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Q&A - "What are the rules of conduct for the IRC chatroom?"

There are only a few basic rules in the WiccaUK chat room (accessed either by the java interface on the site or via IRC clients such as mIRC at irc.highlandfox.com - #WiccaUK) however as is suspected all users must abide by these rules to be allowed to use this integral part of WiccaUK.

The general rules are as fol-

- 1)Swearing on the channel although largely permitted should not be offensive and over the top.
- 2) If an Op asks you to stop doing something and you don't then you are liable to be kicked and banned from the channel for the remaining day or depending on severity at the ops discretion.
- 3) Scripts are not allowed on the channel
- 4)Non- authorized bots are not allowed

on the channel.

5) Impersonating other members is not allowed. To unsure this does not happen users are encouraged to register their nickname.

The Structure of WiccaUK

In January 2003 WiccaUK adopted an Association structure. This basically means that Full Members own the site, and major decisions are voted on by them. Day to day decisions are made up by a Management Committee. Each year we will hold an Annual General Meeting (AGM) to which all Full Members are invited. Here we'll put important decisions to vote and discuss the previous year, the achievements of WiccaUK and what we aim to achieve in the next year.

The current committee consists of six people. Casparian is Chairman and looks after general running of the site and organization. Mage is Treasurer, looking after our bank account and making decisions on funding of projects. Janika is our events-

coordinator, organizing regional moots and events and keeping our calendar up to date. Silvertree is our Website Editor, adding new news stories and articles to the site and Arual and Sparks are Membership Services Managers, who deal with problems members face including passwords not working and site improvement suggestions.

The committee is bound by our Constitution, which sets out what it's allowed to do and how it's run. It also ensures members are aware who is liable, and sets out specifics such as membership fees.

Becoming a Full Member achieves two important aims. First of all, it gives you the right to complain if you

WiccaUK May London Moot

The WiccaUK London moot officially outgrew its old mooting grounds in March and so from the April moot onwards there is a new venue.

The new venue is the Griffin at Charing Cross in the centre of London, which as well as being bigger than the old Black Widow it is easier for the majority of people to get to too.

A door charge of £3 will now be applied to the moots in order to pay for the venue.

To get to the Griffin there are a number of routes. From Charing Cross rail station come out of the main exit and turn right from the station. Start walking parallel to the Strand and turn down the first street on your right, Villiers Street and the Griffin will be in front of you on the corner of the street.

From Embankment station. Come out of the station (not the river side exit) and walk up to the top of Villiers street. The Griffin will be right at the top by Charing Cross rail station on the The Griffin corner.

Beltane

Beltane is the second of the fire festivals, celebrated around the end of April and the beginning of May, this is a greater Sabbat, a cross-quarter festival. The God, seen as the Stag king is coming into his manhood and coming into mature power, the antlers representative of the Horned God, the Oak King begins his rule over the light half of the year. This sabbat is called after the Celtic god, Bel. Beltane is also sacred to the Maia, the Greco-Roman goddess of spring.

This sabbat is best known for fertility and healing, the great bonfire is represents the gate to other worlds. As the fire burned down, cattle would be driven through the flames to bless and heal them. Jumping over the fire three times for luck and couples could seal their vows by jumping over the fire together.

A time of self-discovery, love, union and developing the potential for

personal growth. May morning is also considered a magical time for wild water (dew, flowing streams, and springs), which is collected and used to bathe in for beauty, or to drink for health. It is said that any Maiden that bathes in this water will be fair of complexion for the following year.

The May pole is a focal point of many old English village rituals, symbolic of fertility. People would rise at the first light of dawn to collect flowers and branches to decorate homes.

Women traditionally would braid flowers into their hair. Men and women alike would decorate their bodies. Beltane marks the return of vitality, of passion.

Many Pagan traditions say that Beltane marks the emergence of the young God into manhood. Stirred by the energies at work in nature he desires the Goddess, with the result that they fall in love and unite. The Goddess becomes pregnant of the God (though in some Traditions this is celebrated at Ostara instead). To celebrate, a wedding feast, for the God and Goddess should be prepared.

The Next Level of Thinking

Remember I'm just an idiot so don't hurt me if I get something right or wrong. This all comes out of my head so if I end up copying what someone has already said before, it was by chance

There I was sitting in the library drifting in and out of my own thoughts, pen in hand and just letting my hand flow over the page till something came along. A Bards Path

What is my path...? I am a Bard - What is a Bard?

bard (P) Pronunciation Key (bärd)n.

- 1. One of an ancient Celtic order of minstrel poets who composed and recited verses celebrating the legendary exploits of chieftains and heroes.
- 2. A poet, especially a lyric poet.

Not an easy thing to answer, but it comes down to writing and music for me. I'm a Celt and follow the ways of the Brigantes.

My path is to try and find Awen, the divine spark, the power of inspiration.. It's Awen that sets Bards against all others, the inspiration, the breath of Dagda. The chief bard, head of all bards, is said to be an embodiment of that breath, that inspiration.

That doesn't really tell you much. What people really want is a steadfast definition and description of what a bard is, which to my knowledge doesn't exist. The concept of barddom has changed with the times, but the spirit of the bard remains the same. Modern society Therefore, for me being a bard is about

raising awareness of issues, entertaining those that are interested, learning and in turn sharing what I learn of the old ways. It's complicated and I'm still learning. Bard's wrote many things down, but they often wrote in a code language such as coelbren, which I am in the process of learning.

The bardic ways faded out as early as one thousand years ago. About two hundred years ago, the romantic movement in poets and the rise of historians studying the myths and lore of great Britain, rather than what many consider the more interesting myths of the rest of Europe, caused many poets, writers, and musicians to seek out and follow the principles of Barddom and druidry.

The restoration of Bardic ways has led to several organizations of Bards and druids. One of note are OBOD (Order of Bards, Ovate, and Druids) who teach a very interesting, and worthwhile, training course. They also have numerous seed groups and groves that ensure that many people of many areas are covered. I follow many druid ways; I respect life, and the circle of life. I am very romantic in the way I see bards, though television and radio have made it hard to follow this romantic vision. Bard's traditionally were like the news service, but they

were much more than that. Spreading my poetry around, allowing all to seem is the closest way I can follow the basic principles.


I pray rather than practice magic, though on occasion when the need arises I have been known to cast a spell or ward. When the druids were in decline, and even before in regions where the druids were not popular, they controlled the coronations of kings and queens. They taught what needed to be taught, they were soothsayers, and they were doctors, jack-of-all-trades so to speak, though their stock in trade will be their words and the harp.

I am not nearly that far, but I'm learning, and being a bard matches my creative side. I'm a poet and an author, but more importantly it just feels as though I have a purpose, it feels right for me.

This is just a narrow look at what it is to be Bard from my point of view. There are many of ways and practices. There are several good resources such as OBOD (Order of Bards, Ovate, and Druids) at www.druidry.org and there are some good resources just going through the threads at www.wiccauk.com.

Book to complement this article- "Ogham and Coelbren - Keys to the Celtic Mysteries" by Nigel Pennick




Explores the "wattles and branches" of the Celtic tree alphabets and the treelore of the British Isles. It is a wide ranging explanation of, and commentary on, Celtic tree traditions, covering the Oghams of Ireland and the Bardic alphabets of Wales. These symbolic systems encapsulate the ancestral spiritual traditions of the British Isles; their teaching express the Druidic world-view and ways of thought that contemporary education has forgotten. Ogham and Coelbren contains the variants of the Irish Ogham tree "alphabet" –its colors, trees, birds and

symbols, cryptic codes and hidden inner meanings that encapsulate a creative energy available today. The Welsh Bardic system is also detailed, with rare illustrations from scarce texts. A comprehensive appendix details the meanings, correspondences and cosmology that Ogham and Coelbren contain.

Healing with Gemstones and Crystals (Crossing Press Healing Series)






Triumph of the Moon - Ronald Hutton



A Beginners Guide to the Craft Herblore

Kitchen Witch & WhiteWolf

For as long as anyone can remember people have been using not just Herbs, but other Plants and Trees to help with their magical and healing work. The information below is for reference purposes only and should be used only by those who have required or inherited knowledge.

Caution some plants can be fatal if misused.

Basil

Ocimum basilicum, St. Josephs Wort, Sweet Basil

Planet: Mars **Element**: Fire

Once native to India and Persia only, and still a sacred herb to the Hindus, basil is an annual plant much used now in Mediterranean cookery. Basil contains an aromatic and volatile camphorbearing oil, which gives it its marvellous clove-like fragrance and accounts for its use in cooking,

potpourris and perfumery. A delicious tea can also be prepared from the leaves, which is though to allay mild nervous tension headaches and nausea.

Lore: Basil is attractive to dragons, salamanders, and other fire-oriented creatures. It is sacred to the Hindu god Vishnu and his avatar, Krishna. Magical herbals occasionally refer to it as St. Joseph's Wort. Many cultures used basil in herbal medicine, which is not covered in this article.

Magical Uses

Main magical uses: Consecration, divination (esp. about love), exorcism, fertility, fidelity, good luck, happiness, harmony, love, money, passion, peace, prosperity, protection, psychic

development, psychic protection, purification, strength, success, tranquillity

Other magical uses: Clairvoyance, commanding, courage, dragons, grieving, hatred, honesty, Imbolc, initiation, inspiration, invocation, prevents theft, rituals for the dead, spell-breaking

Basil oil rubbed on a green candle before burning will attract wealth.

Use Basil as a floor wash to rid house of all evil and negativity. The incense smoke is beneficial for the same, plus banishing, exorcising and for protection.

Basil - for money and success. Soak in

water for 3 days, and then sprinkle about a place of business. Also used for purification and protection and to remove obstacles in love and create harmony. Dispels melancholy and attracts friends.



Growing

There are many different varieties of Basil, the most popular one being Sweet Basil or *Ocimum basilicum*. Basil is an annual, and should be grown afresh every year. It likes a rich moist soil with plenty of sun, and can grow up to 2 feet in height. I have found the best way to grow it is in a pot outside the back door in the sun, or inside on a sunny windowsill, in a well draining compost. Keep it well watered, and the leaves should not become tough. I grew my plants from small plants from the garden centre, but you may want to try growing them from seed, or from small plug seedlings.

You can buy various types of basil besides the "sweet" variety, the other most popular being "bush" basil. All



posses the same properties, however. The herb grows with a square stem in section; smooth, slightly toothed, oval leaves, which give off a strong clove fragrance when crushed; and white, pink or red whorls of flowers which nestle in the axils of the leaves (where the leaf joins the stem).

For further advice about growing herbs, consult your local garden centre, or the web is also a good source of advice.

Culinary uses

Basil has a special affinity with tomatoes; it deliciously enhances tomato sauces, as well as adding an extra dimension to tomato salads.

This herb can be used freely in hot dishes and raw in salads, it has a distinctive flavour reminiscent of aniseed, only gentler.

Try adding raw basil leaves to a mixed green salad for a little extra flavour dimension.

Or add a scattering of finely shredded basil leaves to Wensleydale or Philadelphia cheese sandwiches.

Or if you want to be really pretentious, quickly deep fry whole basil leaves and use to garnish poached salmon.

Noted below are a couple of my favourite recipes that use basil as a main flavouring.



Further Recipes

Red salad with Green dressing Some large, VERY red tomatoes Bunch of Basil Olive oil

Salt & pepper to taste

'Red Salad with Green dressing' Sliced tomatoes, basil and optional buffalo mozzarella



If the tomatoes have been kept in the fridge, bring them out and allow them to warm up to room temperature before beginning the dish.

Slice the tomatoes finely across the middle, discarding the tough stalk centre.

Finely chop or blend the basil and mix with salt & pepper and olive oil to make a thick green dressing.

Lay the tomatoes in a broad dish, overlapping slightly.

Drizzle the dressing over the tomatoes and serve immediately.

Simple tomato pasta sauce

1 large Onion, finely sliced 2 cloves of garlic, finely chopped

1 tin of tomatoes, ready chopped if you

prefer

A good squirt of Tomato puree A good glug of Olive oil Lots of basil (1 or 2 bunches), shredded Black pepper

Salt to taste

Gently fry the onions and garlic in the olive oil in a large pan until softened.

Add the tomatoes and tomato puree and stir well.

Season well with lots of black pepper.

Allow to gently cook over a low heat for about an hour until slightly reduced.

Check the seasoning, add a little salt if desired.

Add the shredded basil and stir well. Heat gently for about 3 or 4 minutes.

Serve with spiral pasta. Garnish with more shredded basil if desired.
