new age has begun. With this new age comes the redefining of personality. It represents the final, decisive step in regard to the old, and the first, positive step with respect to the new. This card will often be drawn during a crisis situation when a crossroads has been reached. It counsels careful analysis of reality, and dares the challenge of looking at the situation in new ways.

Symbolism

Significance of Rulerships

All elements combine to rule this glyph. This is because The Universe represents unification and integration. It is the creative fusion of all that has been, is, and will be.

Saturn rules The Universe. This gives us the aspects of harvest, abundance, and fulfillment; but also of responsibility, control, and discipline.

The Astrological rulership is, quite appropriately, the universe and all that is contained within it. This is a call for us to realize that the universe exists not outside ourselves, but within ourselves. Therefore, anything and everything that we can dream can be achieved.

The Hebrew letter for The Universe is Tau, the Cross. This is known as your personal mark, your identity. It speaks of establishing your role in the universe, of letting your uniqueness shine through to your advantage. It is the sum of the entire essence of all that is and ever

has been.

The Numerological Value for The Universe is 21, or the qualities of the Empress in their highest form. Within her, she carries the seeds of all potentiality. Therefore, this vibration symbolizes that within ourselves are the seeds for all that we can become and achieve.

Overview

The essence of this card is simply that the entire universe lies at your feet. It is the crystallization of the whole of the matter involved. All is set for a favorable ending and a beneficial beginning. There is harmony in this card; harmony of the self with the universe; an understanding of the individual's place within the universe.

Symbolism

Spiral: The Divine Force; active and passive, each possessing both polarities

Fixed Sign: The established universe; the manifestation of all potentials of all states, emotional, intellectual, physical, and spiritual

Wheel: Completion; death and rebirth

Snake: The snake and the scythe combine to again symbolize death and rebirth; endings and beginnings

Dancer: Symbology of Tantra; the tantric union; the creative

dance with the universe

Eye: New sights, new insights;
new personality (Note: you
must turn the card sideways
to envision the eye.)

Green Color: Fertility; creativity; birth of
ideas and personality

Interpretation

DIGNIFIED:	Completion; success; achievement. The end of a personal cycle or situation. Travel, new career or business opportunities. New opportunities for different, more pleasing lifestyles.
ILL-DIGNIFIED:	Overwhelming emotions; too many choices, too much confusion; indecision. Situations drawing to a close, but not yet ended. Fear of and inability to change; fear of the unknown. Lack of self-confidence; lack or rejection of intuitive ability.

The Court Cards



The Paradox of the Face Cards

Introduction

The first thought when seeing face cards in a spread is to immediately identify them as people within the individual's sphere of influence. It is true that this is one aspect of the Court cards; however, they stand for much more than that. Court cards can represent:

- The individual himself as he was (past), is now (present), or will be (future).
- Emotions and events that affect situations/relationships in the individual's life.
- An influential person within the individual's sphere of influence.

Understanding the Court cards is probably the most difficult part of an interpretation; there are so many different paths to follow. My best advice to you is to look at the spread as a whole, then break it down into parts. Observe the position of the Court Card and the cards surrounding it. There should be a clue as to whether the card represents an even or an actual person.

You should open yourself up and "feel" the spread as a whole. Some spreads leave you with an overwhelming feeling of sadness; others make the adrenaline flow. That feeling is an indication to you; learn to listen to your inner voice and let the Tarot speak to you.

In the pages that follow, I will try to give you both general coloring characteristics and personality traits, as well as events that these

cards represent. In this way, you can decide for yourself how best to interpret them, according to your own inner feelings.

Physical Characteristics

While you may or may not use the physical characteristics as a basis for choosing the appropriate significator, you should be aware of them. The physical characteristics, together with the personality attributes, will often help the individual to identify the Court card as someone who is influencing the situation. For easy reference, I have prepared the following tables to illustrate these attributes.

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PRINCESSES



The Princesses are most often the message bearers of the Tarot. They tend to represent all types of news from relatives, friends, business associates, and enemies. They also represent the probability of calculated risk-taking.

The Princesses will each be found immersed within her respective element, and each carries a tool symbolic of her suit. The Princess of Swords wields a sword; the Princess of Cups carries a cup; the Princess of Wands extends her wand; and the Princess of Pentacles shoulders a disk shield in addition to her staff.

Specific meanings are indicated when more than one Princess card falls in a single spread.

PRINCESS OF CUPS

Earth of Water

The Princess of Cups is known as The Lover. She is the earthy part of Water and symbolizes emotional freedom, the defeat of jealousy, and perfect trust in the inner self. She is the power to realize dreams and ideas.

The individual who is represented by this card is gracious, gentle, kind, and tender; a willing lover and the perfect helpmate. In reference to physical attributes, she is usually very voluptuous, an age-old symbol of femininity and fertility.

The Princess of Cups is the epitome of dreaminess and romance; she radiates innocence and love. However, on first impression she may seem selfish and dependent. This misunderstanding is due only because of her increased awareness of her own independence. She has transcended jealousy and possessiveness. She gives all to help those she loves; her love provides a sheltering protection. This Princess comes closest to representing true altruistic love.

Symbolism

Swan:	Represents freedom from negative emotions. Symbolic of a sense of altruism
Open arms:	Symbolic of voluntary love and protection of all in her embrace
Lotus:	Symbolizes inner beauty and willingness to be a giving lover
Pink cloak:	As if falls from one shoulder, represents both her sexuality and her sensuality. The color pink represents her passion for romance, tinged with the innocence of unpretentiousness.
Tortoise:	Represents fertility
Dolphin:	Represents the gift of communication and insight; an understanding of the past
Adrift in water:	Symbolizes fluidity of emotion and action

Interpretation

DIGNIFIED:	News of a engagement, marriage, or birth. Can also symbolize a commitment to a relationship, even though unsure of the outcome. Also indicative of feelings and emotions that are correctly perceived. Pertaining to a specific individual, it symbolizes one who is very sensitive and has a childlike quality.
ILL-DIGNIFIED:	Possible deception that will be revealed. Pertaining to a specific individual, it is symbolic of one who has very low self-esteem. It can also

	symbolize a spoiled-child personality.
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PRINCESS OF WANDS

Earth of Fire

The Princess of Wands is known as the Free Spirit. She is symbolic of Fire's fuel and the passionate heat of the Fire. She tames the beast of fear. She is shown in the card to be shunning all that is mundane and physical; she has turned her back is flying away from it all. She is complete self-expression, in total disregard of all that is socially acceptable.

The individual who has this card as a significator is very likely to attract explosive people and situations. She is likely to be a complete individualist; brilliant, fiery, and daring. Even if she is not pretty by society's standards, she seems beautiful because of her never-ending energy.

The Princess of Wands is impulsive, aggressive, and not easily satisfied in either love or anger. She can seem to overpower everything near her. She is driven, ambitious, and enthusiastic. At times she can seem irrational, and patience is not one of her virtues.

Symbolism

Flame Dance:	Symbolic of the freedom and liberation felt after conquering fears
Dead tiger:	Dragged behind her, it represents the vanquished fear
Altar:	Symbolic of metamorphosis and the newly-emerging Self. It also represents abandonment of the past
Wand:	Represents the power of the Sun. It also represents this persona: strong and fiery
Headpiece:	(Looks like antennae) Symbolic of new awareness, and an increased sense of justice
Flame/Nudity:	Symbolizes a sense of physical abandon; passion, fire, and love of sex

Interpretation

DIGNIFIED:	Symbolizes some form of communication about exciting news. Also represents conquered fears and new beginnings, as well as a recognition of inner strength. Pertaining to an individual, one who is ambitious and enthusiastic; quick to respond emotionally.
ILL-DIGNIFIED:	Bad or disappointing news. Also, possibly a domineering, manipulative, untrustworthy, dishonest individual. It can also represent listlessness or

	extreme shyness.
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PRINCESS OF SWORDS

Earth of Air

The Princess of Swords is known as The Renewer. She represents the earthy part of Air and is symbolic of clarity, the victory over emotional moods, and of rebellion itself; she is mental and intellectual acuity.

Where the Princess of Cups represents the power to materialize dreams, the Princess of Swords is the actual manifestation. The sword represents cutting away past inner conflicts in order to clarify current and future vision.

While the Princess of Swords represents rebellion, this act of rebellion is not rooted in any emotional ideology. It represents rebellion in the name of openness and truth. It's symbolic of one who will not be intimidated, and who will accept no obstacle when it comes to fully experiencing of life. Her essence consists of uncompromising beliefs and commitments. It is the passion of the mind.

The specific individual represented by this card is uncompromising, stern, and has a great wisdom of the physical world. She is firm and aggressive, and deals well with practical issues. She is also extremely clever and would make an excellent mediator.

Symbolism

Ashes:	Represents the demolished altar of emotional conflicts and fears. It is symbolic of new clarity of vision and the conquering of fear
Her rise above dark clouds:	Represents the ability to rise above emotional confusion, accomplished through use of the intellect
Sword:	Both sword and the storm represents a commitment to personal beliefs. Symbolic of one who is opinionated and a great debater
Green dress:	Symbolic of her good mental. health. Also, manifestation of dreams into reality

Interpretation

DIGNIFIED:	Grace, agility, prudence. Good negotiator. Message of changes to come. Commitment to a new way of life, despite risks.
ILL-DIGNIFIED:	Ill-health; unforeseen events which cause changes of plans. Need for discipline.



PRINCESS OF PENTACLES

Earth of Earth

The Princess of Pentacles is known as The Creatrix. She represents the earthy part of Earth and is symbolic of pregnancy and birth, renewal, and Mother Earth. She is fierce in her resolve to protect all Life.

The Princess of Pentacles also gives life to ideas, thoughts, and identities. She is the point at which the idea becomes reality. She is strong and beautiful; the sum of "Woman."

Symbolism

Crystal Staff:	Points downward, symbolizing work which still needs to be accomplished
Upper Staff:	The staff extends beyond the border of the card, representing enlightenment of the Spirit
Headdress:	The ram's horns are symbolic of actively entering to some new arena

of life.

Boa cape: Represents protectiveness towards personal creations

Shield: Yin/Yang; represents perfect balance and harmony

Stalks of wheat and flowers: Symbolizes fertility and abundance

Braided Hair: Responsibility of commitment (3 strands in a braid = father, mother, child)

Unbraided Hair: Symbolic of the need for freedom even within committed relationships

Grove of trees: Represents unity of spirit with matter; the victory over obstacles

Interpretation

DIGNIFIED:	Something new coming into your life. Also represents dedication of energy and/or resources to a seemingly risky project; calculated risk-taking. Pertaining to an individual, represents one who is practical and studious.
ILL-DIGNIFIED:	Bad news regarding financial situation. Lack of regard for or knowledge of the value of money. Pettiness; impracticality.

THE QUEENS



The Queens of the Tarot represent not only women, but anyone, male or female, who has reached a level of growth and maturity on the spiritual as well as the material path. This maturity has led them to positions of power and authority. The Queens represent fulfillment and competency.

The Queens are the highest of the Court Cards, for they have attained the highest qualities symbolized within the Major Arcana. All Queens are shown seated on thrones, bearing the emblems of their suits.

The significance of more than one queen in a single spread is as follows.

Four Queens in a Single Spread	Governments and institutions
Three Queens in a Single Spread	Groups of women; powerful friends
Two Queens in a Single Spread	Gossip or slander



QUEEN OF CUPS

Water of Water

The Queen of Cups is the Sensate One, The Feeler. She is ruled by the dreamy, romantic sign of Pisces and represents the emotional part of Water. She gives free rein to her emotions, and is the Mother Spirit.

The individual represented by this card is a reflection of those around her. She gives an illusion of dreaminess and tranquility. She gives and receives all without being emotionally affected by it. She represents the pinnacle of emotional maturity and balance. As with the Empress, she nourishes the needy.

This card emphasizes the need to open up and allow true feelings to show. Although there may be those who do not understand, there should be commitment and sharing with those who do. It speaks of emotional balance. Both lust and love are necessary. However, they should be balanced, the instinct in harmony with the transcendent.

Symbolism

QUEEN OF WANDS

Water of Fire

The Queen of Wands is known as The Seer. She represents the watery, emotional part of Fire and is ruled by Aries. She symbolizes self-knowledge, compassion, and change. She illustrates the traits of adaptability, energy, and authority. The Queen of Wands is the most perceptive member of the Royalty. She has undergone complete Self-Transformation and is committed to Truth, which she can instantly perceive. Achieved through deep meditation, her emotional aspect is portrayed through her compassion for all creatures who are still in bondage to their emotions.

The individual represented by this card radiates an inner authority which comes from knowing who and what she is. She has a calm and commanding presence. She is generally kind and generous, but will not allow opposition. She is stubborn in her beliefs. and cannot stand for anyone to contradict them. She makes a terrific friend and lover, but only if she can initiate the relationship; she will not be forced.

Symbolism

Crown: Represents enlightenment and

	remembrance of pain experienced in the achievement of it
Dark spots on leopard:	Symbolic of the darkness in our life which must be overcome before attaining self-realization
Fish Symbol:	Appearing on her breast, symbolic of the union of water and fire, of emotion and intuition. Represents compassion and sensitivity
Staff:	Extends beyond the border of the card, symbolizing the need to remain grounded in the search for self-actualization
Pine Cone:	Symbolizes spiritual growth and enlightenment
Fiery Colors:	Symbolize strength, energy, and passion
Hand on Leopard:	Symbolic of protectiveness towards all unself-actualized creatures

QUEEN OF SWORDS

Water of Air

The Queen of Swords is the watery part of Air. She is the Crystallizer, the Judgement. She cuts through the masks and securities of the old world. Her vision is farsighted and cannot be trapped by today's illusions. She advises risk-taking by accepting new roles and breaking old habits. In doing so, she promises understanding and liberation.

The individual represented by this card will be attempting to separate from old roles and habits. There should be awareness of the individual's role in family, friendships, and society as a whole. This will not be accomplished without pain, but the rewards will be worth it.

This individual has an accurate perception of the world and its people. She has strong powers of observation, passionate individuality, and is confident in her actions.

Symbolism

Sword: Symbolic of slicing through the masks of illusion

Crystals: Symbolize new clarity and understanding

Old Head: Represents old habits which have been cut away

New head: Represents the emergence of the child of innocence

Queen's Post: Her location high above the clouds symbolizes farsightedness and the ability to see things different perspectives; awareness

Interpretation

DIGNIFIED:	Intelligence, complexity, perceptiveness. Strong in communication. Aggressive, hard-working, and capable. Able to lead a different lifestyle without being threatened by others.
ILL-DIGNIFIED:	Deceit, cunning, narrow-mindedness, and intolerance. Danger of insecurity and neurosis. Possible sexual dysfunction.



QUEEN OF PENTACLES

Water of Earth

The Queen of Pentacles is the Succeeder, and represents the watery part of Earth. She is ruled by Capricorn. Within this card are the seeds of an inner knowing there is more than this physical world. Though success has been achieved, sometimes at great cost, it has still left an emptiness inside. This card can sometimes represent one who is ready to step on the path of the Seeker.

The individual represented by this card is self-sufficient. She has achieved success, and feels her dues have been paid. She takes pride in all that she has accomplished. She is rooted in the material with wealth and health. However, for all her past successes, this individual will still be looking for something. She probably will not know where to look or exactly what she is looking for. She has mastered the material side of life and is now ready to find the spiritual path.

Symbolism

Throne: Symbolic of the rewards of achievement.

Globe in Hand:	Authority, control.
Gold Coins:	Denote financial success.
Snake Dress:	Symbolizes concern for health.
Goat:	Sign of Capricorn. Represents focus, independence, tenaciousness, and courage.
Desert:	Symbolizes the dues she has paid for achievement.
Green Oasis:	Symbolizes the comforts of present rewards.
Horns:	Represents the desire to see that which is beyond; to evolve.
Crystal:	Symbolizes the need to know the true meaning of Life.
Extended Staff:	Indicates being rooted in the physical world.
Colors:	Symbolize money, health, and attainment.
Looking Back:	Symbolizes the knowing that there must be more than what has been achieved.

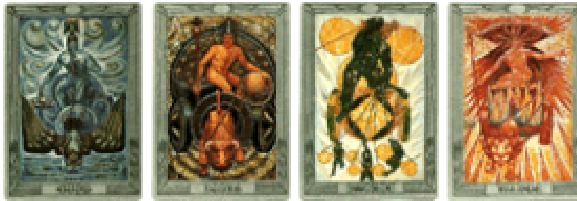

The Princes symbolize passion, intensity, and focus of concentration. There is single-minded purpose involved when they appear in a spread. The purpose of their focus will be related to the element which rules the suit. However, there is also the danger that total focus can be carried to the extreme. In this situation, it can manifest itself as a dogmatic, fixed, and narrow viewpoint.

Each of the Princes is shown in a chariot, and bears a tool representative of his suit. The Prince of Swords bears two swords, one short and one long; the Prince of Cups bears a cup in the hand controlling the reins; the Prince of Wands holds a torch wand aloft; and the Prince of Pentacles shoulders his disk shield.

PRINCE OF CUPS
Air of Water

The Prince of Cups is known as The Transformation. He represents the airy part of Water and rules from Libra to Scorpio, manifesting many of the Scorpio traits. He governs wishes, and desires. He also rules self-transformation, a significant Scorpio influence.

The coloring of this card is designed to strike intense emotional chords. Its purpose is to show the need to master emotional needs and fears. Desires must be recognized as simply the compelling energy of our lives. After this awareness, we must master them in order to use them wisely. This is not accomplished by suppression, but through the awareness of them. This card calls for recognition and acceptance of our innate sexual desires. It does not counsel moderation, nor repression. It simply counsels that we should be the master rather than the slave.

The concepts of self-transformation are seen frequently in this card. The coach is part scorpion and part eagle. The scorpion represents the dark aspects of Soul; the eagle is light of Spirit.

The individual represented by this card can be very subtle and crafty.

He is intensely secret. Even though he may appear calm and unreachable on the surface, he is deeply passionate. He may seem easily influenced, but it is often just an illusion. He secretly makes use of all information he gathers.

Inherent in this are his qualities of individuality, ambitiousness, justice, and straightforwardness. His is a pioneering personality, as symbolized by his crossed legs which form the number 4, the number of the master builder.

The individual represented by this card is easily influenced by external circumstances and is inclined to act on impulse. He is often violent in his desire to see the ideals of truth and creativity upheld. He is fair and just, but in

his heart of hearts, he knows that true justice is not to be found in this world. Therefore, he tends to look beyond this world for guidance and inspiration, thus earning his title as the Seeker. He is the essence of intuitive creativity, and he pours his energy into the creation of his dreams.

This individual can also be an extravagant boaster. He loves to argue simply for the sake of arguing; the original devil's advocate. He is a romantic, but people often fear him without knowing any specific reason for their fear. His intensity of purpose and constant motion tend to make bad first impressions.

He charts a new course for others to follow, stirs the hearts of the rebellious, and then stands back to let others finish the task.

In order to achieve this degree of intellectual commitment, this individual must be totally free and unrestricted. Therefore, he shuns anything which suggests attachments or ties. He forcefully cuts loose anything that seeks to bind him, whether it be a person, place, belief, or emotion.

He is unshakable, stubborn, and bull-headed. He is also enduring, a good manager, and a responsible worker. He is competent, trustworthy, and cautious, but also curious. He is always looking for new uses for

old things. He is a typical plodder; trustworthy and good, but almost entirely lacking in emotion. He is slow to anger, but unappeasable when he does explode.

This type of person will stop at nothing to build his fortune. Everything and everyone is something what can be used for his gain. His determination is unmatched.

The Knight of Cups is the fiery part of Water, The High Flyer, ruled by Cancer. He is the power of solution; the ecstasy of emotion. He embodies romance and passion.

The individual represented by this card will generally assume a passive role. He lives best in a world of emotions, dreams, and sensuality. He is graceful of figure, very stylish and debonair, and quite friendly. He is quick to respond to the slightest encouragement, but his affections are not enduring.

The conflict between fire and water is evident in this individual. These two elements are likely to cause great difficulty unless there is adequate knowledge for integration and balance. If harmony and balance is not achieved and maintained, there is mismanagement of personal affairs. Failure and disaster seem to lurk behind every corner.

The individual represented by this card is fair-minded. He will consider all relevant points of view but will not be swayed once he has decided which way is best. He will pursue his goals with single-minded purpose. He is the epitome of goal-oriented activity.

This individual's feet are planted firmly on the ground. He knows exactly what he wants, and will not rest until he achieves it. Since he is ruled by Air, intellectual ability and imagination are strong in him. He is full of ideas that come like lightening bolts from the heavens.

He tempers his goal-oriented mentality with emotional awareness. When needed, he lends this passion to his goals. This makes him not only single-minded, but also fanatical at times.

The individual represented by this card lives a plodding life with a preoccupation for material things. He is quite patient, but not at all intellectual. Any success is due to instinct and hard work, for he tends to lack imagination.

Hard work, responsibility, and commitment are the words for this individual. He may want to reach beyond the physical plane, but it is doubtful that this will be realized. Any attempt to seek beyond the physical would probably seem to be an escapist maneuver from material responsibilities. This is not to insinuate that there is no longing for freedom, only the belief that it cannot be attained in this physical world.

This individual is stable, hard-working, and totally trustworthy. He may never become fabulously rich, but he will never want for much in the way of material things.

- Exhaustion: Both Knight and steed seem near exhaustion, indicating fatigue of the world

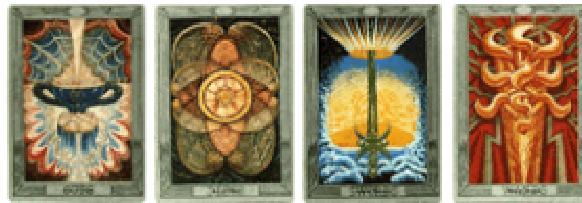

Card combinations are when 2 or more cards of the same card number appear in a spread. For example, 3 of the 4 "Five" cards, or 2 of the "Ten" cards. These combinations can give you added information for the spread, because each of the card groups deal with an essence. The individual cards within the group merely refine that essence.

However, it can indicate an highly individualized, personal realization of the true meaning of altruistic love.
