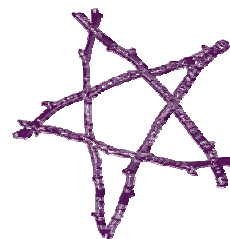

water them. If you have the right soil conditions, Rosemary will also make a very aromatic and pretty hedge.

Culinary uses

Rosemary is a very strongly flavoured, intensely aromatic herb, and so I would recommend using it in moderation, or it could easily overpower the flavour of the dish you are preparing.

Try adding some Rosemary twigs to the barbecue, as they burn they give off lovely aromatic and mouth-watering scents.

Rosemary is traditionally associated with roast Lamb, and is usually used as a flavouring in Lancashire Hotpot, below.



Lancashire Hotpot

750g potatoes, peeled and sliced

750g stewing lamb, cubed

1 large onion, sliced

2 approx 15cm sprigs of Rosemary

freshly ground black pepper

1 lamb stock cube dissolved into 1 mug of water

Arrange a layer of potato at the bottom of a

casserole dish, and season well.

Add a layer of onion, and a layer of lamb, and the stock.

Add the rosemary sprigs.

Add another layer of potato, onion and lamb, finishing with a layer of potato.

Cover with a lid or foil, and bake in a moderate oven (170C, gas mark 4) for about 2 hours.

Remove the cover or lid and bake for a further 15 minutes.

Serve with pickled red cabbage.

Pan Fried Golden Potatoes with Rosemary and Lemon

500g of Desiree Potatoes

2 tablespoons of Olive Oil

2 teaspoons of finely chopped fresh Rosemary

Finely grated zest of 1 Lemon

Salt and Pepper to taste.

Gently fry the potato slices in the olive oil, over a medium heat, until golden and crisp on the bottom.

Carefully turn them and cook until the second side is also golden and crisp.

Toss the cooked potatoes with the Rosemary and Lemon zest, and season to taste.

For as long as anyone can remember people have been using not just Herbs, but other Plants and Trees to help with their magical and healing work. The information below is for reference purposes only and should be used only by those who have required or inherited knowledge.

Caution some plants can be fatal if misused.

Rosemary

Rosmarinus officinalis

Planet: Sun

Element: Fire



Rosemary originated in the Mediterranean and is now widely established. It is associated in Shakespeare's play "Hamlet" with remembrance, so its link to memory is old. Even older are its associations with general magic and healing, with feminine power--folklore had it that a healthy rosemary plant grew where a woman was head of the family--and with goddesses, especially of the sea. Catholic healers associated it with Mary. Its reputation is that of an all-purpose herb that will help with practically anything. In Elizabethan times, the wedding couple carried a sprig of Rosemary as a sign of fidelity. During the Plague, people would wear it in neck pouches to sniff as they travelled. Rosemary is the herb traditionally placed in chests filled with books or clothing to repel moths. It also has a longstanding reputation for strengthening the memory, raising the spirits and expelling apathy, nervous exhaustion and digestive disturbances caused by anxiety. It has been used in conjunction with juniper berries for centuries to purify the air.

Magical Uses

Main magical uses: cleansing, confidence, consecration, courage, exorcism, good luck, grieving, happiness, healing, knowledge, love, memory, passion, peace of mind, prevents theft, protection, psychic development, psychic protection, purification, release, ritual, rituals for the dead, water rites/sea rituals, weddings

Other magical uses: blessings, dreams, endings, energy, elves, fidelity, honesty, inspiration, invocation, longevity, meditation, new moon, prevents nightmares, sleep, strength, transformation, wisdom, Yule

WARNING

Rosemary oil should not be used internally. Also, extremely large doses of the leaf are toxic, possibly causing abortion, convulsions and, very rarely, death.

Growing

Rosemary is an evergreen hardy perennial, and will grow to be quite large shrubs if allowed to. If trimming is necessary then do this only after the danger of frosts is passed, as if the plant does get frosted after trimming there is a danger that the plant might die. It likes to be in a sunny position with well drained soil, and in more northerly areas it is best to grow it against a south facing wall. The less hardy varieties do very well in containers, provided you do not over

Willow The Wisp

‘“But you’re not a real Witch like Willow,” my boyfriend said.’ In the middle of a long paragraph in the WiccaUK forums sat that captivating line. UPN have now shown the final episode of *Buffy The Vampire Slayer* and with the imminent conclusion to *Sabrina The Teen-Age Witch* on the cards, the media is left without a Witch. I doubt that those who spend their afternoons chuckling at the antics of Mildred Hubble in CITV’s *The Worst Witch* series will become converts to the craft.

Kate West in *The Real Witches Handbook* comments: “Witches are now portrayed as younger, attractive women. They are seen to make people fall in love, to gain revenge on their enemies and even to conjure up uncompleted homework.” Wicca and Witchcraft’s relationship with the media is complex. When Stephen King writes about Vampires, his publishers don’t expect Vampires to pick up a copy and then review it add nausea on a website dedicated to Vampires and their interests. If I sent a synopsis to a publisher detailing a novel concerning a Witch walking their dog, watching long-winded Omnibuses of Eastenders and occasionally going down the pub, I’d be laughed at for some considerable time. On the one hand, the portrayal of the Witch in the media must be “realistic.” No women with warts over their face enduring accusations about curdling the milk of the local townsfolk. On the other, the portrayal of the Witch shouldn’t be realistic to the point of boredom.

The reason behind this unholy union between the ordinary and the fantastic lies in possession. Traditionally, the media thought it owned the Witch. Witchcraft was the stuff of myths and legends. Children

would stick fake warts onto their faces and demand candy on your doorstep once a year. History speaks volumes on the Witchcraft trials. Young women subjected to torture by nervous Catholicism and Puritanical pressure. I remember one Halloween the family sat playing *Atmosfear III: The Witch*. The video board game where a beautiful woman damned for her beliefs slowly turned into a hag harassed players. Stereotype fell on its knees when the media turned around in real life and saw a Witch.

It is well known that episodes of Father Ted enraged the Catholic Church and this sudden loss of the Witch from our screens may well be an example of a growing unease within the media when it comes to religions. The Witch is no longer on her own. A television programme that said that all Muslims did all day was plan terrorist attacks would buy the station a season ticket to court. Books on how to study the Craft and advice on finding covens have matched fiction featuring Witchcraft. Viviane Crowley details the psychology of Wicca in her latest book *The Last Magician*. We are not the stuff of legends anymore and things are changing. As inspirational and all this is, it sets a precedence some may find uneasy. For if something the general populous thought was confined to Salem and Halloween is starring them in the face, then what else exists out there?

ade, or to turn inside and make your fears your own.

This is the province of the Dark Priestess³): to reveal the Shadows inside of those who come to her for guidance. She will seem harsh, remorseless; saying it as it is without padding up her message, but she will not be dragged into the healing process of facing one’s daemons. She will reveal, but it’s up to the seeker to do with those revelations as he will.

The strength of a Dark Priestess is to see and understand what needs be done, and do it without a shred of hesitation. She will strip you naked and tear you to pieces and throw you in the deepest depths of your Soul, where you will rest, heal and be remade. It is a truly transforming experience, but it is not the Dark Priestess who transforms you ... you are. If you do not truly wish to be reborn; if you are not ready to face the Dark within, anything a Dark Priestess does will bounce off your self-imposed prison walls. Only you have the power to break free.

As a teacher, the Dark Priestess will answer your question with a counter question, directing you there where all knowledge resides: inside. She knows that if that which you seek you cannot find within, you will never find it without⁴). She is strict and severe and will slap you down if you cross the line – but it is all done with your growth in mind.

Gardeners know that pruning is necessary; cut out the bits that will hamper the tree’s growth. The Dark Priestess works just like that. She sees a trait or development that will stunt your growth, and hands you the pruner for you cut it out straightaway. Again: the choice is yours. Either you cut it out and continue your growth, or you ignore her and go your own way.

No matter how harsh her words, all is said in the hope that you will take it to heart and juggle it in order to find your own Code of Ethics. As a newly initiated Priestess I’ve been at the receiving end of it. I crossed a line, transgressed an Oath, and was most severely slapped down for it. I had a good think about it and came back saying that I chose to give the Rede prevalence over the Oath because if in that particular case I hadn’t, I would have caused harm to both the person involved and myself. Instead of the

expected further punishment, my words were welcomed with praise and pride, because I had developed my own moral standards and stood up for them.

So, coming Full Circle to our collective Fear of the Dark: is our fear unreasonable? It certainly isn’t. Facing the Dark within is one of the most terrifying ordeals a person can experience. But as so many survivors of ordeals have said: it transforms. Often accredited to Friedrich Nietzsche, the age old wisdom stands: That which doesn’t kill us, makes us stronger.

The Dark Night of the Soul—part II

Little has changed, over the centuries. Science still denies the obvious because it cannot be proven with current scientific methods, and nations' leaders are still keen to wage war in the name of their God. Even although the Witchcraft Acts have now been repelled¹⁾, we still have to tread carefully, and although our religion was counted in the 2001 Census²⁾ held in the United Kingdom we are still unnoticed at large but for our 'freaky rituals' that are so viciously distorted in the media. The original invaders who destroyed Goddess worship and created the circumstances for a male dominated world were just like the early Roman Church, and today's leaders, afraid of what they didn't understand: the Dark Goddess, whose presence and powers were immeasurable against their male analytic standards.

It is perfectly natural: that which we do not know, we fear. And that which we fear and refuse to face over time grows an ever more terrifying face, until we begin to believe that a mere look at it will paralyze us; its evil eye will render us helpless and defenseless. Who would want to face that? Who in her right mind would seek the presence of such evil? And so those of us who wish to live a complete life, whole unto ourselves and in the presence of both Lord and Lady, are branded evil-doers; satan worshippers and wielders of dark sorceries.

So very few are prepared to look beyond what Church and society deem acceptable; so few ready to face the scourge of rejection and ridicule. For that is only too often what we face in taking up our path: ceaseless attempts to 'save our souls', endless lectures on good and evil and the dark ... but none of them truly understand the Dark, nor are they willing to explore. They prefer to stay safe within the prescribed boundaries of their moral high ground, and judge from above.

I cannot blame them.

It takes great strength, courage and determination to explore the Dark that is within each and

every one of us. It means defying the prevailing attitude of society that you should keep a stiff upper lip, and that you should pick yourself up and carry on instead of being such a weakling. It takes coming to the understanding that society's got the wrong end of the stick here and you know better. You know that the pretence society expects of you is the easy way out; that it is nothing but running away from the real issue. You know you can run, but you can't hide. You know that sooner or later that which is hurting now will catch up with you, so what the heck, you might as well face it now.

So instead of acting 'normal', as if nothing's wrong, you listen to your heart, and you give in to your feelings – pain, anger, despair, loneliness, fear. You turn inwards and face your daemon, and you don't back away from it. And the closer you get to it, the more you understand it, and the veils of mystery surrounding you begin peeling away.

Then, suddenly, you are face-to-face with it, and there is nothing but pure unadulterated agony, and you let it wash over you and take you. You lay down your head and cry, safe in the inner sanctum of your soul, in the darkness within that soothes and heals and prepares you for what is next. You are in the loving arms of the Dark Goddess and you understand that you have just come full circle for the first time, crashing down into darkness but knowing you will rise again, like the moon in her eternal cycle of light.
