

## About This Book

The basis for this Book of Shadows is an unfinished manuscript Scott Cunningham started more than thirty years ago. The way it was placed in an envelope with the title shows us Scott intended it to be published.

We believe it would be a disservice to publish it in "the raw," and for that reason we have excerpted passages from Scott's previously published books to serve as introductions to sections or to create bridges where material was not completed. The primary resource was *Wicca: A Guide for the Solitary Practitioner*, and those passages are noted for clarity. None of Scott's original words were changed for this book.

The original manuscript was produced on a red IBM Selectric® typewriter, and many of those pages have been reproduced exactly as they were created, including Scott's handwritten notes and corrections in the margins. Also, many of the hand-drawn symbols and related artwork have been reproduced just as he drew them.

This is not a traditional Book of Shadows because Scott intended to create something truly unique. The genesis of that idea and the content of the book is explained in the "How to Use This Book" section written by Scott's publisher, Carl Llewellyn Weschcke.

The appendices contain memories of Scott from some of his siblings, teachers, and closest friends.



**Scott Cunningham**

Scott Cunningham learned about Wicca while still in high school, and practiced elemental magic for over twenty years. He was the author of more than forty books, both fiction and non-fiction, sixteen of them published by Llewellyn Publications. He experienced, researched, then wrote about what he learned in his magical training. Scott's books reflect a broad range of interests within the New Age sphere, where he was highly regarded. He passed from this life on March 28, 1993, after a long illness.

## HOW TO USE THIS BOOK

By Carl Llewellyn Weschcke

The book you hold in your hands is neither an ordinary book with its printed pages, nor a Traditionalist Book of Shadows.

Before I explain what the difference is and how to use this book, I want to tell you a few things relating to the author that may help your understanding.

The manuscript for this book had been "lost" among boxes of Scott Cunningham's writings since his death in 1993. His original proposed title was "American Traditionalist Book of Shadows." Due to events over the last quarter century, we felt that the word "Traditionalist" was no longer appropriate philosophically in association with the subject of Wicca.

Make no mistake, Scott Cunningham considered himself a Traditionalist in the original concept of that word: *A deep respect for tradition, especially for cultural or religious practice.* But our dictionary also offers an alternative definition: *The idea that all knowledge comes from divine revelation and is passed on by tradition.* It is this latter definition that gives us some difficulty.

Wicca is not "revealed knowledge" stemming from a single source that becomes established as theologically sacrosanct, but is instead a living tradition that is personally experienced and integrated into *your* life.

Wicca does not have a fixed theology administered and taught by a "Council of Elders" similar to historic authoritarian religions. There are a number of Wiccan churches established to administer to the needs of their membership for such purposes as marriage, funerals, personal counseling, etc., and there are many small covens bringing people together, but most practitioners of Wicca are "solitaries" who see themselves not separated from others by belief and lifestyle but fully integrated into the larger community while finding their spiritual strength from within.

It was mostly for these individuals that Scott wrote his books.



It's important to our understanding of how to use a Book of Shadows to clearly separate Scott Cunningham's writings from the anti-modernism and rigid fundamentalism characterized by that alternative definition of "Traditionalist." It is also important to understand that Cunningham's book is distinctly *American*, not Celtic or European.

Witchcraft is as old as the hills and is basically perceived as a system of nature-based magic and shamanism. Wicca is a modern nature-based religion that absorbed some practices and beliefs from traditional British Witchcraft. Yes, those beliefs and practices are mostly age-old, but they are also universal and readily adapted to the culture in which the practitioners are residents.

It is in this sense of attunement with the ebb and flow of the natural environment, and in the sacredness of those energies and the very soil of the locality, that Wicca has its experiential roots—and not in some claimed revelation from "on high" and held sacrosanct, to be explained to the rest of us by theological authorities.

Scott Cunningham was an American, initiated into a California coven at an early age because of his interests and devotion to natural magic. He had many teachers and he was a persistent researcher, but mostly he learned through practice, meditation, self-study, and experimentation.

Scott wrote more than fifty books on many aspects of Wicca and nature magic during his too-short life (June 27, 1956–March 28, 1993). He had tremendous respect both for his primary subject, Wicca, and for his readers. Yes, he had a deep respect for cultural and religious tradition, but not for historic or religious authority. His authority came from his own research and experience. He was very concerned that nothing he wrote could result in harm to his readers and never provided a ritual, a recipe, or a formula that was not thoroughly tested by himself.



All of this is important to the subject of this essay on *How to Use This Book*.

Traditionally, the student of Wicca interested in joining a coven was given that group's Book of Shadows to copy in longhand. In every sense, that handwritten book was the particular group's *sacred text*, containing basic rituals, celebrations and lore, the Laws, and the names and forms of the divine presence they integrated into their practices. These names and forms, the specific gods and goddesses, are among the most important secrets held by the group members.

But, once copied, the Book of Shadows also became the student's personal *grimoire*, a record book of his or her personal practices, meditations, realizations, experiments, and research. It is a *living book*, just like the life that Scott Cunningham lived.

And this is the point of my little essay. Respect your Book of Shadows, honor Scott and those who have gone before, but never become rigid in your beliefs or practices, for Wicca is a living religion, life is ever changing, and the entire meaning and purpose of your life is to grow and become more than you are. All of us are in the process of *becoming* a whole person, integrating body, emotion, mind, and spirit.

In our magical practices and celebrations we learn to inwardly tap into the collective wisdom (also called the collective unconscious) and bring into our personal consciousness the knowledge we need to grow.

In this book you will find the *Thirteen Goals of a Witch*:

- I. Know yourself
- II. Know the Craft
- III. Learn
- IV. Apply your learning
- V. Achieve balance
- VI. Resist temptations
- VII. Keep your thoughts in good order
- VIII. Celebrate life
- IX. Attune with the cycles of the universe
- X. Breathe and eat correctly

- XI. Exercise both mind and body
- XII. Meditate
- XIII. Honor and worship Diana and Kernunnos

The only one of these goals that I believe needs a little explanation is the thirteenth. Diana and Kernunnos are indeed the names of a goddess and a god, and knowing their names and their form is the key to their worship, but they have also become abstractions and are not the universal aspects of divinity worshipped by all Wiccans. The gods and the goddesses have many names and many forms, and each group or each solitary practitioner must find their own. Deep inside you will find your god and your goddess, and you will know their names and forms.

\* \* \*

This Book of Shadows is your book and your grimoire and can be adapted for group use or for solitary use. It is *your* sacred book.

*How to use this book?* Study and practice. If you are a solitary, begin by living in the cycles of the Sun and the Moon, i.e., by the seasonal celebrations (Sabbats) and the lunar phases of Full and New Moon (Esbats). Even alone, you can assume the roles of priest and priestess, and learn to experience the essence of those energies that are the *tides of life*. A time will come when you will know the presence of both the masculine and feminine forces we know as God and Goddess, whose divinity lives within our body, our feeling, our mind, and our spirit, and who live everywhere. You can speak to them inwardly and outwardly. You can see them in your heart and in your space. You can feel them and know them. And in your spirit you can be with them. If you prefer, you can perceive and receive their divine presence as singular rather than dual. We can't define the "Creator" in any way other than to know the divine is everywhere at all times, and is the Source of all that is.

Don't worry about doing everything exactly as it is in the book. See the book as a guide, not a rule book. You are the center of your universe, and your feet are planted in a particular place unique in space and time that will shape your experience. It is through this experience that you

will grow and become more than you are—ever evolving—and become a whole person, able to handle the powers that will come to you through growth and development.

Crowley said that every man and woman is a star, and *so wilt thou be!*

*Words from  
the Old Ones*

The Book of Shadows is a Wiccan workbook containing invocations, ritual patterns, spells, runes, rules governing magic, and so on. Some Books of Shadows are passed from one Wiccan to another, usually upon initiation, but the vast majority of Books of Shadows today are composed by each individual Wiccan.

Don't believe the stories in most other Wiccan books that one single Book of Shadows has been handed down from antiquity, for each sect of Wicca seems to claim that their own is the original, and they're all different.

Although until recently a Book of Shadows was usually hand-written, today typed or even photocopied versions are quite common. Some Wiccans are even computerizing their books—to create, as friends of mine call it, the “Floppy Disc of Shadows.”

To make your own Book of Shadows, begin with any blank book—these are available in most art stores and bookshops. If you cannot find a bound blank book, any lined exercise book will do. Simply write in this book any rituals, spells, invocations, and magical information that you have either composed or found elsewhere and would like to preserve.

Remember—all Books of Shadows are suggestions as to ritual, not holy writ. Never feel tied down to these words. In fact, many Witches use three-ring binders, shuffling around pages, adding or subtracting information from their Book of Shadows at will.

It is a good idea to copy your spells and rites by hand. Not only does this ensure that you've read the work completely, it also allows easier reading by candlelight. Ideally, all rites are memorized (there's nothing more distracting than having to read or glance at the book), or created spontaneously, but if you would read your rites, be sure your copies are legible by flickering firelight.

## Words from the Elder

But though we are bearers of truth, man does not wish to share our knowledge, so we meet in the shadows and run our rites beneath moon-filled skies. But we are happy.

Live life fully, for that is why we are here; refrain not from earthly life, for from such we grow and learn and understand, until such time that we are reborn to learn more, and to repeat this cycle till we have spiraled up the path to perfection, and can finally call the gods our kindred.

Walk the fields and forests; be refreshed by the cool winds and the touch of a nodding flower. The Sun and Moon sing in the ancient and wild places: the deserted seashore, the hushed valley, the raging waterfall. We are of the earth and should revere her, so walk lightly upon the ground and honor her.

Celebrate the rites on the appropriate days and seasons, and call the gods when the time is meet, but use the power only when necessary; not for frivolous ends. And know that using the power for harm be a perversion in the sight of the gods.

But for those who love and magnify love, as the dew-drop magnifies the sun, the richness of life shall be your reward, and all of nature will celebrate.

So love the gods, and harm none!

## Before Time Was

Before time was, there was Dryghtyn; Dryghtyn was all, and all was Dryghtyn.

And the vast expanse known as the universe was Dryghtyn; all-knowing, all-pervading, all-powerful, changeless, eternal.

And space moved; Dryghtyn molded energy into twin forms, and so the gods were fashioned from Dryghtyn.

The God and Goddess stretched and gave thanks to Dryghtyn, but darkness surrounded them. They were alone, solitary, save for the Dryghtyn.

So they formed energy into gasses and gasses into planets and suns and moons; they sprinkled the universe with whirling globes and so the universe was given shape, by the hands of the God and Goddess.

Light arose and the sky was illuminated by a billion Suns, and the God and Goddess, satisfied by their works, rejoiced, and loved, and were one.

From their union there sprang the seeds of all life, and of the human race, so that we might achieve incarnation upon the Earth.

The Goddess chose the Moon as her living symbol, and the God the Sun as his living symbol, to remind the inhabitants of Earth of their fashioners.

All are born, live, and die beneath the Sun and Moon; and all things come to pass there under, as has been the way of existence before time was.

## The Nature of Our Way

As often as possible, the rites should be held in forests, by the seashore, on deserted mountaintops or near quiet, tranquil lakes. If this is impossible, some chamber will suffice, if it is readied with fumes or flowers.

Seek out the wisdom in books, rare manuscripts, and cryptic poems, if you will, but seek it out also in simple stones and fragile herbs, and in the cry of the wild bird. Listen to the whisperings of the wind and the roar of the ocean if you would discover magic, for it is here that the old secrets are preserved.

Books contain words, trees energies, and wisdom books ne'er dreamed of.

Ever remember that the old ways are constantly revealing themselves; therefore be as the river willow, that bends and sways with the winds of time; that which remains changeless shall outlive its spirit; but that which evolves and grows will shine for centuries.

There can be no monopoly on wisdom; therefore share what you will with whom you will; but hide mystic ways from the eyes of those who would destroy, for to do otherwise increases their destruction.

Mock not the ways or spells of another, for who can say yours are greater in power or wisdom?

Take not one among you who serves to dominate you; who controls and manipulates your workings and reverences. Only within ourselves can true reverence for the old ones occur; therefore look with suspicion on those who would twist worship from you for their own gain.

All should share equally in the workings; thus none shall grow contemptuous of others in our way.

Honor all living things, for we are of the stag, and the salmon, and the bee; so destroy not life, save it be to preserve your own.

Blessings of the ancient ones on all.

## The Law

1. This be the true and great law of the Wicca, ordained and consecrated for our use.
2. And this be the only law that the Wicca shall observe in council in the Circle.
3. All must obey the law if they be of the Craft.
4. The High Priestess shall be your mother, sister, and friend, and all shall obey her commands within the Circle, for she is the Goddess incarnate, and is to be respected. Common consent shall determine her successor, should she not appoint such by her own words.
5. The High Priest shall be your father, brother, and friend; and likewise you shall obey his desires within the Circle. For he is the God incarnate, and is to be respected. Common consent shall determine his successor, should the High Priest not appoint such by his own words.
6. The High Priestess and the High Priest shall each appoint aides, the Maiden and the Page, and their duties shall be to learn the High Priesthood such that they may perform all necessary rites and, with time, form their own coven. For the Craft must not die.
7. All shall be purified ere they step within the sacred Circle, which is anciently the Circle of Stones. All shall bathe and be purified with salt and herbs.
8. All shall be naked or robed, according to desire.
9. Give due worship to the Old Ones, as we have been taught.
10. All shall observe the Sabbats with due ceremony, and after the rites there shall be feasting and dancing, much merriment, to rejoice in the turning of the wheel of the year.
11. Likewise, all of the Wicca, once a month, shall meet to celebrate the March of the Moon and make magic in the God's names.

12. As often as possible, the rites shall be held in forests, by the sea-shore, on deserted mountaintops, or near quiet, tranquil lakes. But if this be impossible, then some chamber with adequate safety against discovery shall suffice, if it be properly purified with rosemary or frankincense.
13. As far as possible make all your actions honorable; for all that you do shall return to you three-fold: three times ill or three times good.
14. Seek out wisdom in books, rare manuscripts, and cryptic poems, if you will; but seek it out also in simple stones and fragile herbs and in the cry of the wild bird; listen to the whisperings of the wind and the roar of the ocean if you would master Wicca, for it be here that our secrets are preserved.
15. Books contain words; trees energies and wisdom that words ne'er dreamed of.
16. Make love with those who you will, but first be clean and free of bonds. And such shall not occur within the Circle, save it be for private rituals before the gods.
17. All shall be properly admitted before attending our Circles, or learning our secrets; thus shall our clan be kept from our oppressors who yet wrong us.
18. And because of such persecution, tell none who be not of the Wicca who your bond-sisters and bond-brothers be; nor tell them of the covenstead; nor the High Priestess; nor the High Priest. And speak not of your own membership: thus shall our persecutors be foiled.
19. Let each write and cherish his own book; and memorize what you can. When danger trembles on the horizon, destroy the book, or have a sister or brother secret it elsewhere, to save it from discovery. Rewrite the book as soon as danger is passed.
20. Let the tools be duly consecrated to our use, and put to no other.
21. None but the Wicca shall see our tools and rites, nor hear of them.

22. For even in these enlightened times, mankind eternally blames his own misery on the Wicca; he knows not that he brings it upon himself. Therefore we meet in the shadows, to preserve our love.
23. Teach those who come to you, if they be worthy. For to keep the Wicca alive it must spread, and to keep it from a worthy person be bane.
24. Those of the Wicca who break the law shall be given fair consideration in full coven.
25. By common consent, the punishment shall be agreed upon, which shall be light. For the second offense, too, a light punishment shall be agreed upon. But for the third offense of the same law, then banishment shall be handed down to the sister or brother, and she or he shall be utterly avoided.
26. But the punishment shall be light, save in case of grave danger or oath-breaking, for we be not as the new religion, with hellfire and angry jaws of death. We be of the old religion of wisdom and love, and communion with nature.
27. Any of the Wicca who knowingly brings enemies into our midst shall be banished and utterly avoided.
28. Honor all living things, for we are of the stag, and the salmon, and the bee; so destroy not life, save it be to preserve your own.
29. A law may be changed, by common consent, if it be out of sense for the day; but this is not to be done lightly, nor for convenience, but with love and wisdom and the good of the Craft in mind.
30. Blessings of the God and Goddess on all.

HERE ENDS THE LAW

*Calling the  
God and Goddess*

In some ways this is the heart of all Wiccan ritual, and indeed is the only necessary part. Wiccan rites are attunements with the powers that are the Goddess and God; all else is pageantry.\*

The word "invocation" shouldn't be taken too literally. This usually refers to a spoken prayer or verse, but may also consist of music, dance, gestures, and song.

There are several invocations to the Goddess and God here. Feel free to use them when designing your own rituals, but remember that impromptu invocations are often more effective than the most ancient prayers.

If you do write up your own invocations, you may wish to incorporate a rhyme. Centuries of magical tradition attest to the value of rhyme. It certainly makes invocations that much easier to memorize.

Rhyme also contacts the unconscious or psychic mind. It drowns our societally, materially, and intellectually based minds and lets us slip into ritual consciousness.

When actually invoking, don't curse if you forget a word, mispronounce something, or entirely lose your train of thought. This is quite natural and is usually a manifestation of fatigue, stress, or a desire to be word perfect in the Circle.

Invocation requires a willingness to open yourself to the Goddess and God. It needn't be a pristine performance. As most rituals begin with invocation, this is, in a sense, the moment of truth. If the invocation isn't sincere, it won't contact the Goddess and God within, and the ritual that follows will be nothing more than form.

Practice invoking the Goddess and God, not only in ritual but daily, throughout your life. Remember: Wiccan practice isn't limited to Full Moons or Sabbats—it is a round-the-clock way of life.

In a more metaphysical sense, invocation is a dual-level act. It not only invokes the Goddess and God, it also awakens us (shifts our awareness) to that part of us that is divine—our inviolable, intransmutable essence: our link with the Old Ones.

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\* Though it should, of course, promote ritual consciousness. Outdoor rituals rarely need as much invocation because the Wiccans are already surrounded by natural manifestations of the deities.

In other words, when you invoke do so not only to higher forces but also to the deities that dwell within, to that spark of divine energy that exists inside all living creatures.

I am mysteries yet unsolved; a path newly set upon; I am a field yet untouched by the plow. Rejoice in me and be free.

I am the blessed mother Demeter, the gracious lady of the harvest. I am clothed with the deep, cool wonder of the earth and the gold of the fields, heavy with grain. By me the tides of the Earth are ruled, all things come to fruit according to my season. I am refuge and healing. I am the mother, giving life to the universe. I have been with you from the beginning and I am with you for eternity.

I, too, am Herne, the Hunter, master of the beasts wild and free. I run with the swift stag's pace and soar as a sacred falcon against the shimmering sky. The ancient woods and wild places emanate my powers and the birds of the air bespeak my hallowedness.

I am also Keeper of the Key of Death and Rebirth; I guide the souls through the Gates of Death and beyond, to the lands of eternal Summer. For without death there cannot be birth, and without birth there cannot be life. Though my gift is death, my promise is life.

*Creating  
Sacred Space*

**T**he Circle defines the ritual area, holds in personal power, shuts out distracting energies—in essence, it creates the proper atmosphere for the rites. Standing within a magic Circle, looking at the candles shining on the altar, smelling the incense, and chanting ancient names is a wonderfully evocative experience. When properly formed and visualized, the magic Circle performs its function of bringing us closer to the Goddess and God.

The Circle is constructed with personal power that is felt (and visualized) as streaming from the body, through the magic knife (athame) and, out into the air. When completed, the Circle is a sphere of energy that encompasses the entire working area. The word "circle" is a misnomer; a *sphere* of energy is actually created. The circle simply marks the ring where the sphere touches the earth (or floor) and continues on through it to form the other half.

### **The Places to Make the Circle of Stones**

The best place to make the Circle is in a clearing in the woods, near a fast-running river, far from the places men go at night. There should be no thought that anyone will come upon you.

The crossroads was used in the past, where three roads meet, but this was dangerous as travelers still used roads at night, so there was danger that they would be discovered.

However, if you must work indoors, choose a room that is simple; large enough to contain the Circle, and unadorned if possible. Turn off all heating and cooling devices within the room, as well as all electrical appliances; they are unnecessary and may work against you. Unplug the phone too.

If your covenstead is indoors, try to have plants growing within, per-haps in the window or around the floor in the corners. These help give the room the necessary natural ambience. Never forget that Wicca is of nature.

## Building the Circle of Stones

The Circle is built or "cast" before every Wiccan ceremony. To begin, ceremonially cleanse the area by sweeping with a broom. This should traditionally be done by a woman, if there are two or more meeting and one is a woman.

Next, set a large, flat stone to mark the quarters—one for each direction of the compass. Set the North Stone first. These stones represent the Spirits of the Stones, and are related to the Elemental forces. When these four stones are set, they should roughly mark out a square, with the distance between each stone roughly the same. This square represents the Earth plane on which we exist.

Now, take a cord and lay it out in a Circle, using the four stones as a guide. The stones should be outside of the cord circle. The Circle represents the Spiritual realms.

Circle size can be anything from four feet to twenty, depending on the number of celebrants and the size of the area you work in.

The preparations of the Circle are now completed. Set up the altar, with water in one bowl and salt in another. Light the candles and incense. Now proceed as follows:

Consecrate water by touching the surface of the water with the point of the athame, and saying:

*I consecrate and cleanse this water  
That it may be purified and fit to dwell  
Within the sacred Circle of Stones.  
In the names of the Mother Goddess  
And the Father God,  
I consecrate this water.*

[Cunningham's other version of this Circle casting used deity names: "In the names of the Mother Goddess, Diana, and the Father God, Kernunnos ..."]

The salt is touched with the point of the athame, saying:

*I bless this salt that it may be purified  
And fit to dwell within the Sacred Circle of Stones.*

*In the names of the Mother Goddess  
And the Father God, I bless this salt.*

Stand facing North. Touch the point of the athame to the ground and trace the Circle, saying:

*Here be the boundary of the Circle of Stones.  
Naught but love shall enter in,  
Naught but love shall emerge from within.  
Charge this by your power, Dryghtyn!*

[In an alternate version, Cunningham says: "I charge you, O Circle, to be the boundary of the Circle of Stones, a guardian and protection to preserve and contain the power that we raise within you."]

Place the athame on the altar. Take up salt and sprinkle around the Circle, then carry the smoking censer around, then a candle, and finally sprinkle water. The Circle of Stones is now sealed.

Now, standing North, hold aloft the athame and say:

*O Spirit of the North Stone,  
Ancient One of the Earth,  
We call you to attend our Circle.  
Charge this by your power, Dryghtyn!*

[In an alternate version, Cunningham says: "O spirit of the North Stone, I do summon you to witness my rites and to guard the Circle against evil." This formula is repeated for the rest of the directions.]

Kiss the blade.

Face East, hold aloft athame and say:  
*O Spirit of the East Stone,  
Ancient One of Air,  
We call you to attend our Circle.  
Charge this by your power, Dryghtyn!*

Kiss the blade.

Turn to the South, hold aloft athame and say:  
*O Spirit of the South Stone,  
Ancient One of Fire,*

*We call you to attend our Circle.  
Charge this by your power, Dryghtyn!*

Kiss the blade.

Turn to the West, hold aloft the athame and say:  
*O Spirit of the West Stone, Ancient One of Water,  
We call you to attend our Circle.  
Charge this by your power, Dryghtyn!*

Place athame down on the altar. The Circle of Stones breathes around you. To strengthen, all join hands and circle clockwise, chanting or humming. Leader will stop when satisfied.

Rites may now begin.

### Releasing the Circle of Stones

Facing North, hold aloft the athame and say:

*Farewell, Spirit of the North Stone,  
We give thanks for your  
Presence here at our Circle of Stones.  
Blessed Be!*

[Cunningham's alternate phrasing is: "O spirit of the North Stone, I give thanks for attending our Circle of love, and say hail and farewell, hail and farewell."]

Kiss the blade.

Repeat to the East, South, and West, then return again to the North and hold aloft the blade.

The rite is ended; the Circle of Stones is no longer.

# *The Sabbath*

In the past, when people lived with nature, the turning of the seasons and the monthly cycle of the Moon had a profound impact on religious ceremonies. Because the Moon was seen as a symbol of the Goddess, ceremonies of adoration and magic took place in its light. The coming of winter, the first stirrings of spring, the warm summer, and the advent of fall were also marked with rituals.

The Wiccans, heirs of the pre-Christian folk religions of Europe, still celebrate the Full Moon and observe the changing of the seasons. The Wiccan religious calendar contains thirteen Full Moon celebrations and eight Sabbats, or days of power.

Four of these days (or, more properly, nights) are determined by the solstices and equinoxes, the astronomical beginnings of the seasons. The other four ritual occasions are based on old folk festivals (and, to some extent, those of the ancient Middle East). The rituals give structure and order to the Wiccan year, and also remind us of the endless cycle that will continue long after we're gone.

Four of the sabbats—perhaps those that have been observed for the longest time—were probably associated with agriculture and the bearing cycles of animals. These are *Imbolc* (February 2), *Beltane* (April 30), *Lughnasadh* (August 1), and *Samhain* (October 31). These names are Celtic and are quite common among Wiccans, though many others exist.

When careful observation of the skies led to common knowledge of the astronomical year, the solstices and equinoxes (circa March 21, June 21, September 21, and December 21; the actual dates vary from year to year) were brought into this religious structure.\*

Who first began worshipping and raising energy at these times? That question can't be answered. These sacred days and nights, however, are the origins of the twenty-one Wiccan ritual occasions.

Many of these survive today in both secular and religious forms. May Day celebrations, Halloween, Groundhog Day, and even Thanksgiving, to name some popular American holidays, are all connected

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\* Traces of this old custom are even found in Christianity. Easter, for example, is placed on the Sunday following the first Full Moon after the spring equinox, a rather "pagan" way to organize religious rites.

with ancient pagan worship. Heavily Christianized versions of the sabbats have also been preserved within the Catholic Church.

Some of the old pagan festivals, stripped of their once sacred qualities by the dominance of Christianity, have degenerated. Samhain seems to have been taken over by candy manufacturers in the United States, while Yule has been transformed from one of the most holy pagan days to a time of gross commercialism. Even the later echoes of a Christian savior's birth are hardly audible above the electronic hum of cash registers.

But the old magic remains on these days and nights, and the Wicca celebrate them. Rituals vary greatly, but all relate to the Goddess and God, and to our home, the earth. Most rites are held at night for practical purposes as well as to lend a sense of mystery. The Sabbats, being solar oriented, are more naturally celebrated at noon or at dawn, but this is rare today.

The Sabbats tell us one of the stories of the Goddess and God, of their relationship and the effects this has on the fruitfulness of the earth. There are many variations on these myths, but here's a fairly common one, woven into basic descriptions of the sabbats.

## History of Yule

The Goddess gives birth to a son, the God, at Yule (circa December 21). This is in no way an adaptation of Christianity. The winter solstice has long been viewed as a time of divine births. Mithras was said to have been born at this time. The Christians simply adopted it for their use in 273 C.E. (Common Era).

Yule is a time of the greatest darkness and is the shortest day of the year. Earlier peoples noticed such phenomena and supplicated the forces of nature to lengthen the days and shorten the nights. Wiccans sometimes celebrate Yule just before dawn, then watch the sunrise as a fitting finale to their efforts.

Since the God is also the Sun, this marks the point of the year when the sun is reborn as well. Thus, the Wicca light fires or candles to welcome the Sun's returning light. The Goddess, slumbering through the winter of her labor, rests after her delivery.

Yule is the remnant of early rituals celebrated to hurry the end of winter and the bounty of spring, when food was once again readily available. To contemporary Wiccans, it is a reminder that the ultimate product of death is rebirth, a comforting thought in these days of unrest.

## Yule Sabbat

The altar is set up, the candles and censer are lit, and the Circle of Stones is cast.

The cauldron is ringed with greenery: rosemary, pine, mistletoe, cedar, the evergreens representing the continuance of life amongst apparent desolation.

Each covener shall bring a dried twig or leaf and shall place these around the altar for use in the ritual.

The coven stands in a circle, holding hands, while the leader recites the Blessing Prayer.

The gods are invoked. Now the leader says:

*Sorrow not, though the world is wrapped in sleep;*

*Sorrow not, though the wind doth blast;*

*Sorrow not, though the snow falls hard and deep;  
Sorrow not; this shall soon be past.*

The leader ignites the cauldron until it blazes freely.

All take up their twigs or leaves and stand near the cauldron. Each throws their offering into the cauldron, then all join into a circle around the altar, saying softly:

*The Wheel Turns; the Power burns.*

Repeat nine times.

Then the leader says:

*Sorrow not, though the God lies slain by time;  
For the Great Goddess is gracious; and she shall  
bear him again.*

*Hail to the Queen of the Heavens!*

*Hail to the Queen of the Earth!*

*Hail to the Queen of the Oceans!*

*Hail to the Queen of Rebirth!*

All repeat chant several times.

Then finished, the leader shall say:

*Death is but the doorway to life.*

Meditation, clairvoyant workings, and other works may be done.

The Simple Feast.

The Circle is released. Feasting and games follow.

One traditional practice is to decorate a Yule tree, although there is no actual ceremony for such things. The tree should be a living, potted tree, and should be planted or kept in the pot after the season has passed.

The Yule log is simply a representation of the death and rebirth of the God within the sacred fire of the Great Goddess. If so wished, the coven can select a proper log, carve or chalk the traditional figure of a man upon it, and set it alight in a fireplace or pit. This is unnecessary, however.

## Yule

The cauldron should be in the South, wreathed with holly, ivy, and mistletoe. Light a fire within it. There should be none other light, save the altar candles, and those about the circle.

Cast the Circle of Stones.

Ring Dance while the High Priestess recites the incantation:

*Queen of the Moon, Queen of the Sun,  
Queen of the Heavens, Queen of the Stars,  
Queen of the Waters, Queen of the Earth,  
Bring to us the Child of Promise!*

*It is the Great Mother who gives birth to him,  
It is the Lord of Life who is born again.  
Darkness and tears are laid aside  
When the Sun shall come up early.*

*Golden Sun of the Mountains,  
Illumine the Land, Light up the World,  
Illumine the Seas and the Rivers,  
Sorrows be laid, Joy to the World!*

*Blessed be the Great Goddess,  
Without beginning, without end,  
Everlasting to eternity,  
I.O. EVOHE, BLESSED BE.  
I.O. EVOHE BLESSED BE.  
I.O. EVOHE BLESSED BE!*

Cakes and Wine.

The Circle is released.

Feasting and exchange of gifts.

## History of Imbolc

Imbolc (February 2) marks the recovery of the Goddess after giving birth to the God. The lengthening periods of light awaken her. The God is a young, lusty boy, but his power is felt in the longer days. The warmth fertilizes the earth (the Goddess), causing seeds to germinate and sprout. And so the earliest beginnings of spring occur.

This is a Sabbat of purification after the shut-in life of winter, through the renewing power of the Sun. It is also a festival of light and of fertility, once marked in Europe with huge blazes, torches, and fire in every form. Fire here represents our own illumination and inspiration as much as light and warmth.

Imbolc is also known as Feast of Torches, Oimeic, Lupercalia, Feast of Pan, Snowdrop Festival, Feast of the Waxing Light, Brigid's Day, and probably by many other names. Some female Wiccans follow the old Scandinavian custom of wearing crowns of lit candles, but many more carry tapers during their invocations.

This is one of the traditional times for initiations into covens, and so self-dedication rituals can be performed or renewed at this time.

## Imbolc Sabbat

The altar is set up, the candles and censer are lit, and the Circle of Stones is cast.

A symbol of the season, such as a crystal snowflake, a white flower, or perhaps some snow should be placed upon the altar. A candle for each covener present should be there also.

The coven stands in a circle, holding hands, while the leader recites the Blessing Prayer.

The gods are invoked. Now the leader says:

*At Imbolc the land is wrapped in winter; the air is chilled and frost envelops the tender green plants of the valley. The God of the forest and field*

*sleeps; and in that sleep he is born anew by the Great Goddess, as all must be;  
And so what was sad is joyous; and what now sleeps or drowns  
or falls lifeless shall spring up into existence and be reborn.  
And therefore let us celebrate the coming of the God  
and the labors of the Goddess!*

All take a candle from the altar and light it from the Goddess' candle. The coven stands in a ring around the altar. The leader leads all in a slow walk around the Circle of Stones. When this has been traversed thrice, the leader calls a halt and places his or her candle in the cauldron, igniting it. The coven follows suit and all watch as the cauldron sparks and sputters with life.

The leader says:

*Do you see the Light? That is the fire of Rebirth;  
the fiery essence which is Life itself!*

All sit and meditate upon the meaning of the ritual; of the cycle of reincarnation; of the meaning of death and, therefore, of birth itself.

When finished, if there is any divinatory work to be done, it is an excellent time for such.

The Simple Feast.

The Circle is released.

Feasting and games follow.

## Imbolc

Build the Circle of Stones.

The High Priest should stand in the South, athame in his right hand, wand in his left, crossed on his chest. The High Priestess faces him, standing before him, and says:

*Dread Lord of Life and Rebirth;  
Lord of Life, Giver of Life,  
You whose name is Mystery of Mysteries,  
Encourage our hearts!  
Let the light crystallize in our blood*

*Bringing us to rebirth.*

*For there is no part of us that is not of the Gods.*

*Descend, we pray you, upon your High Priest, \_\_\_\_\_*

High Priest then recites the Call of the Great God. High Priestess kisses him in acknowledgment. Cakes and Wine.

The Circle is released, and feasting takes place as usual.

## History of Ostara

Ostara (circa March 21), the spring equinox, also known as spring, Rites of Spring, and Eostra's Day, marks the first day of true spring. The energies of nature subtly shift from the sluggishness of winter to the exuberant expansion of spring. The Goddess blankets the earth with fertility, bursting forth from her sleep, as the God stretches and grows to maturity. He walks the greening fields and delights in the abundance of nature.

On Ostara, the hours of day and night are equal. Light is overtaking darkness; the Goddess and God impel the wild creatures of the earth to reproduce.

This is a time of beginnings, of action, of planting spells for future gains, and of tending ritual gardens.

## Ostara Sabbat

The altar is set up, the candles and censer are lit, and the Circle of Stones is cast.

Flowers decorate the Circle, the altar, and even the coveners themselves, if so desired. A potted plant, in bloom, should be placed upon the altar. The cauldron is filled with flowers and water.

The Blessing Prayer is recited.

The gods are invoked.

All gaze upon the plant while the leader says:

*Now the Goddess frees herself from the icy prison of Winter;*

*Now is the Rebirth of Nature, when the land greens*

*nice again and the fragrance of flowers drifts upon the breeze.  
This is the time of the beginning, when Life renews itself  
and when the God of the Sun stretches and rises,  
eager in his youth, but full of the promise of Summer.*

The leader picks up the plant and holds it, concentrating on sending it energy. The plant is passed around the Circle, each covener striving to do the same. When all have sent the plant energy, it is replaced upon the altar. The coven decides where the plant should go: to a shut-in, a hospital, a friend, the wilds of the forest—wherever deemed most appropriate.

The leader next says:

*As we love this plant; as we love all nature;  
May we have within our hearts a love for all within nature;  
thus is the Ancient Way of the Wicca, to love nature and all her creations.*

Meditations may now be performed, if desired.

The Simple Feast.

The Circle is released.

Feasting and games follow.

A traditional game to play: gather an armful of flowers of various types, but only those that you can identify. Remember to pick them in the traditional way, explaining to the plant why you are taking the part and offering a token. Select common flowers, such as the rose, daisy, snapdragon—whatever is in season and plentiful.

Place all the flowers in a large vase. When the Circle is closed and the feasting has died down, bring out the vase and have all of the coveners come forth and take one flower. After this all explain why they chose their particular flower.

Afterward, the meaning and traditional magical uses of each plant are discussed, thus providing a clue to the natures of each person.

Other traditional activities include planting seeds, working on magical gardens, and so on.

## Ostara (Spring Equinox)

Form the Circle of Stones.

The High Priestess lights a fire in the cauldron, saying at the same time:

*I kindle this fire today in the presence of the Mighty Ones,  
Without malice, without jealousy, without envy, without  
Fear of aught beneath the Sun, but the High Gods.  
We invoke you: O Light of Life: Be a bright flame before us,  
Be a Guiding Star above us, Be a smooth path beneath us;  
Kindle without our hearts a flame of love for your neighbors,  
To our foes, to our friends, to our kindred all,  
To all on this broad Earth, O Merciful Son of Diana,  
From the lowliest thing that lives  
To the name that is highest of all, Dryghtyn.*

All leap the cauldron, if possible.

Cakes and Wine.

Release the Circle of Stones.

Feasting and games follow, if desired.

## History of Beltane

Beltane (April 30) marks the emergence of the young God into manhood. Stirred by the energies at work in nature, he desires the Goddess. They fall in love, lie among the grasses and blossoms, and unite. The Goddess becomes pregnant of the God. The Wiccans celebrate the symbol of her fertility in ritual.

Beltane (also known as May Day) has long been marked with feasts and rituals. Maypoles, supremely phallic symbols, were the focal point of old English village rituals. Many people rose at dawn to gather flowers and green branches from the fields and gardens, using them to decorate the Maypole, their homes, and themselves.

The flowers and greenery symbolize the Goddess, and the Maypole the God. Beltane marks the return of vitality, of passion and hopes consummated.

Maypoles are sometimes used by Wiccans today during Beltane rituals, but the Cauldron is a more common focal point of ceremony. It represents, of course, the Goddess—the essence of womanhood, the end of all desire, the equal but opposite of the Maypole, symbolic of the God.

## Beltane Sabbat

The altar is set up, the candles and censer are lit, and the Circle of Stones is cast.

A small living tree shall be placed within the Circle near the altar.

Each covener present shall bring a small charm, token, or ornament they have fashioned to place on the tree.

A horn shall also be upon the altar, if possible. The Blessing Prayer is recited.

The Gods are invoked.

The leader says to the coven:

*The God shines brightly in the sky;  
the Goddess has brought forth a profusion of blooms  
and leaves and living creatures upon the Earth.*

*Now the Goddess takes the God as her mate;  
and all the land rejoices in a riotous blaze of color.*

*Let us present our gifts to the Divine Couple!*

All place their tokens on the tree.

Now a young man, traditionally, takes up the horn and goes to the North point of the Circle of Stones. He blows once upon the horn and says:

*Ancient God of the Summer, we welcome thee!*

He turns to the East and repeats the ritual, then to the South and West.

Meditations and Clairvoyance.

The Simple Feast.

The Circle is released.

Feasting and games follow.

## Beltane

Form the Circle of Stones.

Ring Dance.

If possible, ride poles. High Priestess leads with quick dance step, chanting:

*O do not tell the Priest of our Art,  
For he would call it sin,  
For we will be in the woods all night  
A' conjuring summer in,  
And we bring you good news by word of mouth  
For women, cattle, and corn,  
For the Sun is coming up from the South  
With Oak, and Ash, and Thorn.*

Draw Down the Moon.

Cakes and Wine.

The Circle of Stones is released.

Dancing, feasting and games, if desired.

## History of Midsummer

Midsummer, the summer solstice (circa June 21), also known as Litha, arrives when the powers of nature reach their highest point. The earth is awash in the fertility of the Goddess and God.

In the past, bonfires were leapt to encourage fertility, purification, health, and love. The fire once again represents the Sun, feted at this time of the longest daylight hours.

Midsummer is a classic time for magic of all kinds.

## Midsummer Sabbat

The altar is set up, the candles and censer are lit, and the Circle of Stones is cast.

Each member shall, before coming to the rite, make up a petition of cloth filled with herbs such as lavender, St. John's wort, and vervain. This shall be tied with a red string. All shall place their petitions near the altar before the rite begins.

The coven stands in the Circle while the leader says the Blessing Prayer.\*

The gods are invoked in the usual way. Now the leader says:

*This is the time of the Balance.*

*This is the day when the hours of Light and Darkness  
are evenly divided, when all of Nature is at a climax  
and bursts forth with radiant energy.*

*The Goddess walks the fields, smiling at the crops,  
while the God sends his rays to speed the harvest.*

*Now is the time of forgetting past cares and banes;*

*Now is the time for purification.*

All take up their petitions as the leader lights the cauldron. As each throws his or her petition in the cauldron, they say:

*I banish you in the name of Dryghtyn!*

When all are finished, they return to form a ring around the altar, then move thrice around it.

The leader then says:

*On this night of Summer's magic, when the God and  
Goddess reign supreme; may we remember the balance  
within us and within all nature; the changeless  
balance that is the reflection of perfection.*

*Blessed Be!*

The Simple Feast.

The Circle is released.

\* Editorial note: The blessing prayer here appears to be more suited to an autumn equinox/Mabon ritual. For another Midsummer ritual selection, see Cunningham's *Wicca: A Guide for the Solitary Practitioner*.

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The Simple Feast.

The Circle is released.

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Feasting and games follow, traditionally until dawn. Games of skill, contests, competitive sports, songs, and sacred plays are all traditional activities for this night.

## Midsummer

Before the altar is placed the cauldron, filled with fresh water and wreathed with flowers.

Cast the Circle of Stones.

The coven stands around the Circle, the High Priest in the South and the High Priestess in the North. High Priestess holds the wand aloft, saying the following:

*Great One of the heavens,  
Power of the Sun,  
We invoke you in your ancient names—  
Michael, Balin, Arthur, Lugh, Herne—  
Come again as of old into this your land.  
Lift up your shining spear of light to protect us,  
Put to flight the powers of darkness.  
Give us fair woodlands and green fields,  
blossoming orchards and ripening corn.  
Bring us to stand on the Hill of Vision, and show  
us the Lovely Realms of the Gods.*

High Priestess hands the wand to the High Priest, who plunges it into the cauldron, then holds it upright, saying:

*The Spear to Cauldron, the Lance to Grail, Spirit to Flesh, Man to Woman,  
Sun to Earth.*

He rejoins the coven.

The High Priestess takes up the sprinkler and stands by the cauldron, saying:

*Dance about the Cauldron of Diana, the Goddess,  
and be blessed by the touch of this consecrated water,  
even as the Sun the Lord of Life, arises  
in its strength in the sign of the Waters of Life.*

The people dance deosil three times around the Altar and Cauldron, led by the High Priest, still bearing the wand. The High Priestess sprinkles each as they pass by her.

The Circle is released.

Cakes and Wine.

Games, dancing, feasting, as the High Priestess directs.

(The sprinkler: bind together fresh sprigs of any three herbs or wild plants, sacred to the gods or growing nearby. Knot nine times with white thread.)

## History of Lughnasadh

Lughnasadh (August 1) is the time of the first harvest, when the plants of spring wither and drop their fruits or seeds for our use as well as to ensure future crops. Mystically, so too does the God lose his strength as the Sun rises farther in the south each day and the nights grow longer. The Goddess watches in sorrow and joy as she realizes that the God is dying, and yet lives on inside her as her child.

Lughnasadh, also known as August Eve, Feast of Bread, Harvest Home, and Lammas, wasn't always observed on this day. It originally coincided with the first reapings.

As summer passes, Wiccans remember its warmth and bounty in the food we eat. Every meal is an act of attunement with nature, and we are reminded that nothing in the universe is constant.

## Lughnasadh Sabbat

The altar is set up, the candles and censer are lit, and the Circle of Stones is cast.

The altar is heaped with the first harvest; corn and fruit are traditional, as are sheafs of wheat. A figure of the God fashioned from bread is traditionally placed on the altar as well.

The leader recites the Blessing Prayer. The gods are invoked in the usual ways. Now the leader says:

*This is the time of the First Harvest; when the  
bounties of Nature give of themselves so that we may survive.  
Such are the mysteries of Life; that all exists  
so that others may; and that our quest for perfection  
should not blind ourselves to others' quests;  
The God gives of himself; but the Wicca do not sorrow;  
for we give of ourselves that others may survive.  
And the Goddess shines above us, and we rejoice.*

The Circle is released.

Feasting and games follow.

Corn dollie-making is a traditional game.

## Lughnasadh

Form Circle of Stones.

High Priestess stands before the altar and says:

*O Mighty Mother of us all, Mother all fruitfulness,*

*Give us Fruit and Grain, Flocks and Herds,*

*and children to the clan, that we be mighty.*

*By thy Rosey Love do descend upon your priestess.*

All salute the High Priestess. Cakes and Wine.

The Circle is released.

Dancing, feasting.

## History of Mabon

Mabon (circa September 21), the autumn equinox, is the completion of the harvest begun at Lughnasadh. Once again day and night are equal, poised as the God prepares to leave his physical body and begin the great adventure into the unseen, toward renewal and rebirth of the Goddess.

Nature declines, draws back its bounty, readying for winter and its time of rest. The Goddess nods in the weakening Sun, though fire burns within her womb. She feels the presence of the God, even as he wanes.

## Mabon Sabbat

The altar is set up, the candles and censer are lit, and the Circle of Stones is cast.

The altar is decorated with acorns, oak sprigs, pine cones, cypress cones, ears of corn, wheat stalks, and other fruits.

Autumn leaves may be scattered around the Circle or on the altar. Chrysanthemums and marigolds are also traditionally upon the altar.

The coven stands in a circle while the leader recites the Blessing Prayer.

The Gods are invoked. The leader says:

*The harvest is fully reaped; the God gives of himself  
and journeys to the higher planes, and the sky grows dark.*

*Chilled winds blow in from the North as the  
plants turn brown and wither.*

*But in the face of seeming extinction,  
the Goddess sends forth her power, and by it we are sustained.*

*And thus in the dark days of Winter are we comforted  
by the knowledge that all is a cycle; birth and death and rebirth.*

*Blessings upon the Great Goddess and Fallen God,  
who journeys to the Lands of Summer!*

The Circle is released. Feasting and games follow.

## Mabon (Autumn Equinox)

The altar should be decorated with symbols of autumn: pinecones, oak sprigs, acorns, or ears of grain.

Form Circle of Stones.

The coven stand about the Circle, the High Priestess invokes before the Altar:

*Farewell, O Sun, Ever-returning Light,  
The Hidden God, who ever yet remains,  
Who now departs to the Land of Youth,  
Through the Gates of Death,*

*to dwell in sleep  
 until the coming of Spring.  
 Yet even as he stands unseen about the Circle,  
 So dwells he within the Secret Seed,  
 The Seed of newly ripened grain,  
 The Seed of flesh hidden in the Earth,  
 The marvelous Seed of the Stars,  
 In him is Life, and Life is the Light of Humanity,  
 That which was never born, and never dies,  
 Therefore the Wicca weep not, but rejoice.*

The High Priestess salutes the High Priest. Ring Dance three times around the Circle. Cakes and Wine.

The Circle is released.

Games and feasting. Dancing, if desired.

## History of Samhain

At Samhain (October 31), the Wicca say farewell to the God. This is a temporary farewell. He isn't wrapped in eternal darkness, but readies to be reborn of the Goddess at Yule.

Samhain, also known as November Eve, Feast of the Dead, Feast of Apples, Hallows, and All Hallows, once marked the time of sacrifice. In some places this was the time when animals were slaughtered to ensure food throughout the depths of winter. The God, identified with the animals, fell as well to ensure our continuing existence.

Samhain is a time of reflection, of looking back over the last year, of coming to terms with the one phenomenon of life over which we have no control—death. The Wicca feel that on this night the separation between the physical and spiritual realities is thin. Wiccans remember their ancestors and all those who have gone before.

After Samhain, Wiccans celebrate Yule, and so the wheel of the year is complete.

## Samhain Sabbat

The altar is set up, the candles and censer are lit, and the Circle of Stones is cast.

The leader says:

*Tonight the great gates of the Lands of Summer open  
for one we hold dear; the Sun God, his life waning,  
has made the pleasant journey and enters into  
the Land of Youth, until he comes forth again.*

*And this is the way for us all; therefore look  
not upon death as a foe to be beaten, or as a friend to  
be welcomed too early; simply see it as but another  
step to your evolvment; an inevitable one,  
as the rising of the Sun and the setting of the Moon;  
no more, no less; thus can your life be lived fully,  
without fear and worry.*

*For all are reborn by the Gracious Goddess,  
and thus in the time of the greatest darkness there is the greatest light.*

All meditate; communication with those who have passed on can be done if desired, but is not necessary.

## Samhain

Walk or slow-dance with torches or candles to the covenstead. Cast the Circle of Stones.

High Priest leads High Priestess, and they both carry athames aloft, during the dance.

High Priestess invokes, after the dance:

*Dread Lord of the Shadows,  
God of Life and Giver of Life,  
Yet is the knowledge of you,  
the knowledge of Death.*

*Open wide, I pray you,*

*the Gates through which all must pass.  
 Let our dear ones who have gone before  
 Return this night to make merry with us  
 And when our time comes, as it must,  
 O Comforter, Consoler, the Giver of Peace and Rest,  
 we will enter into the Land of Youth  
 gladly and unafraid, as you yearly have done  
 so, long before our consciousness;  
 and when refreshed and rested among our dear ones,  
 we will be reborn again by the grace of the  
 Mother Goddess, Diana,  
 Let it be in the same place, and the same time as  
 our beloved ones, and may be meet, and know, and remember, and love them  
 again. Descend, we pray  
 you, upon your Priest \_\_\_\_\_.*

Cakes and Wine.

The Circle is released.

Dancing and feasting. Divinations, as decided.

*Full Moon  
Rites*

**T**he Sabbats are solar rituals, marking the points of the sun's yearly cycle, and are but half of the Wiccan ritual year. The Esbats are the Wiccan Full Moon celebrations. At this time we gather to worship She Who Is. Not that Wiccans omit the God at Esbats—both are usually revered on all ritual occasions.

There are twelve to thirteen Full Moons yearly, or one every twenty-eight days. The Moon is a symbol of the Goddess as well as a source of energy. Thus, after the religious aspects of the Esbats, Wiccans often practice magic, tapping into the larger amounts of energy that are thought to exist at these times.

## Full Moon Rite

### The Legend

Our Lady Diana would solve all mysteries, even the mystery of death, so when winter had come once again upon the earth and our Lord Kernunos departed, the Goddess followed him. But the Guardian of the Portals challenged her: "Strip off your garments, lay aside your jewels; for naught may you bring with you into this land."

So Diana laid down her crescent crown, the moonstone and emerald bracelets from her ankles and wrists, the pearl earrings, the necklace of stars from her neck, the sacred girdle from about her body, and the veil of mist that covered her; she laid down all these things, and was bound, as are all who would enter the Realms of the Dead.

Such was her beauty that the God himself knelt and kissed her feet, saying; "Blessed be your feet that have brought you in these ways. Abide with me; let me place my cold hand on your heart."

She replied: "Why do you cause all things that I love and take delight in to fade and die?"

"Diana," Kernunos replied, "it is age and fate, against which I am powerless. Age causes all things to wither; but when men die at the end of their time I give peace and rest, and strength so that they may return. But you, you are lovely; return not and abide with me."

And she did so for three days and nights; and the Moon grew dark and invisible. The God taught her the mysteries of death, and they loved and were one.

For there are three great mysteries of life: Love, Death, and Rebirth: and magic controls them all. For to fulfill love you must return again at the same time and place as the loved ones, and you must remember and love them again. But to be reborn you must die, and be ready for a new body. And to die you must be born; and without love you cannot be born, and these be all the magics.

### **Esbat**

The High Priestess sweeps the covenstead with her broom to purify it. The altar is set up, the candles and censer are lit, and the Circle of Stones is cast.

The coven sits in a circle while the High Priest kneels before the High Priestess and says the following, with arms upraised:

*Diana, you who are queen of the Gods,  
the Lamp of Night, the Creator of all that is wild and free;  
the mother of woman and man;  
lover of the Horned God and protectress of  
all the Wicca; descend, with your Lunar Shaft of Power,  
upon your High Priestess, \_\_\_\_\_.*

The High Priestess then recites the Song of the Goddess.

The High Priest rises and kisses the High Priestess in greeting. Magic is made.

The Circle is released.

Feasting and games follow.

**Esbat**

The leader sweeps the covenstead with the broom to purify it. The altar is set up, the candles and censer are lit, and the Circle of Stones is built.

The coven stands in the Circle while the leader recites the Blessing Prayer.

The gods are now invoked, using the evocations below or any others:

*Ancient God of the Forest Deeps,  
Master of beasts and Sun,  
Here when the world is hushed and sleeps  
Now that the day is done;  
We call you in the ancient way  
Here in our Circle round,  
Knowing that you will hear us pray  
And send your Sun-force down.*

*Lunar Goddess of the night  
Who shines so far above  
Who bathes the altar stone with light  
And wisdom, joy and love;  
We call you to attend our rite  
And as we dance the round,  
We pray that you will favor us  
And send your Moon-love down.*

A woman should invoke the Goddess, and a man the God.

If there is magic to be made, all gather and discuss, then the power is built up and sent forth by the dance.

If there is no magic to be made, all shall discuss the teachings.

Feasting and games follow.

## The Full Moon Rite

The High Priestess sweeps the covenstead with her broom to purify it. The altar is set up, the candles and censer are lit, and the Circle of Stones is cast.

The coven sits in the Circle, while the High Priest kneels before the High Priestess and says the following, with arms upraised:

*Diana, you who are queen of the Gods, the Lamp of Night,  
the Creator of all that is wild and free; the mother of woman and man;  
lover of the Horned God and protectress of all the Wicca;  
descend, with your Lunar Shaft of Power,  
upon your High Priestess, \_\_\_\_\_.*

The High Priestess then recites the Song of the Goddess. High Priest then speaks to the coven:

*Tonight is the night of the Full of the Moon,  
When her powers are at their peak, and when  
mystic moonlight touches the shadows.  
The Goddess' mystic jewel lights the heavens,  
calling us to meet. Let us do her honor.*

All sing the Moon Song:

*Diana of the crescent barge, who travels in the Night,  
Who lights the way to Sabbat ground with glowing Lunar Light;  
We call you to be one with us, as one we call you nigh;  
Charge us with your love and luck and bless us with your sigh.  
For though we be but mortal flesh, who dance the ancient round,  
We pray that you'll attend to us, and send your Moon-love down.*

Magic is made.

The Simple Feast.

The Circle is released.

Feasting and games follow.



### **The Full Moon Rite**

The altar is set up, the candles and censer are lit, and the Circle of Stones is cast.

It is appropriate if some white flowers, crystal, or other Lunar symbols can be placed on the altar for this ritual.

The coven stands in a circle, holding hands, while the leader recites the Blessing Prayer.

The Gods are invoked in the usual way.

Now the leader says the following:

*Tonight is the night of the Full of the Moon,  
when her powers are at their peak and when mystic  
Moonlight touches the shadows.*

*The Goddess' celestial jewel lights the heavens and the Earth,  
calling us to meet. Let us do her honor!*

All meditate for a few moments on the Moon.

Magic is made, after discussion and if necessary. This is also an excellent time for divination and magic-mirror workings.

The Simple Feast.

The Circle is released. Feasting and games follow.

### **Drawing Down the Moon**

The High Priest kneels before the High Priestess, with arms upraised, and he says the following:

*Diana, you who are the queen of the Gods,  
the Lamp of Night, the Creator of all that is wild and free;  
the mother of woman and man; lover of the Horned God  
and protectress of all the Wicca; descend, with your  
Lunar Shaft of Power, upon your High Priestess.*

The High Priestess then recites the Song of the Goddess.

## Cakes and Wine

High Priestess kneels, holding up the cup with both hands. The High Priest lowers the tip of the athame into it, and he says:

*By this I summon you, O Ancient Ones.  
Bless this Wine and infuse it with your limitless love.  
Let it become for your children the Life-force  
that flows in all things; the manifested essence of the blessed elements.  
In the names of Diana and Kernunnos, I bless this wine.*

High Priest then kneels, holds up plate of cakes, on which the High Priestess places the tip of her athame, standing, and says:

*O Queen most secret and Lord most powerful,  
Bless these cakes unto our bodies,  
Bestowing health, wealth, strength, joy, and peace,  
And that fulfillment of love which is perpetual happiness.  
In the names of Diana and Kernunnos, I bless these cakes.*

The High Priestess drinks and eats, then the High Priest and the rest of the coven.

## Consecrations

Many traditions utilize a specific ritual for the consecration of tools. Some use the four elements (Earth, Air, Fire, and Water) in such rituals; others, a sprinkling of blessed salt and consecrated water. Some type of incantation should be created, borrowed, or adapted which aptly sums up the ritual action. Such rites are usually quite short and rely far more on the consecrator's energy than on the ritual form itself.

### A General Consecration

To use with jewelry or various objects brought within the Circle of Stones.

Place the object upon the pentacle, if possible. Say:  
*I conjure you, O \_\_\_\_\_, by the God and the Goddess,  
by the virtue of the Heavens, of the Stars,*

*and of the Spirits of the Stones; by the virtue of hail, snow, and wind,  
that you receive such virtue that you may obtain without deceit  
the end which I desire in all things wherein I shall use you;  
by the powers of the Mother Goddess, Diana,  
and the Father God, Kernunnos, I consecrate you.*

The tool should be censured, passed through flames, sprinkled, and then laid back on the pentacle, where it is sprinkled with salt.

### **Consecration of the Tools**

Build the Circle of Stones. If possible, lay any tool touching an already consecrated one: athame to athame, wand to wand. Cast the Circle. Place the tool on the altar, touching it to the consecrated one, if possible, and say:

*I consecrate you, O athame of steel (or pentacle of wood, etc.),  
to cleanse and purify you so that you may serve  
me within the Circle of Stones, that I might  
perform the rites of Wicca. In the names of  
the Mother Goddess and the Father God, you are consecrated.*

[In an alternate version, Cunningham says: "In the names of Diana and Kernunnos, you are consecrated."]

The tool is sprinkled with salt and passed over the censer, passed through flame, and then sprinkled with water, calling upon the Spirits of the Stones, the elemental forces, to consecrate it.

Then hold up the tool to the sky, saying:

*I charge you by Dryghtyn; by the Powerful God and the Gentle Goddess;  
by the virtues of the Sun, of the Moon, and of the Stars;  
that I shall obtain the end that I desire while using you.  
Charge this by your power, Dryghtyn!*

[Cunningham's alternate version deletes this last line and instead finishes with: "By the power of Diana and Kernunnos, be you consecrated."]

The tool should be immediately put to use.

*Prayers, Chants,  
and Invocations*

Chants are used to raise energy or to commune with the deities. Some of these invocations rhyme, and some do not. This simply speaks of my ability to compose rhyme, I suppose. But recall the power of rhyme—it links our conscious mind to the unconscious or psychic mind, thereby producing ritual consciousness.

### Witches' Rune

Darksome night and shining Moon,  
East, then South, then West, then North,  
Hearken to the Witches' Rune,  
Here I come to call thee forth  
Earth and Water, Air and Fire,  
Wand and pentacle and sword,  
Work ye unto my desire,  
Hearken ye unto my word.  
Cords and censer, sacred knife,  
Powers of the Witches' blade,

Crescent Moon-bark brightly gleaming,  
Ever smiling high in heaven,  
Sailing too on earth, reflected in the ocean,  
on its water; Look down upon me  
and guide me in my rites and in my life!

Lunar Diana,  
Forestral Pan,  
Be with us as woman  
Worships with man.  
Teach us the wisdom  
Of living for life;  
Help us create  
Joy from strife.  
Pan and Diana  
Bless us this night;  
Make us sacred  
In your sight.

### Preliminary Invocation

Diana of the crescent barge  
 Who travels in the night;  
 Who lights the way to Sabbat ground  
 with glowing lunar light;  
 We call you to be one with us, as one we call you nigh;  
 Charge us with your love and luck  
 And bless us with your sigh.  
 For though we be but mortal men  
 Who dance the ancient round,  
 We pray that you'll attend to us  
 And send your Moon-love down.

### Full Moon Preliminary Invocation

Fair Diana, Goddess of the Rainbow,  
 of the Stars, and of the Moon;  
 the Queen most powerful of hunters and the night;  
 we ask of you your aid, that we may have the  
 best of fortune ever in our rites!

### To Diana

Lovely Goddess of the bow!  
 Lovely Goddess of the arrows!  
 Of all the hounds and of all hunting

 Thou with Moon upon thy forehead,  
 Who the chase by night preferrest unto hunting in the daylight,

### Isis Invocation

Isis of the Moon,

Do thou descend upon our Circle  
On this most magic of nights!

### Healing Invocation to Isis

May Isis heal \_\_\_\_\_ as she healed Horus of all  
the wounds which his brother Set, who slew his  
father Osiris, had inflicted upon him. O Isis,  
great magician, heal \_\_\_\_\_, and deliver thou one from  
all bad, evil, and typhonic things, and from every  
kind of fatal sickness, and from diseases caused by  
devils, and from impurity of every kind,  
even as thou didst deliver thy son Horus.

### Evocation of Hecate

O Night, faithful preserver of mysteries,  
and ye bright stars, whose golden beams with  
the Moon succeed the fires of day; the three-fold  
Hecate, who knowest our undertakings and comest  
to our aid when spells and arts we Wiccans use;  
We ask that you be present as we perform this work  
of retribution in your name.  
Blessed Hecate, be with us here!

## Prayer

Almighty Father of us all,  
 Lord of Death and Rebirth;  
 Lord of the Earth and the mountains,  
 Lord of the wild and free beasts;  
 Fill me with your Limitless Love!  
 Guide me in all that I do, think, and attempt  
 During this Circle. Blessed Be!

## Call to Pan

O Great God Pan, return to earth again;  
 Come at my call, and show thyself to men.  
 Shepherd of goats, upon the wild hill's way,  
 Lead thy lost flock from darkness unto day.  
 Forgotten are the ways of sleep and night;  
 Men seek for them whose eyes have lost the light.  
 Open the door, the door that hath no key—  
 The door of dreams whereby men come to thee.  
 Shepherd of goats, oh answer unto me!

## Invocation to Pan

O Great God, Pan, Father of man,  
 Shepherd of goats and Lord of the Land,  
 We call you to attend our rites  
 On this the magic night of nights.  
 God of the Wine, God of the Vine,  
 God of the Cattle and God of the kine;  
 Attend our Circle with your love  
 And send your blessings from above,  
 Help us to Heal; Help us to Feel;  
 Help us to bring forth love and weal.  
 Pan of the forests, Pan of the glade,  
 Be with us as our magic is made!

### Evocation of Pan

O laughing God of the greenwood,  
With your pipes and goat-like hooves,  
Shepherd of creatures wild and free,  
Join us here, and with your warmth  
Let life be born anew!

### Closing Chant

Merry meet,  
And merry part,  
And merry meet again!

# *Rites and Lore*

Wicca possesses not one but several sets of rules. The most famous of these, which has been published in several different forms, originally stemmed from what is now known as Gardnerian Wicca.<sup>1</sup> Many other versions exist, and some covens create their own set of laws for use by their members. Underlying all such Wiccan rules is one basic concept: harm none.

Traditional Wiccan laws can be grouped into specific categories for study. Looking at these, and reading a few sample sets, should readily provide all that you need to write or adapt a set of laws for your tradition.

### Curse

Whosoever releases the secrets of the Craft, such as are contained within this Book: May the Terrible Curse of the Goddess be upon your eyes: May the Terrible Curse of the Goddess be upon your ears: May the Terrible Curse of the Goddess be upon your mouth: May the Terrible Curse of the Goddess be upon your heart: May the Terrible Curse of the Goddess visit in the night the Oath-Breaker: For such Treachery sent millions of the Wicca to the Stake and Noose. You have taken the Oath: Mind the word of your Heart!

### **The Law of the Power**

1. The Power shall not be used to bring harm, or to injure. But if the need arises, the Power shall be used to protect one's life, or the coven, or the Wicca.
2. The Power is to be used only as need dictates. It is acceptable to work for one's own gain, as long as it harms none.
3. Accept not gold for use of the Power, for it quickly controls the taker. Be not as the priests of the new religion.
4. Use not the Power for prideful gain, for such cheapens the great mysteries of Wicca.
5. Ever remember that the Power is the sacred gift of the gods, and should never be misused or abused. And this is the Law of the Power.

## The Ways of the Power

1. Meditation or concentration. This in practice means forming a mental image of what is desired, and forcing yourself to see that it is fulfilled, with the fierce belief and knowledge that it can, and will, be fulfilled. This is called "Intent," and is all-important in magic.
2. Trance and projection of the Spirit, called "astral projection." Be careful with trances and astral projection. Used wisely, they can be of great benefit.
3. Rites, chants, spells, runes, charms, herbs. Of spells, the exact words matter little if the intent be clear, and you raise the true power and sufficiently thereof. Always in rhyme they are, there is something queer about rhyme. I have tried, and the same seem to lose their power if you miss the rhyme. Also, in rhyme the words seem to say themselves, You do not have to pause and think, what comes next? Doing this takes away much of your intent.
4. Incense, drugs, wines, whatever is used to release the Spirit. Be very careful of this. Incense is usually harmless, but sometimes it contains dangerous ingredients such as hemp. If you have any bad after-effects, reduce the amount used, or the time inhaled. Drugs are very dangerous if taken to excess, but it must be remembered that there are many drugs which are absolutely harmless, though people talk of them with bated breath. Be careful while taking mushroom (fly agaric). But hemp is especially dangerous, for it unlocks the inner eye swiftly and easily, so one is tempted to use it more and more. If it is used at all, it must be with the strictest precautions, and see that the person who uses it has control over the supply. Khat has nearly the same effect, but is difficult to obtain fresh. If any slightly dangerous drug is used, it should be doled out by some responsible person, and the supply strictly limited. [See publisher's note on copyright page for cautionary statement.]
5. The dance, and kindred practices. The ring dance within the Circle of Stones generates raw physical power and is an easy method

- of raising energy. Private dances can also raise energy, but not so quickly; thus, concentration is better suited to solitary practice.
6. Breath control, bodily postures. Control of the breath is an excellent way to gain additional energy, especially when combined with concentration. The breath is slowly increased in speed until the power is released and sent off. The opposite mode, decreasing the breath, enables one to slip into meditation, deep relaxation, and astral projection.
  7. Sex. The physical act generates enormous amounts of power, but it is difficult to control without intense concentration and much practice. If you desire more information on the magic of sex, ask your High Priestess or High Priest.

The most important aspect of magic making is the intent. You must know that you can and will succeed. This is essential in every operation.

You must also be safe from all interruptions, or from the mental fear of interruption, while making magic. If outdoors, find the remotest, most secluded glade; if indoors secure all entrances fastly.

And ever remember to look to the Moon, for constructive acts are performed during the waxing of the Moon, while destructive acts are best done during her wane.

## Initiation

Much has been made, publicly and privately, of Wiccan initiations. Each Wiccan tradition uses its own initiation ceremonies, which may or may not be recognized by other Wiccans. On one point, however, most initiates agree: a person can be a Wiccan only if she or he has received such an initiation.

This brings up an interesting question: Who initiated the first Wiccan?

Most initiation ceremonies are nothing more than rites marking the acceptance of the person into a coven, and her or his dedication to the Goddess and God. Sometimes "power is passed" between the initiator and neophyte as well.

To a non-Wiccan, the initiation might seem to be a rite of conversion. This isn't the case. Wicca has no need for such rites. We don't condemn the deities with which we may have attuned before practicing Wicca, nor need we turn our backs on them.

The initiation ceremony (or ceremonies, since in many groups three successive rites are performed) is held to be of utmost importance to those Wiccan groups still practicing ritual secrecy. Surely anyone entering such a group should undergo an initiation, part of which consists of swearing never to reveal their secrets. This makes sense, and is a part of many coven initiations. But it isn't the essence of initiation.

Many people have told me that they desperately need to undergo Wiccan initiation. They seem to believe that one cannot practice Wicca without this stamp of approval. If you've read this far, you know that such isn't the case.

Wicca has been, up until the past decade or so, a closed religion, but no more. The inner components of Wicca are available to anyone who can read and understand the material. Wicca's only secrets are its individual ritual forms, spells, names of deities, and so on.

This needn't bother you. For every secret Wiccan ritual or Goddess name there are dozens (if not hundreds) of others published and readily available. At this moment, more Wiccan information has been released than ever before. While it once may have been a secret religion, today Wicca is a religion with few secrets.

Still, many cling to the idea of the necessity of initiation, probably thinking that with this magical act they'll be granted the *secrets of the universe* and *untold power*. To make things worse, some particularly narrow-minded Wiccans say that the Goddess and God won't listen to anyone who isn't an athame-carrying member of a coven. Many would-be Wiccans believe this.

It doesn't work this way.

True initiation isn't a rite performed by one human being upon another. Even if you accept the concept that the initiator is suffused with deity during initiation, it's still just a ritual.

Initiation is a process, gradual or instantaneous, of the individual's attunement with the Goddess and God. Many of the Wicca readily admit

that the ritual initiation is the outer form only. True initiation will often occur weeks or months later, or prior to, the physical ritual.

## Admission

Cast the Circle.

Draw down the Moon.

Ring Dance.

(Candidate is robed, blindfolded, and standing in the North, outside the Circle. High Priest[ess] takes up the athame and presses it against the candidate's breast.)

"You who stand in search of wisdom and love are poised between life and death. You who stand in search of wisdom and love must give the passwords to enter into the Circle of Stones which lies between the familiar realm of humanity and the unknowable reaches of the gods' domains. Have you two passwords?"

Candidate: "I have."

"Then, by your word, say them."

Candidate: "Love and Trust."

"By such words may you live your life, and with them enter into our Circle of Stones."

(Athame is taken away from the candidate's breast and placed on the altar. Candidate is kissed and led into the Circle.)

"Now is the Presentation."

(Candidate is led to the four directions, with the following invocation:)

"Spirit of the North Stone, \_\_\_\_\_ is properly prepared and shall be admitted into Wicca."

(Repeat for each direction, stating seeker's mundane name. Next, in the North of the Circle, say the following:)

"In ages past, when the Wicca were pursued by the Witch-finders and magistrates, and were in eternal danger, there was an ordeal which all who would be of the Wicca had to endure. This proved their loyalty, strength, and dedication to the Wicca, as well as their desire to enter

into our clan. Today, in these happier times, this is no longer necessary, but ever be mindful that the persecution may flare up again without warning, at any time. Since you have entered into the Circle of Stones with Love and Trust, we shall accept this in token of your sincerity. Are you willing to swear your loyalty to Wicca, even though it should cost you your life?"

Candidate: "I am."

"And have you chosen a new name?"

Candidate: "I have."

"Then repeat after me as I say:" (High Priest[ess] says the oath, and the candidate follows it, phrase by phrase, and inserts his/her own Craft name:)

"I, \_\_\_\_\_, who stand between the worlds, and within the sight of the gods, do of my own free will swear that I will keep fast and secure the secrets of the Wicca, except it be to a proper person, properly prepared, within a Circle such as I am now in. This I swear by my past lives, and by my lives to come, and may my weapons turn against me if I break this my solemn oath!"

(Remove blindfold after oath.)

The High priest[ess] takes up the bowl containing admission oil and describes a crescent on the candidate's forehead with the oil, saying:

"I bless you with the sign of the First Admission, Priest[ess] and Witch!"

(The candidate is now a Witch.)

Cords are removed. The High Priest[ess] places the Power hand on the crown of the new Witch's head and says:

"I will all my power to you."

(New Witch is presented to the Four Portals:)

"Spirit of the North Stone, \_\_\_\_\_ is now a Priest[ess] and Witch. And ere you depart for your lovely realm, we say, hail and farewell, hail and farewell."

Cakes and Wine.

Dancing and feasting, and presentation of the admission gift(s).

## Second Admission

Build the Circle of Stones.

(Witch stands robed and blindfolded outside the Circle. The High Priest[ess] comes before the Witch and says:)

"You who are a sister (brother) of Wicca have proved yourself to be worthy of admission to the second level. You stand near the Circle of Stones. The way is clear for you to enter, if you still desire. Do you seek to obtain the High Priesthood?"

Candidate: "I do."

"Then be admitted by my hand into the Circle of Stones."

(High Priest[ess] leads the Witch into the Circle, around the Four Portals, and finally before the altar. The High Priest[ess] holds up a mirror before the Witch, and removes the blindfold, saying:)

"Behold the God[dess]!"

(Candidate should see her/his own face in the glass.) "Such is the mystery of the Wicca."

(The mirror is placed to the East of the altar.)

"The High Priesthood is an awesome responsibility, requiring much faith and knowledge of Wicca. The secrets of Wicca will be at your fingertips; power and influence shall you have. In your coven you will be called upon to settle disputes, enlighten students, and initiate seekers. All this you must do with love and trust; love and trust must guide your life totally, and however much you may be tempted, never stray off the path of wisdom, for death touches those who do. Now, after these warnings, are you still desirous of attaining the High Priesthood?"

Candidate: "I am."

"Then swear the oath."

(High Priest[ess] says the oath, and the Witch repeats phrase by phrase:)

"I, \_\_\_\_\_, do swear that I shall act as a true vehicle of the Goddess; that I shall nurture the growth of both Wicca and the souls that come to me; that I shall rule my coven with love and trust, and that I shall never betray any of the Wicca to those who are not, nor shall I betray the trust that my High Priest[ess] has in me. This I swear by my

past lives and hopes of future lives to come, and may the forces turn against me should I break this my oath."

(High Priest[ess] takes up the bowl of admission oil and anoints the forehead of the Witch with a pentagram, saying:)

"I bless you with the sign of the Second Level, High Priest[ess]."

(The candidate is now a High Priest[ess]. A kiss is given in celebration. The Circle of Stones is released.

Cakes and Wine, feasting, and merriment follow.

### Third Level Admission: The Covening

(The High Priestess and High Priest form the Circle of Stones together, working in harmony, in token of their future Craft life together. When finished, they will stand before the altar, the High Priestess to the left, and invoke the gods thusly:)

"In the name of Dryghryn, the ancient providence, which was from the beginning, and is for eternity male and female, the original source of all things: all-knowing, all-pervading, all-powerful, changeless, eternal. In the name of the Lady of the Moon, Diana, and the Lord of the Sun, Kernunnos: bless our covening that it may spread the growth and ensure the survival of Wicca. Aid in building our coven into a gathering of love and trust, that it may be fit in your sight. Blessed Be, Great Ones, Blessed Be!"

The High Priestess and High Priest kiss. The High Priestess traces the sign of the Third Level on the High Priest's forehead, and then the High Priest does so on the High Priestess' forehead, with admission oil.

The High Priestess then holds her athame over the altar. The High Priest touches the tip of his athame under the High Priestess' and they stand thus, visualizing their forces and energies mingling together.

They then exchange athames and hold them to their hearts for thirteen heartbeats, then give them back.

They say:

"Thus is the new coven of \_\_\_\_\_ and \_\_\_\_\_ begun.

It shall be known as the coven of \_\_\_\_\_ and shall hereafter

be known as the Coven of \_\_\_\_\_ on all planes and spaces.  
Diana and Kernunnos, in love and trust, is this coven so established."

The High Priestess and High Priest now sit and discuss all matters pertaining to their future coven. When all has been settled to both of their minds, they will cut the Circle and the rite will be ended.

## Handfasting

The covenstead is decorated with flowers and fruit. More flowers and a floral crown are on the altar, which is itself decorated with flowers.

Build the Circle of Stones.

The couple, robed splendidly, kneel, the woman on the left. The High Priest invokes:

*O Mother of love,  
Who has been called Venus, Ishtar, Habondia.  
Aphrodite, Isis, Cerridwen: Extend your hand of  
protection to this daughter and son of man.  
Deflect evil from them, and confound those who  
would blaspheme against the true light of your wisdom.*

The couple stand, and they are anointed to their level on the forehead with handfasting oil.

The couple kneels again and the High Priest addresses them:  
*Know that it is the decree of fate that you are to be united,  
so long as love shall last. In vain against the stars preach the monk  
and priest; what shall be, shall be.  
Wherefore take hope and joy, O children of time.  
And now, as I join your hands, I betroth your souls.*

The High Priest consecrates the crown with Earth, Air, Fire, and Water and passes it over the head of the man and then over the head of the woman, placing it there.

High Priest holds his left hand over the couple, raises his right, and says:

*May Dryghtyn, the Spirits of the Stones, and the powerful God, Kernunnos, and the gentle Goddess Diana, attest the betrothal of these young hearts.*

*O Circle of Stones and altar of power, attest the betrothal of these young hearts.*

*O Sun and Moon, attest the betrothal of these young hearts.*

*While the forms are divided, may the souls cling together,*

*Sorrow with sorrow, joy with joy,*

*And when at length bride and bridegroom are one,*

*O Stars, may the trouble with which you are charged have exhausted its burden; may no danger molest,*

*and no malice disturb; but over the marriage bed, shine in peace, O Stars.*

Now the couple swear, each in turn:

*In the Sight of Dryghtyn, the Ancient Providence, and Diana and Kernunnos,*

*between the familiar realm of humanity*

*and the unknown reaches of the God's domains,*

*and surrounded by the Spirits of the Stones,*

*I take you to my hand at the setting of the Sun,*

*the rising of the Stars.*

The couple now jump the broomstick. They kneel as the High Priestess sweeps away all evil influences behind them and out of the Circle toward the south.

Release the Circle.

Cakes and Wine.

Dancing, feasting, much, merriment.

NOTE: The actual handfasting may be done by either the High Priestess or the High Priest. Foods traditionally include those of the dairy and fruits and flowers.

*Recipes  
for the Least*

**F**ood is magic. Its power over us is undeniable. From the sweet, rich lure of a freshly baked brownie to an exquisitely steamed artichoke, food continues to seduce us.

Food is life. We can't continue to live without its magic. Food, however, also harbors energies. When we eat, our bodies absorb those energies, just as they absorb vitamins, minerals, amino acids, carbohydrates, and other nutrients. Though we may not be aware of any effect other than a sated appetite, the food has subtly changed us.

In times of scarcity as well as plenty, people around the world have subjected food to religious reverence. Rice in Asia; fruit throughout Europe; grains in Africa; pomegranates and beer in the Near East; acorns and pine nuts in the American Southwest; bananas and coconuts in the Pacific; vegetables in tropical America—these foods have all played significant roles in religious and magical rituals.

Sacred meals are shared with the goddesses and gods (or their priestesses and priests). Today, eating with others is still an act of energy sharing, bonding, and trust.

The magic of the hunt and the sacredness of gathering rituals in fields and groves are still remembered by a few isolated peoples. Most of us now, however, buy presliced bread, gather our fruits and vegetables from gleaming counters, and hunt in refrigerated cases.

As we've lost the knowledge of the old magics, so too have we forgotten the mystic lore of food. But timeless energies still vibrate within our meals. They wait for us to sense and use them. Lengthy magical spells aren't required, though a simple ritual is necessary to boost the food's effectiveness.

Eating is a merging with the earth. It is a life-affirming act. Ritually preparing and eating specific foods is an effective method of enhancing and improving our lives.

### Winter Sabbat Wine

- 1 large or 3 small bottles red wine
- 3 oranges
- 3 tablespoons whole cloves
- Ground nutmeg
- 3 cinnamon sticks
- 1 cup brandy
- 1 cup apple cider

Pour wine into non-metallic, heat-proof container. Wash oranges well. Cut two into thin slices and add to the wine. Stud the remaining orange with cloves, marking out good-fortune runes, and add to the wine. Dust the top of the wine with ground nutmeg and then add remaining ingredients. Warm slowly, but do not boil. Serve on windy nights after the Winter Sabbats.

### Summer Sabbat Wine

- 1 large or 3 small bottles white wine
- Fruits in season (melon, citrus, berries, cherries, pineapple, apricots, pears, cherries, etc.)
- Rose petals, fresh
- 1 lemon
- 1 cup grapefruit juice

Pour wine into container. Chop fruit (about one cup or so, according to taste and availability) and add to wine. Let sit overnight. Before the ritual cut up the lemon into slices, brush with freshly milled coconut (optional) and add to wine. Pour in grapefruit juice and finally float the rose petals on top. Serve well chilled.

## Beltane Wine

3 bottles chilled dry white wine  
 Handful fresh woodruff  
 1 pint strawberries

Pour wine into non-metallic bowl. Shred the woodruff through your hands and add to the wine. Cover with cloth and let steep overnight in a cool place.

In the morning, strain through cheesecloth and return to bowl. Directly before the ritual add sliced strawberries. Chill and remove just before the feast so that it will be cold.

### BELTANE WINE

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 handful fresh woodruff  
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## Samhain Warmer

- 1 pumpkin
- Apple cider
- Cranberry juice
- Ginger ale
- Rum
- Raisins

Slice off top of pumpkin, scoop out seeds and set these aside. Pour equal parts of the liquids to fill the pumpkin; remove and warm until nearly boiling just before feast. Pour back into pumpkin, add a handful of raisins, and set out for coveners to enjoy.

Wash, then dry seeds and toast lightly in the oven, then eat with salt!

## Mulled Cider

- 2 quarts apple cider
- 7 cinnamon sticks
- 1 whole orange
- Cloves
- Nutmeg
- 1 cup mead (optional)

Warm cider in non-metallic pan until hot; add cinnamon sticks. Let set on low heat, steeping. Meanwhile, stud orange with cloves. Add to cider, then dust with about 1 teaspoon nutmeg. Mead can be added if desired. Serve while warm, but not quite hot. Perfect for all fall and winter Sabbats.

## Soft Mead

For a small amount of non-alcoholic mead, take one quart spring water, one cup honey, one lemon cut into slices, one-half teaspoon nutmeg. Boil in non-metallic pot, removing the scum as it rises with wooden

spoon. Add pinch of salt, and juice of one-half lemon. Strain and cool. Drink in place of alcoholic mead, wine, etc.

### Substitutes

Other good liquids to serve in place of wine within the Circle include:

Sabbats: apple juice, grape juice, grapefruit juice, orange juice, pineapple juice, oriental tea

Full Moon celebrations: lemonade, apricot juice, peppermint tea, mango nectar, milk

Any good herbal teas may also be used. Hard (alcoholic) drinks should be used with discretion, for the meal is in the presence of the Gods!

### Crescent (or Moon) Cakes

(Full Moon celebrations, Sabbats)

1 cup almonds, finely grated

1¼ cups flour

¼ cup confectioner's sugar

½ cup butter

1 egg yolk

Combine almonds, flour, and sugar. Work in butter and egg yolk with hands until well blended. Chill. Pinch off pieces of dough the size of walnuts, shape into crescents. Place on greased sheets and bake at 325°F for about 20 minutes.

### Sabbat Cakes

(Serve on Sabbats)

3 teaspoons honey

⅓ cup shortening

½ cup brown sugar

¼ cup apple sauce

1 tablespoon white wine

- 1½ cups whole grain flour
- 1½ cups oatmeal
- ¼ teaspoon baking soda
- ¼ teaspoon salt
- ½ teaspoon allspice

Blend together honey, shortening, sugar, applesauce, and wine. Add remaining ingredients, mix well. Form into a ball of dough. Roll out ¼ inch thick and cut with a crescent-shaped cutter. Place on greased cookie sheets and bake at 350° for 15 minutes or until golden brown.

## Cyder Cake

(Samhain, Yule)

- 3 cups sifted flour
- ½ teaspoon baking soda
- ½ teaspoon grated nutmeg
- ½ cup softened butter
- 1½ cups sugar
- 2 eggs, well beaten
- ½ cup cyder (cider)
- Oven: 350°F

In a mixing bowl, sift together flour, baking soda, and nutmeg. Set aside.

In another, larger mixing bowl, beat together well the butter and sugar. Add eggs and beat well. Then add flour mixture and cider alternately, beginning and ending with the flour.

Spoon batter into a well-buttered 9¼ x 5½ x 2¾ loaf pan, and bake for 1 hour in preheated oven, or until a toothpick inserted into the center of the cake comes out dry.

## Cardamom Apple Pie

(Samhain, Yule)

- Unbaked pastry for 9-inch 2-crust pie
- 5 cups sliced tart apples
- ¾ cup brown sugar (substitute slightly less than 1 cup honey)
- 2 tablespoons butter
- 1 teaspoon ground cardamom seed
- ¾ teaspoon pure vanilla extract

Line 9-inch pie plate with half of pastry; arrange apple slices on pastry, sprinkling with brown sugar or honey between layers. Dot with butter. Add cardamom and vanilla. Roll remaining pastry in circle; place pastry circle over apples; seal and flute edges. Make slits into top of pastry (sign of Venus ♀).

Bake in preheated hot oven (400°F) 10 minutes; reduce oven temperature to 350 and continue baking for 30 to 35 minutes, or until crust is lightly browned.

### CARDAMOM APPLE PIE

(Samhain, Yule)

- Unbaked pastry for 9-inch 2-crust pie
- 5 cups sliced tart apples
- 1/4 cup brown sugar (substitute slightly less than ¼ cup ho-
- 2 tablespoons butter
- 1 teaspoon ground cardamom seed
- 3/4 teaspoon pure vanilla extract

Line 9-inch pie plate with half of pastry; arrange apple-slices in pastry, sprinkling with brown sugar or honey between layers. Dot with butter. Add cardamom and vanilla. Roll remaining pastry in circle; place pastry circle over apples; seal and flute edges. Make slits into top of pastry: (sign of Venus)



Bake in preheated hot oven (400°F.) 10 minutes; reduce oven temperature to 350 and continue baking for 30 to 35 minutes or until crust is lightly browned.

## Marigold Custard

- 1 pint milk
- 1 cup marigold petals
- 1 teaspoon salt
- 3 tablespoons sugar
- Small piece vanilla bean
- 3 egg yolks
- $\frac{1}{8}$  teaspoon nutmeg
- $\frac{1}{8}$  teaspoon allspice
- $\frac{1}{2}$  teaspoon rose water

Pound marigold petals in a mortar, or crush them with a spoon, and scald with the milk and vanilla bean. Remove the vanilla bean, and add slightly beaten yolks of eggs, salt, and sugar mixed with the spice. Cook until the mixture coats the spoon. Add rosewater and cool. This makes a good sauce for a blancmange. It may be poured into a dish without cooking, and then baked like custard. Serve with beaten cream, add orange water, and garnish with marigold blossoms.

## Colcannon

(Samhain)

- 4 large or 6 medium potatoes
- Cold water
- 1 teaspoon salt
- 4 cups finely shredded cabbage
- 2 cups boiling salted water
- 1 cup warm milk
- Salt and pepper
- 4 tablespoons butter, melted

Peel potatoes, remove eyes. Cut large potatoes in quarters, or medium potatoes in half. Place in large saucepan, cover with cold water. Add salt, bring to boil. Reduce heat to low; cook approximately 20 minutes or until fork-tender. Drain well, return to saucepan. Place tea towel between pan and lid; steam over very low heat 10 minutes.

Meanwhile, cook cabbage in boiling salted water 5 minutes. Drain well, reserve.

Mash potatoes with warm milk. Season with salt and pepper. Beat in cooked cabbage to form pale-green fluff. Place in warm serving dish. Make well in center, pour in melted butter. Serve immediately. Serves half a coven.

## Rowan Jelly

To make about four pounds:

- 2 pounds rowans
- 1 pound crab apples
- 2 pints water (5 cups)
- Granulated sugar

Wash the berries, remove any damaged ones, and snip off the excess stalks. Put the fruit into a pan with the apples, roughly chopped. Add the water, then simmer the fruits until soft—about 30 minutes. Strain the liquid through a scalded jelly bag and leave it overnight to drip—do not be tempted to squeeze the bag or a cloudy jelly will result.

Next day measure the liquid and add 1 lb. sugar to every pint of juice (2 cups to 22 cups liquid). Gradually dissolve the sugar in the syrup, then bring the jelly to a boil and boil it until setting point—about 15 minutes. Test for set by placing a spoonful on a plate, letting it cool and then pushing the surface with your finger. If it wrinkles, the jam is ready. Put into warm, clean jars, seal covers, label, and store until required. May be used all year round, especially served with thick soups and stews and meat during the dark months of the year (Samhain to Beltane).

### Samhain Cake

Baked into this cake are several charms representative of the gods and good fortune. These should be wrapped in aluminum foil or waxed paper before being added to the cake batter, and can be made of any (nonpoisonous) substance desired.

1 cup butter

1 cup sugar

4 medium eggs

3 cups self-rising flour

Grated rind of an orange

3 tablespoons milk

8-inch cake tin, greased, and base lined with waxed paper

Beat butter until soft, add sugar and cream, beating together to a soft and fluffy texture. Beat in the eggs one at a time, adding a little sifted flour if the mixture begins to curdle. Stir in the charms, carefully wrapped, the orange rind with the milk, and all the flour to make a soft dropping consistency. Turn the mixture into the pan and spread it to the sides, leaving the center slightly hollow.

Bake at 350°F for 1 to 1¼ hours or until the cake is well risen, golden brown, and slightly shrinking away from the sides of the tin. Leave the cake to cool.

## Icing

- ⅓ cup (6 tablespoons) apricot jam (or orange marmalade)
- 3¼ cups confectioner's sugar
- Juice of 1 orange
- A little orange coloring

Split the cake in half, spread it with the jam, then sandwich the pieces back together again and stand the cake on a wire tray. Mix the orange juice with the icing sugar, adding warm water if necessary, to make an icing that thickly coats the back of a spoon. Color the icing orange, then pour it over the cake, guiding it to the edges and letting it flow over the sides. Leave the cake to dry, then decorate.

## Saffron Rice

A Sabbath food served with sweet potato casserole, broccoli with caper sauce, hot cornbread, flaming apples and fruits in season, and, of course, baked ham in cider (Yule).

- 1½ tablespoons butter
- 1½ teaspoons saffron (Spanish strand type)\*
- 2 teaspoons crystal (rock) salt
- 1½ cups rice, about ¾ lb.\*\*
- 1½ tablespoons vermouth

Heat vermouth to blood temperature, add saffron, stir. In a heavy saucepan heat rice, water and salt. When it starts to boil, add the butter to keep from frothing and boiling over. As it boils, add the vermouth mixture. Stir, then cover and simmer over slow heat for fifteen minutes, or until rice has absorbed all the water.

\*1 teaspoon saffron to one cup rice. To get the best coloring power, it should first be steeped in a warm, not hot, alcoholic bath.

\*\*Note: this recipe is fragmented. For instance, it doesn't record how much water to use for the rice. Follow directions on package for this, as it depends on the type of rice being used.

## Saffron Cake\*

(Yule, Candlemas)

- ½ ounce yeast
- 8 tablespoons flour
- 4 ounces butter
- 2 ounces sugar
- 1 tablespoon chopped candied peel
- 1 egg
- ¼ teaspoon mixed spice (opt.)
- 1 gill (¼ cup) warm water
- Pinch salt
- 4 teaspoons powdered saffron
- 3 tablespoons seedless raisins

Dissolve the yeast in the tepid water and mix in about 2 tablespoons of flour. Mix well, cover with a cloth, and leave for about one hour or until twice the size. Sift the rest of the flour into a basin with the salt and spice, if you are using it. Cream butter and sugar, add the beaten egg and the saffron, mixed well with a teaspoon of water. Combine with the flour and add to the yeast dough. Knead well, adding raisins and peel, put into a greased loaf tin, and leave to rise again for about 2 hours. Cook in moderate oven for 1½ hours.

\*This cake can be made without yeast, using a teaspoon of baking powder and 2 eggs for the same ingredients listed. It can be made into small buns for coven purposes. If baking powder is used, it should not be left to rise.

## The Simple Feast

Hold up cup of wine between the hands to the sky, and say:

I bless these cakes.*

All eat, and drink, sitting in the Circle.

*An Herbal  
Grimoire*

In centuries past, when the nightmares we know of as cities had yet to be born, we lived in harmony with the earth and used her treasures wisely. Many knew the old magics of herbs and plants.

Knowledge was passed down from one generation to another, and so the lore was widely circulated and used. Most country folk knew one herb that was a powerful protection against evil, or a certain flower that produced prophetic dreams, and perhaps a sure-fire love charm or two.

Witches had their own intricate operations of herbal magic, as did the magicians and alchemists. Soon a body of magical knowledge accumulated surrounding the simple herbs that grew beside fast-running streams, in verdant meadows, and high on lonely cliffs.

Many of our ancestors, however, looked to the stars, away from earth, and dreamed of greater things. In racing toward mechanized perfection, humanity became orphaned from the earth, and much of the lore was forgotten.

Fortunately, it was not lost completely. Witches became the keepers of the secrets of the earth; thus, they were looked upon with fear by those who had already turned their backs on the Old Ways. Terror and hatred forced the Witches into hiding, and for centuries the secrets remained untouched.

Today we are experiencing a resurgence of earth awareness. Ecological organizations prosper. Recycling is a booming business. People are turning from chemicals and artificially preserved foods to more healthy fare.

Herbs long unadorned have once again come into their own. But aside from hints and speculation, the magical art of herbalism has largely been left unexplored and unexplained.

In magic, especially herb magic, an herb is a plant prized for its vibrations, or energies. Thus the herbs in this section include seaweed, cacti, trees, fruits and flowers that one might not normally consider to be herbs.

## Of the Circle

The Circle may be fashioned with garlands of flowers sacred to the gods. Alternately, the flowers should be scattered around the perimeter.

The point candles may be ringed with fresh herbs and flowers suitable to the appropriate element.

Fresh flowers should always be present on the altar or, if none are available, use greens (such as at Yule).

When casting the Circle around a tree, use the fruit, nuts, or flowers of that tree to mark out the Circle.

All of these, of course, are used in addition to the cord or stones.

## Of the Fire

The Fire shall be composed of the nine woods:

Rowan  
Apple  
Elder  
Dogwood  
Poplar  
Juniper  
Cedar  
Pine  
Holly

If these are unavailable, use native wood or oak. Rites run on the seashore should be illuminated with fires of driftwood, collected by the coven prior to the rites.

## Of the Covenstead

The plants growing near and around the covenstead are excellent plants to use on the altar during ritual. When the rites must be moved indoors (due to rain or other inclement weather), collect a few sprigs of the plants and bring these into the Circle during ritual.

If the covenstead is indoors, choose an odd-numbered selection of sacred plants to grow there. If they receive little sunlight, move them outdoors occasionally to receive the solar energies. Give them love and energy, and they will aid in your worship and magic.

### Of the Coveners

Wear fresh flowers and herbs in your hair and on your body. Crowns of flowers are always appropriate in spring and summer rites, and at all handfastings.

Women may wish to make their necklaces from herbs and seeds, such as tonka beans, whole nutmegs, star anise, acorns, and other seeds and nuts, strung on a natural fiber.

### Of the Tools

These are instructions for dedicating the tools prior to the usual consecration.

#### The Sword or Athame

Rub the blade with fresh basil, rosemary, and oak leaves (or any herbs of Fire) at sunset, outdoors where you will not be disturbed or seen. Lay the sword or athame, point to the South, and sprinkle laurel leaves (preferably fresh) over it, walking deosil thrice around it. Sit before it, facing South, and invoke the God to infuse your sword or athame with his strength. Place your palms on the hilt; grip it tightly, stand, and raise it to the sky, invoking the Goddess to charge your sword or athame with her love.

When the Sun has set, wrap your sword or athame in red silk or cotton cloth and take it home.

#### The White-Hilted Knife

Go to the forest (or park, garden, etc.). Choose the most beautiful and vibrant plants. Touch the point of the white-hilted knife to these in

turn, forging a connection with your knife and the plants (and thus, with the Earth).

Next, being sure that no one sees you, draw an Earth-invoking pentagram on the bare earth, facing North. Now the white-hilted knife may be consecrated.

This dedication should be performed early in the morning.

### **The Wand**

The wand should be selected from a tree of the appropriate type. A general-use wand in the Craft is made of willow, cut during the Full Moon. Other specialized wands can be made, according to the following correspondences:

Apple—Love

Hazel—Wisdom, Divination

Ash—Healing

Birch—Purification

Elder—Evoking and Exorcising Entities

Oak—Solar Workings

or:

Sun: Oak

Moon: Willow

Mars: Hawthorn

Mercury: Hazel

Jupiter: Cedar

Saturn: Poplar

Venus: Apple

The wand should be constructed in the usual way. Just prior to consecration rub the wand with fresh lavender, eucalyptus or mint leaves.

### **The Pentacle**

Place the pentacle on the bare Earth, and cover with dried, crumbled patchouli, parsley, or mistletoe, or fresh jasmine and honeysuckle flowers. Let this remain for forty heartbeats as you sit facing North. Then

pick up the pentacle and scatter the herbs or flowers to the four quarters, starting in the North.

(If done indoors, fill a small dish with fresh earth and place the pentacle on this. Proceed as above, throwing the herbs or flowers out the window, or saving them for later scattering outdoors.)

### **The Censer**

Fume pure rosemary or frankincense within the censer prior to its consecration. Do this for at least an hour.

### **The Cords**

Bind with willow.

### **The Cauldron**

Take the cauldron to a stream, a river, lake, or ocean. Dip it into the water and fill it, then set on the water's edge (on both water and earth) and dedicate it to the Goddess, placing your hands on either side of the cauldron, touching the water.

(If inside, perform the rite in the bathtub, after adding a bit of consecrated salt. Let the water be cold or cool.)

### **The Cup**

Anoint the base with gardenia, rose, or violet oil and fill with pure spring water. Then set afloat in the cup a sprig of ivy, a small rose, a fresh gardenia, or some other appropriate herb or flower. Gaze into it and invoke the Goddess to bless the cup.

### **The Broom**

Fashion the broom of an ash staff, birch twigs, and a willow binding. Brush the broom with fresh Water herbs, then bury these with due solemnity.

### **The Candles**

For general rites, add a drop or two of vervain oil to the melted wax prior to making the candles. For Yule, add pine; Beltane, honeysuckle;

Lammas, apple blossom; Hallows, cypress. Use either the oil or herb, whichever is available.

For Full Moon ritual candles, add seven drops of sandalwood oil.

If you must purchase the candles rather than make them, anoint with the specified oils.

### **The Crystal or Mirror**

Rub the mirror on the Full of the Moon with fresh mugwort.

For the crystal, take it outside, hold it up to the Full Moon, and catch the image. Then rub it with fresh mugwort leaves (or dried, if the fresh are unavailable). Repeat for both the crystal and the mirror at least thrice a year.

### **The Book**

Sew into the cover of the Book leaves of the sacred herbs vervain, rue, bay laurel, or others. They must be well-dried and secretly placed by the light of the Full Moon.

Whole dried and pressed catnip or costmary leaves may be used as book marks in the Book.

### **The Robe**

Lay it among sachets filled with lavender, vervain, and cedar when not in use. Sew a bit of rosemary or frankincense into the hem while fashioning it.

## **Of the Herbs and Plants of the Sabbats**

To be used as decorations on the altar and around the Circle.

### **Samhain**

Chrysanthemum, wormwood, apple, hazel, pomegranate, all grains, harvested fruits and nuts, pumpkin.

**Yule**

Holly, mistletoe, ivy, cedar, bay laurel, juniper, rosemary, pine. Place offerings of oranges, nutmegs, lemons, and whole cinnamon sticks on the Tree.

**Candlemas**

Snowdrop, rowan, the first flowers of the year.

**Spring Equinox**

Daffodil, woodruff, gorse, olive, peony, narcissus, all spring flowers.

**Beltane**

Hawthorn, honeysuckle, St. John's wort.

**Summer Solstice**

Mugwort, vervain, chamomile, rose, lily, oak, lavender, ivy, yarrow, fern, elder, wild thyme, daisy, carnation.

**Lammas**

All grains, grapes, heather, blackberries, sloe, crab apples.

**Autumn Equinox**

Hazel, corn, aspen, acorns, oak sprigs, autumn leaves, wheat stalks, cypress cones, pine cones, harvest gatherings.

### Of the Trees of the Sabbats

Samhain: Elder

Yule: Hyssop

Candlemas: Rowan

Spring Equinox: Alder

Beltane: Willow

Summer Solstice: Cedar

Lammas: Holly

Autumn Equinox: Vine

## Of Full Moon Rituals

Use all nocturnal, white, or five-petaled flowers, such as the white rose, night-blooming jasmine, carnations, gardenias, lilies, iris —any pleasingly scented flowers which shall call forth the Goddess.

## Of Offerings

### To the Goddess

Those flowers used in the Full Moon Rituals; blue flowers, those dedicated to Venus or the Moon; rue, vervain, and olive; or others that you see fit.

### To the God

All fiery or airy herbs; strong-scented, clean, or citrusy herbs and flowers; yellow or red blooms; cones, seeds, cacti and other stinging herbs; oranges, garlic, cloves, frankincense, and so on.

Also, those specifically dedicated to the gods you are working with.

As the Wicca we will take only that which we need from the green and growing things of the Earth; never failing to attune with the plant before harvesting, nor failing to leave a token of gratitude and respect.

*Herbal Recipes  
and Secrets*

**M**any Witches combine their magical knowledge of herbs with the medicinal side as well, finding that the two often work in tandem for added power. Herbal cures are frequently boosted with a dash of magic to speed the healing process.

The basis of magical healing is just that, magic. It uses the powers of the herbs fortified and directed by the healer to heal the body directly through the force of magic.

One word of warning: magic is not to be used in the place of professional medical attention. For serious injuries or illnesses, consult a physician as any non-Witch or Witch would do. These remedies are mainly used for lesser maladies.

### For Coughs

Fill a pot with water, boil a whole lemon for nine minutes, then take out of pot, squeeze out juice, add the same amount of honey, and drink while still hot.

### To Sleep

Equal parts:

Valerian

Lady's Slipper

Skullcap

Add one teaspoon to cup of water; let steep nine minutes, strain, and drink. It will be bitter, so you can add honey to help you get it down. The hotter you can drink it, the better. Then rest and relax, and you will fall asleep.

### For Digestive Upsets

One teaspoon peppermint to one cup water, steeped, effectively relieves common stomach upsets.

### **To Clear the Sinuses**

Inhale fumes from steeping peppermint or eucalyptus teas, and inhale fumes from eucalyptus oil. Or stand on your head.

### **For Sunburn**

Pour apple cider vinegar or plain black tea, chilled, over the affected areas.

### **For a Wound**

Lay a spider's web over the area until medical attention can be found.

### **For Poisoning by a Plant**

Know the plants in your area, including the poisonous ones and their antidotes. The antidote, by Witch tradition, will be growing nearby any poisonous plant.

If you don't know wild plants, don't eat them. All it takes is one little mistake.

### **For Headache**

Camomile tea rests the head, as does a tea of peppermint and thyme. Or, rub fresh mint leaves on the temples.

### **Aphrodisia: A Love Drink**

- 1 pinch rosemary
- 3 pinches thyme
- 2 teaspoons oriental tea
- few pieces orange peel
- 1 pinch coriander seed
- 3 mint leaves
- 5 rose petals
- 5 lemon leaves
- 3 pinches nutmeg

Put into teapot. Boil water and add to pot. Sweeten with honey, if desired. Serve hot. Makes 3 cups.

### **To Repel Flying Insects**

Bruise peppermint or alder leaves and rub on skin, clothing.

### **Herbal Tranquilizer**

Brew up a pot of catnip tea and drink it warm, with honey if you wish.

### **For a Burn**

Rub aloe vera (cactus) juice, or administer full-strength Chinese tea (chilled) to the area.

### **To Prevent Getting a Cold**

Drink sassafras tea while coming out of the cold.

### **To Stop Smoking**

Chew licorice roots when you feel the urge.

### **To Sleep**

Take a small bag and put into it dried rose petals, dried mint, and powdered cloves. To cause sleep, inhale the fragrance.

### **To Strengthen the Spirits**

Go to the garden and pick fresh rosemary, southernwood, marjoram, costmary, and a bit more rosemary. Crush the herbs slightly in your hand and inhale.

### **To Cure a Cold**

Eat a (raw) onion sandwich. Take several eucalyptus berries (green), string on a green thread, and wear around the neck. While collecting berries from the tree, release the cold into the tree. When the cold is gone, bury or throw away eucalyptus necklace.

### **To Strengthen Virility**

Carry an acorn, or a piece of a mandrake root. Eat asparagus and seafood.

# *Incenses*

**I**ncense has smoldered on magicians' altars for at least 5,000 years. It was burned in antiquity to mask odors of sacrificial animals, to carry prayers to the gods, and to create a pleasing environment for humans to meet with deity.

Today, when the age of animal sacrifices among most Western magicians is long past, the reasons for incense use are varied. It is burned during magic to promote ritual consciousness, the state of mind necessary to rouse and direct personal energy. This is also achieved through the use of magical tools, by standing before the candle-bewitched altar, and by intoning chants and symbolic words.

When burned prior to magical workings, fragrant smoke also purifies the altar and the surrounding area of negative, disturbing vibrations. Though such a purification isn't usually necessary, it, once again, helps create the appropriate mental state necessary for the successful practice of magic.

Specially formulated incenses are burned to attract specific energies to the magician and to aid her or him in charging personal power with the ritual's goal, eventually creating the necessary change.

Incense, in common with all things, possesses specific vibrations. The magician chooses the incense for magical use with these vibrations in mind. If performing a healing ritual, she or he burns a mixture composed of herbs that promote healing.

When the incense is smoldered in a ritual setting, it undergoes a transformation. The vibrations, no longer trapped in their physical form, are released into the environment. Their energies, mixing with those of the magician, speed out to effect the changes necessary to the manifestation of the goal.

Not all incense formulas are strictly for magical use. Some are smoldered in thanks or offering to various aspects of deity, just as juniper was burned to Inanna 5,000 years ago in Sumer. Other blends are designed to enhance Wiccan rituals.



# *Oils*

**I**t has become quite popular to use essential oils for magical purposes. Such practices, often thought of as being ancient, do indeed date back thousands of years in one form or another; but not until recently were the array of true and synthetic botanical oils available for ritual purposes.

Scented oils were used in antiquity. These were created by heating fragrant plant materials in oil or fat. The plant's scent was transferred to the oil and thus was fragrant.

Many people tell me they want to make their own oils. Unfortunately, this is a difficult process. Why? Here are a few reasons:

- It requires a large investment in equipment.
- It requires a large amount of fresh plant materials.
- The process must be carefully carried out to exacting standards.
- Often the results aren't worth the investment of time and money.

There are a few plant oils that can be extracted at home without much difficulty. For the rest, simply buy and blend high quality oils for ritual use.

It is best to use only genuine, authentic essential oils in magic. These contain the sum of the plant's magical energies and so are the most effective. True, they aren't cheap, but they last longer because only small amounts are necessary.

There is no magic secret for blending and mixing magical oils. Here's the basic method:

- Assemble the essential oils (and bouquets) called for in the recipe.
- In a clean, sterilized jar add  $\frac{1}{8}$  cup of a vegetable oil. I've found jojoba works the best because it isn't truly an oil, but a form of liquid wax, it never becomes rancid and can be kept for longer periods of time.
- Using an eye dropper, add the oils in recommended proportions.
- Swirl the essential oils into the base oil, don't stir. Gently rotate the oil clockwise.
- Finally, store all oils away from heat, light, and moisture.

**The Bath**

Fill the tub with warm water, add half a handful sea salt, a little cider vinegar, and the bath bag full of herbs. Let the herbs color the water. Relax and drain yourself of tenseness, dirt, psychic garbage. Scrub your skin with the bag to release the oils inside the herbs and to wake yourself. Drain the water and step out refreshed, ready to perform a work of worship, attunement, or magic.

*Magical Lore,  
Spells,  
and Rituals*

A spell is a magical ritual. It's usually nonreligious in nature and often involves the use of symbols or symbolic actions and words. It's a specific series of movements, use of tools, and inner processes (such as visualization) to create a specific manifestation.

A spell is a spell is a spell. Old spells are no more effective than new spells. But to manifest your need, the spell must be designed to do three things:

- a) Raise personal power (and in natural magic, to unite it with earth power).
- b) Program this energy (through visualization).
- c) Release the energy.

This book is filled with spells of all types. Each is designed to accomplish these three things, but they need the magician's help. A spell is truly magical only in the hands of a magician. Once you've started practicing magic, you are a magician.

## The Places to Perform Magic

The places best fitted for magic making are those which are concealed, removed, and separated from the places of men. Desolate and uninhabited regions are most appropriate, such as the borders of lakes, forests, islands, mountains, caves, grottos, and deserts. Lightning-struck trees, ancient earthworks, standing stones, and a crossroads where three roads meet, Diana's domain, are also appropriate.

But if such places are remote, or if some force hinders the performance of magic in these places, your house, or garden, or indeed, any place, provided it has been purified and consecrated with the necessary ceremonies, will be fit in the sight of the gods.

These arts should be carried out at night; this is the time of greatest lunar power, and is also a symbol that it is just and right to hide them from the sight of the foolish, the ignorant, and the profane.

## The Places of Magic

The desert is the place of extremes; it is a place of masculine, powerful, intellectual, philosophical magic. As such, it is excellent for meditation, for visualization, for attuning yourself to the winds and the sun and fire. Of course it is fine for calling forth the salamanders and sylphs and the God.

The seashore is the place of feminine energy, where sea and land, the two female elements, meet. Here is the place for spiritual growth; for emotional magic, for invocations, for clearing, prophecy, initiations, love-magic, healing; for attuning with the very life-cycles of the world. It is also an excellent place for calling forth the undines and invoking the Goddess.

The mountaintop is the place for solar rituals; for attaining greatness in all things, for lifting yourself out of your life to look at it without prejudice; for seeking the truth, for success in the material life.

The cave is the place of feminine mysteries; it represents the womb and thusly the Goddess. It is a very sacred place and care must be taken that the emotions are not over-wrought while inside one. A sea cave or grotto is doubly powerful; here initiations were often performed. It is an excellent place for making requests of the Gnomes or, at the sea cave, one that has the ocean flowing in and out of it, of the Undines.

The blasted or lightning-struck tree is a place of masculine energy, and thus is perfect for banishing rituals of all types.

Standing stones, ancient earthworks, ruins, mounds, and all manner of prehistoric or very old sites are fine to work in if the magic and vibrations of the place are good and in harmony with you and all who work with you.

Stone circles can be excellent places too, but again, check to make sure there is no evil within.

## To See Leys

Stand upon a tall hill or rock. Half-close your eyes, still your mind, and watch for faintly-glowing tracks cutting through the countryside. They will appear to cut straight through bushes, houses, or mountains. They will glow, either blue or greenish, or possibly yellow/goldish. The best

time to do this is in the summer, at sunrise, or sunset, and best of all on Midsummer's Eve, just at sunset.

If others have seen these leys, they might have marked them with standing stones, buildings, roads, fences, hedges, and so on. But you may discover lines of energy never before known. Good luck!

## To See If the Rain Has Ended

If the rain has stopped, but you would know if for good, look to the sky. If you see birds, it is a good sign that it has stopped. However, to be sure, watch the birds in flight. Say aloud:

*Birds of the air  
Fly without care.  
Will it rain here?  
Will it rain there?*

If they fly off, stop chanting and look closely to the direction they fly:

*To the East, 'twill be clear  
To the South, storm you'll hear  
To the West, never end  
To the North, Sun descend*

## Tapping Star Power

Sit out beneath the stars. It should be a clear night, but the warmer the better, since coolness makes it more difficult to tap the powers.

Bathe in the starlight; feel the brilliant white-bluish light flowing down onto your body. It is warm; it warms your muscles, relaxes you, and yet infuses you with a tremendous energy. Remember, the stars are suns, far away and yet affecting us and our world.

For visualization, see a star field in your mind. Pick out one star and propel yourself to it. Spread your hands out before you and take in as much energy through them as you can from the star. You do not have to approach the star too closely; when your hands start to burn you are close enough. To go on would be foolish. Stop and clutch the power within your hands. Come back down into your body and release the energy by flinging your hands, concentrating on your magical intent. So shall it be.

For communication, lie down on the earth on a cloudless or fairly clear night. In the mountains or desert, or far from the haunts of man, it is better, for the sky will be clearer for lack of nearby lights. Watch the

stars overhead, picking out patterns at first, seeing how certain stars make pictures in the sky. Then diffuse your concentration; let go of your conscious mind; blank out all else but the stars. Open yourself to communication; see what the stars have to say to you.

## **The Tides and Ocean**

Do positive, productive spells when the tide is coming in. Do destructive or banishing spells when the tide is going out.

High tide is the best time to do all spells; get a tide table and chart the highest tide around the date you wish to do your spell. If you can do the spell on the highest tide of the month, it is even better.

If you live near a large body of water your clairvoyant faculties will be stronger than if you live away from water.

## **Sea Shells**

Sea shells are symbols of the Goddess and are excellent gifts. Wear them around the neck to honor her, or bless and pass to friends. They may also be used to symbolize the Goddess upon the altar, or even to contain salt or water upon the altar. They are used to draw money and prosperity, or to induce fertility.

With the large univalve shells, hold them up to the ear to induce a clairvoyant state. The sounds heard while doing this are called "the voice of the sea."

When doing rites on the seashore, you can mark out the Circle with shells.

## **The Holed Stone, or Witches Stone**

On the seashore, find a stone with a hole in it; one that pierces the stone completely through. This is valuable in magic in many ways. Hang it up in the home as a protection, or around the neck. It can be placed upon the altar as a symbol of the goddess Diana, or put into water to bless and purify it. If you wish to see spirits, take the stone to a cemetery or wherever you believe spirits to be and look through the hole, keeping the

other eye closed. This may also be used to facilitate astral vision in general, wherever you are. But this is best performed at night. This can also be tried to facilitate astral hearing, by placing the stone next to the ear. The Holed Stone is one of the most valuable of all Wiccan tools, and it is free, a gift of the Goddess.

### The Four Basic Forms of Magic

The Image (poppets, roots, pictures, symbols, runes)

The Brew (potions, oils, simples and compounds, incense)

The Knot (cord magic)

The Charm (amulets and talismans, herbs, stones, symbols)

Take a black candle. Name it the person who is doing you harm, or rather, that person's power to do you harm. Now take it in both hands and break it. Then melt or bury it and things should look up. This won't hurt the person; only their effectiveness in harming you or the person you are working for.

Write what you want on a piece of paper, using a picture, runes, words, images, etc. Then place the appropriate herb in the center of the paper. Wrap this up in the paper, secure the ends, and throw into a very hot fire, stating or imaging your wish. So it will come to pass. This is called a "petition." Always thank the gods for what comes to pass.

### The Magical Fluids of the Body

If you are right handed:

Your right hand is "electric" (masculine, commanding, vibrant, outward)

Your left hand is "magnetic" (feminine, passive, soothing, inward)

Use your right hand for directing power, for holding aloft your athame, or using it in place of your athame if it is not with you. Send energy *out* through your right hand; take energy *in* with your left.

If you are left handed, the above attributes should be reversed.

When you infuse an object with power, energy, or a special purpose, you have locked in the energy into that object. When this is done be sure to also set a release or key so that this energy can be released at any time,

mentally. This is a great help when you are too sick or otherwise unable to raise this energy yourself. You can tap energy you have stored up in times of need. You needn't have the object with you; indeed the object need not be an actual object. But if you make it on the astral be sure you can image it exactly as you did when you locked energy into it.

## Color Magic

*Red Magic:* matters of the body, both human and animal. This includes medicine, the military, hunting, physical strength, power, and zoology.

*Orange Magic:* matters of ego-strength, materialism, pride, self-confidence, courage, security.

*Yellow Magic:* mental faculties, mathematics, philosophy, learning, theorizing.

*Green Magic:* fertility, creativity, beauty, art, agriculture, herbalism.

*Blue Magic:* religion, ESP, spiritualism, psychic phenomena, social sciences, prophecy.

*Indigo Magic:* rain making and all weather working, astronomy, astrophysics, time travel, space exploration.

*Purple Magic:* love, lust, hate, fear, anger, ecstasy, politics.

*Ultraviolet Magic:* pure power.

*Brown Magic:* materialism, animals, ecology, hunting, the magic of woods and glens.

The above is a fairly modern method of categorizing magical methods by colors. Below is another, less organized, but highly effective system. Use the color indicated somehow in your ritual and it will be all that more effective. The powers of colors should not be underestimated.

### Cord Magic

Take cord of the correct color for the intent involved and shape it on the altar or ground into a design of the thing you want: a car, money, peace, whatever. Send forth power and so shall it be.

## Using the Tarot in Magic

There is a method of using the Tarot cards in magic; but it is one in which the card itself is consumed by the elements; therefore this can be costly, but a highly effective method.

The procedure begins with meditation on each of the seventy-eight cards. Sit quietly with the card, gazing at the symbols, and mentally invoke: For what would I use this card in magic? Record each card's magical use in a separate book. Do one card a night for seventy-eight nights. After this, buy several decks of the one you chose to do the meditations on.

Now, you are ready to use the Tarot. For this you must write your own rituals. For instance, if you were doing a spell to attract love, the Two of Cups might be appropriate. Since love is an attribute of Water, you might anoint the card with lotus oil, wrap it in blue silk, and toss it into the sea, imploring the Sylphs to grant you a love. Make up a chant to use along with the ritual.

Similarly all the cards can be used, in tune with the element, or planet, involved. If you were wishing to get rid of a bad habit, choose the card that most closely represents that habit and, after ritually naming it that habit, cut it up in pieces, burn the pieces, and bury the ashes. And so on with each type of ritual.

In this type of magic the card itself must be destroyed, or sent into an element, so that the power of the image is transferred to the rite. This is why you must have several decks available to use.

There is another type of Tarot magic in which the card is worn as an amulet or talisman. If a person seeks mastery over the elements, for instance, he or she might stitch a bag of a cloth that incorporates all four elemental colors into its design and put the Chariot card into this. This could then be anointed with the correct oils and carried while he or she is working on the elements.

Or if a person was having mental troubles, he or she might carry the Ace of Swords (or Wands, if he or she attributes that suit to the realm of Air, as many Wiccans do).

This system of magic is only sketchily presented here, because it is a very personal type. If you work with it, it can bring you excellent results.

## A Healing

Bind the affected part of the body (i.e., the hand, arm, limb, torso, etc.) with red or black cord. Tie it tightly, saying the following:

*I do not bind the (name part of body). I bind the disease residing there that it may leave the flesh and spirit of this person and enter the cord. Great Mother Cerridwen and Kernunnos, the Horned One, aid me in my work here. The disease is bound into the cord; only flames can release it hence! So mote it be!*

Unriddle the cord, touching it only as much as necessary. Throw it into a very hot fire. Visualize the disease melting, evaporating into the fire; it is being cleansed in the flames. This takes intense concentration, but works.

## A Healing 2

Take a good strong magnet and stroke it over the afflicted spot several times while concentrating; the magnet absorbs the disease. Then bury the magnet for thirteen days off in the woods, away from living beings. Or, put a magnet in the bed and let it absorb the disease slowly. Or, wear a magnet. Always bury for thirteen days to release the sickness, then cleanse it and it can be used again, if it has not lost its power.

## The Clover Spell

When you desire a wish to be granted:

Go to a hill on which the four-leaved clover grows. Pluck five of them by their stems and hold them up to the sky, saying:

*Lord of the Day, Lady of Night, May you smile upon my rite.*

Then face north and, as you throw one clover in that direction, state your wish. Then repeat the procedure to the east, south, and west. When finished, face north again and eat the fifth clover. As it has become a part of you and your life, so too will your wish.

### **To Find a Lost Object**

Still your mind. Stand in the room in which you believe you lost it. Then reach out your hand, without thinking of where you are reaching or in what direction. Chances are that will be the direction in which the object will lie.

### **To Change a Person's Mind**

Look at the person's head. See it become clear, transparent. See the dust inside of it; the dust of his or her bad habits and ideas, the destructive ones. Dust it out with an astral feather duster (a red one, made of flame). It sings off all badness inside that person's mind—badness only, not the good. When you are done, remove the flame-duster and the head should go opaque again. It is done, but this is manipulation and should be used only with care.

### **Chant for Flying**

*Fly, Fly, Fly, thereby!*  
*Up o'er the Mountains,*  
*Up o'er the Seas!*  
*Down in the Valleys,*  
*Through the tall Trees!*

Chant to produce astral projection.

## To Be Said During the Dark of the Moon

*Pray to the Moon when She be slivered  
From ill you shall be delivered  
What now harms you shall be bound  
Down, down into the ground.*

On a clean sheet of paper, write with a clean pen and lemon juice what you wish a person to do (sell you his home, be friendlier to you, etc.). Do this carefully. Let it dry. Now type or write your regular letter over this. Though they cannot see the invisible writing, their subconscious mind will read it and it will take effect. This works with cards, memos, letters, and so on. You could try using a stalk of a plant that had a good deal of sap in it to write with as well.

## To Break a Spell Cast Upon You

Drink salt water.

## Memory Reminders

Tie a knot in a yellow cord for each thing that must be remembered that day. Do this in the morning. Concentrate. See yourself remembering each thing as needed. Carry the cord with you and untie each knot as the thing is remembered.

Put one bead, pebble, or other small object in the pocket for each thing you wish to remember. Throw one out for each one as you remember it.

## To Remove Obstacles, Bad Habits, Problems

Tie a knot in a black cord for each problem at the dark of the Moon, then burn it. Bury the ashes. As it goes up in flames, so too will your problems. It is best to work on one problem at a time; when that is solved, go on to the next one. This is what is meant by "power shared is power lost"; in other words, if you work on many projects your energy is divided; concentrate on one thing at a time and your magic will blossom.

## Old Magical Tricks—The Actual Magical Operations Involved

Listening to the Wind—clairvoyance

Flying—astral projection

Making Stones Speak—psychometry

Shape-Shifting—mind transference, illusion (when others see it)

Invisibility—astral projection

Water to Wine—illusion

Illusion magic was often used to scare away enemies, or to get one out of a tight spot. It was never used for 'fun,' but always in earnest.

### The Magic Mirror

Find a good, round mirror, of thirteen to thirty inches in diameter. Ideally, it should be encased in a similarly round frame, painted black, but make do with what you can find.

After purchasing the mirror (without haggling over the price), bring it home and wash the face carefully with a simple of mugwort. To make a mugwort simple, steep one tablespoon mugwort in three cups hot water for thirteen minutes; strain and cool before using.

When the mirror has dried, cover its face with a black cloth and lay where it will not be touched until the Full Moon.

On that night, expose the mirror to the rays of the Moon, preferably outside, but through a window if necessary. Charge the ritual mirror by describing circles over it with your hands, palms down, the right hand moving clockwise and the left counterclockwise, and saying:

*Lady of the Moon, Great Diana,  
You who sees all things and knows all knowledge,  
I consecrate this mirror in your name,  
That it might aid me in my magic.*

Now, hang the mirror on an east-facing wall. Keep it covered when not in use.

Expose the mirror to the rays of the Full Moon at least three times a year. When it gets dusty (if it should) wash with the mugwort simple.

If you wish, you may use a psychic oil to draw the symbol of the Moon on its back.

Some use the mirror as a means to achieve astral projection, but I don't recommend this. One can get the feeling that you are trapped in the mirror, and this can be dangerous to the newcomer.

Never use your mirror for anything other than magic. Have a separate mirror to use for everyday things: combing or brushing hair, and so on. Keep the magic mirror covered at all times when not in use.

### Wiccan Mirror Lore

The first mirrors were lakes. The shiny blades of the Athames were also used as mirrors, and in place of the crystal, which is a mirror-like object as well.

All mirrors are symbols of the Moon and of the goddess Diana. If you would make a magic mirror, be sure that it is round.

The mirror is used in the admission rites for its sacred significance, much as it was used in the ancient Eleusinian Mysteries of Greece.

The mirror used by the Witches is always the silvered kind; the black type was used only by magicians, or by the Witches whom they protected during the Burning Times.

Sometimes it is good to have jewelry made with tiny mirrors on or in the piece; these are extremely protective. Polished silver jewelry can work well. Mirror jewelry "bounces back" evil and negativity; it should be washed every Full Moon in mugwort tea.

One form of protection against psychic attack is to visualize yourself wearing a coat of armor that is completely fashioned of mirrors; thus, no evil can reach you.

The Witch Balls of yesteryear were silvered globes, a combination of mirrors and crystal balls, and were hung in the windows or near the doors and chimney of the house to protect it and all its contents. Today these are hung on trees at Yuletide by people who have forgotten their

original significance. Witch Balls are sometimes available and are well worth the price. Always keep them clean and shiny.

You can put a small, round mirror on the altar to symbolize the Goddess, if you cannot find a suitable statue.

A mirror may be hung up in the corner of the room to absorb negativity; or it can be hung on the south wall. See it as a vacuum onto the vastness of space; command all negativity, evil vibrations, influences, or entities to be sucked into it out of your room. Also put a block so that they cannot use the mirror as a doorway into this world. This is an excellent means to use in haunted houses, when the spirits simply will not go, or to exorcise a person. Seat them before the mirror and command the spirit to go into the mirror and into space.

Afterward, cleanse the mirror with vinegar, rubbing cut onions on the glass, or with your hands.

But never do this operation with your own magic mirror; it is permissible to use any other mirror you have, though.

## Mirror Magic 1

Hang a small mirror in every corner of the attic (or highest point in the house) using red thread or cord, and say the following:

*Mirror with the power to protect  
I place thee so that thou may reflect  
All evil to which this house may be subject!*

Set twin white candles on both sides of the mirror, so that they will not be reflected. Sit or stand before it naked and say:

*Oracle of Lunar Light,  
Send me now the Second Sight.*

Now gaze into the mirror, into your reflection's eyes. Gradually you will see another reflection; it will be that of a former life. It should be unmistakably familiar.

Stand before the mirror. Set twin candles of the appropriate colors on either side, then anoint the mirror's rim with the appropriate oil,

Next, with the oil, draw a circle upon the mirror, making sure the ends meet. Now stare into the center of the circle, where your eyes should meet those of your reflection. Concentrate, not on the scene, but on your wish. Then draw the rune corresponding to your wish on the mirror, with your Power hand. Cover the mirror until the next morning. It is done.

## Mirror Magic 2

Stand before the mirror, by candlelight if possible. With lipstick or a grease pencil, or water soluble paint or ink, draw the runes of your desire onto the mirror. See them infused into your reflection, and know that such will be in your life. Then close your eyes and visualize your intent. It shall be done. Leave the markings on until the next morning, at which time you should wipe them off with a cloth, without looking at them.

## Other Mirror-type Spells

### The Sun and Glass Spell

Make an image or drawing of the evil influence or load a piece of paper with the thought. Direct the rays of the Sun with a mirror or through a burning-glass so that its power is concentrated upon the paper. As the paper burns, say:

*By Sun and Glass, and in the Gods' names,  
Thy power spent; thy form in flames,  
No more shall you bother me or mine;  
Begone! I charge you, in this sign.*

### To Divine with the Cauldron

On the night of the Full Moon, after the rites, take the cauldron to a place outside where you will not be disturbed. Bring also a coin of silver. Fill the cauldron with pure spring or lake water, then hold the coin up to the Moon, saying:

*Lady of Light*  
*Lady of Night*  
*Strengthen the Sight*  
*In this my rite.*

Then draw the power of the Moon into the coin, using your visualization. Now, toss the coin into the cauldron. As it settles on the bottom, sit or kneel comfortably before it and gaze at the coin. If necessary, position the cauldron so that the Moon shines upon the coin. The sight will come. (Note: this works best with black cauldrons.)

### **The Sacred Lake**

Lakes were once known as Diana's mirrors. On the night of the Full Moon, catch the reflection of the Moon on the still waters of a lake. Lie down and stare at the reflection, then blow gently on the water. The sight will come, if you pray to Diana to aid you.

### **To Improve the Appearance**

Take a small round mirror, of about nine inches in diameter, dip it into the crystal clear water of a lake, stream, or spring, and say:

*Clear as crystal,*  
*Clear as air,*  
*Make my form be*  
*Fine and fair.*

Then set up the mirror on the south wall at home. Every morning and evening stand before it and gaze into your reflection, concentrating on improving your appearance. So shall it be.

### **The Break-Glass Spell**

Fill a box or bowl with broken glass. Press the flat side of your hand down upon it all at once, with equal pressure. You will not be hurt. As your hand is pressing against the glass, say:

*Broken glass cannot hurt; All evil shall avert!*

This is a protective spell to be used when you fear physical harm.

### **The Break-Mirror Spell**

Set a small round mirror on the floor. Stand over it, holding a large rock. Do not stand so that you can see your image in the mirror, but look at the mirror's face and visualize your enemy, bad habit, problem, obstacle. Then drop the rock and watch the glass and your problem shatter into a million pieces.

Thus is the spell fixed.

### **To Destroy Another's Power to Do Harm**

Make wax models of the aggressor's weapons (guns, tanks, swords, words, books, newspapers, etc.). Color and mold these to look as close to the actual objects themselves. When finished, sit before a fire (if possible) and take each model in your hands. Rub it slowly with your hands, warming it, disfiguring it. Say:

*You are putty in my hands. You are powerless.*

Repeat until you feel the time is right. Then throw the ruined model into the fire in the midst of the flames, saying:

*You melt!*

Visualize your enemy's power to do harm melting into the fire. Repeat for each object. This works also with a censer, if you make small wax models and have a fire going in it. The cauldron also serves to contain the fire for this spell.

### **On Finding an Amulet, Talisman, Charm, or Poppet**

Do not touch. Scan. If it is evil, douse with rue oil, ignite, and with your palms held down over it, say:

*Thy power spent, thy form in flames,  
Be banished by the Great God's names!*

Or whatever comes to mind. If you cannot burn it where it lies, move with wooden or glass or plastic utensils (not gloves) to a suitable place and perform the banishing. If rue or any other hex-breaking oil is not available, sprinkle with salt and burn. Bury or toss out ashes. Do not touch them!

Cacti are often used to send curses and hexes. Be wary. Scan any gift or object that is placed on your doorstep, desk and so on before you touch it. Protect, don't neglect!

### **The Knife and the Cauldron**

Fill a cauldron (pot or bucket if you don't have a spare one) and place it just inside the door. Taking up a razor-sharp knife, place it point-down into the water, saying:

*Into the water I place this blade  
To guard against the thief and shade.  
May no man or astral shell  
Enter this place wherein I dwell.*

This is an excellent protection spell, to be performed every evening before going to bed, or any time you feel the need.

### **Protective Stones**

Take several small pebbles, of a different color than those on the ground surrounding your property, but not a hue that would stand out unduly. Take these pebbles, enough so that you have one for every square yard of your outdoor area, and put them on the floor before you. Hold your hands down over them and infuse them with protective qualities. Next, divide the pile into three parts. The middle part leave alone. The part on the left you will program to warn you of impending trespassers, to psychically tell you when someone is coming. The part on the right you

will infuse with frightening visions of ghosts and ghouls and scary things, imaginary monsters, to frighten away those of weak minds and emotional instability. Thusly, you shall mix all the pebbles and scatter them across your property, but you must not be seen doing this. Thus placed, they shall do their work.

### For Protection

Get a firm white or red onion, and a collection of black-headed pins, and take them before a fire or the altar. There, stick each pin into the onion, saying the following rhyme:

*I pierce thee, I pierce thee,  
That thou may'st protect me.*

Continue to do this until the surface of the onion is completely covered with the pins. Place high in the room you spend the most time in, or in the attic, or up the chimney. This spell should be renewed every year, but the onion must not be touched while it is being taken down.

### Protective Chant

Visualize a triple circle around your body and chant:

*I am protected by thy might  
O Gracious Goddess, day and night.*

### To Protect a Fireplace and Hearth

With white or red chalk, draw three circles directly before the fireplace on the hearth. This effectively guards the area. Renew every three months.

## To Spell a Stone for Protection

When you have found a suitable stone, one which pleases your eye and finds favor in your hands, hold it tightly in your Power hand and say the following thrice:

*Stone, evil you shall deny.  
Send it to the earth and sky.  
Send it to the flame and sea.  
Stone of power, protect me!*

## The Circle of Stones Necklet

Make a necklet of twelve stones, of the same shape and size, and then put a thirteenth in of a different color and size, a larger one. Hold it up within the Circle of Stones and say:

*O Circle of Stones, I ask that you infuse this amulet with your protection, a perfect pattern of protective energy, that it might protect my body, mind, and soul while I am outside the Circle of Stones. So said I, \_\_\_\_\_, and So Mote It Be!*

This may also be used for wear within the Circle by altering the dedication slightly. If used out of the Circle, mark no signs or runes on it. However, if reserved for ritual use such can be painted or carved on.

### THE CIRCLE OF STONES NECKLET

Make a necklet of twelve stones, of the same shape and size, and then put a thirteen in of a different color and size, a larger one. Hold it up within the Circle of Stones and say:

*O Circle of Stones, I ask that you infuse this amulet with your protection, a perfect pattern of protective energy, that it might protect my body, mind and soul while I am outside the Circle of Stones. So said I, \_\_\_\_\_, and So Mote It Be!*



This may also be used for wear within the circle by altering the dedication slightly. If used for out-of-circle wear, mark no signs or runes on it. However, if reserved for ritual use such can be painted or carved on.

## To Be Said for Protection During a Lightning Storm

Mistress of the gentle rain  
 Master of the storm,  
 Guard against the ill and bane;  
 Shield me from harm.  
 And while fire flies through the air  
 And rain drops fiercely blast,  
 Keep my loved ones in your care  
 Til the storm is passed.

Wind, Wind, guard thy kin  
 Flame, Flame do not maim  
 Rain, Rain, leave amain  
 Earth, Earth, guard my worth.

## The Candle Guardian

Place a lit candle in the window to guard your home while you are asleep. Be sure that it cannot tip over and that it will not crack the window glass or catch the curtains on fire; the offering or prayer candles in glass jars are perfect for this.

## For Protecting a Person

To protect any person while they are away from you, throw a handful of sand, or grain, or rice after them as they leave, without their knowledge.

## To Guard Your Food

3 needles  
 3 pins  
 3 nails

Put these into a jar of salt and keep in your cupboard to guard your food.

## To Be Said for Protection While Walking Alone at Night

Hail Fair Moon,  
Ruler of Night;  
Keep me safe  
Until the light!

## Witches' Bottle

Pins, black-headed  
Needles  
Rosemary

Fill a bottle with the above. Add red wine to fill. Seal top with black wax. As you make your Witches' Bottle say the incantation, over and over, as you add each ingredient:

*Pins and needles, rosemary, wine  
In this Witches Bottle of mine  
Guard from all harm and enmity:  
This is my will, so mote it be!*

This bottle should then be buried some distance from your home—off your property, preferably, but not too far. The bottle attracts negativity and ill-wishing away from you to itself.

## Water Divination

Ask a yes/no question. Throw a pebble into a pool of water and count the rings which it forms. If the ripples are of an odd number, it means yes. If even, the answer is no.

### Stone Divination

Find three stones, one dark, one light, and one of a unique color, different from the other two. Name one yes, one no, and use the strangely colored stone for the indicator. Ask a yes/no question. Shake the stones in your hands and throw them onto the ground or a table standing in the center of the room. The stone which is closest to the signifier answers the question. Keep the stones in a pouch out of the sight of others when not in use, and let no one else touch them. (Note: if using a table and one of the stones falls off, there is no answer. Similarly, if the yes/no stones seem to be the same distance from the indicator stone, there is no answer. Try again later. Do no more than three throws a night.)

### Bark Divination

Choose a broad and thin piece of bark. Put it into a bright fire and wait until it has caught. As soon as the flames have gone out, carefully remove it, without breaking it, and read the symbols made on the bark by the fire.

### Flower Divination

Choose a flower at random, but do not pick it. Count the petals, saying yes or no until you reach the last. This answers your question. (Do not pluck the petals off, as non-witches do. There is no need to destroy nature; we work within and for it, not against Nature.)

### Herb Incantation

*Oh little plant of (name), I ask that you give of your bounty that it may aid me in my work. Grow stronger by my stroke; stronger and more powerful, Oh little plant of (name)!*

Say this with love for the spirit of the plant. Take what you need, never more than 25 percent of the herb. Then place your offering (honey, an

old coin, bread, an apple, red wine) at the base of the plant. If at all possible, never pick from the same herb twice during the lunar year.

### Ancient Prayer to Herbs

"Now also I make intercession to you, all ye powers and herbs, and to your majesty: I beseech you, whom Earth the universal parent hath borne and given as a medicine of health to all peoples and hath put majesty upon, be ye now of the most benefit of humankind. This I pray and beseech you: be present here with your virtue, for she who created you hath herself undertaken that I may call you with the good will of him on whom the art of medicine was bestowed; therefore grant for health's sake good medicine, by grace of these powers aforesaid."

Used while preparing herbal mixtures for healing purposes. The "him" mentioned in this prayer was probably originally Aesculapius. This prayer is of Roman origin.

### Wealth Sachet

Mix together cinquefoil, cinnamon, cloves, lemon balm, and a tonka bean or vanilla bean, whole. Do this on a Thursday after the Sun has set and while the Moon is in her increase. Sew up into a small purple or blue cloth bag and carry to increase riches.

### Love Sachet

Take the petals of roses, well dried, a pinch of catnip, half a handful of yarrow, and a touch of mint, coltsfoot, strawberry leaves, orris root well-ground, tansy, and a bit of vervain. Mix well on a Friday evening in the Moon's increase, and divide into three parts. The first part throw up to the Moon while on bended knee, asking Diana that love be sent to you. The second part scatter around your bedchamber, and the third sew up into light green cloth. Wear this last upon your body, and love will surely appear.

## Spell Balls

Take beeswax, warm it in your hand until it is soft and very flexible. Now take herbs of the correct type and mix these into the wax, all the while visualizing your intent. When the wax is well mixed with the herbs, form the wax imbedded with the herbs into balls, about an inch or so in diameter (they can be bigger, depending on your purpose, but it's easier to hide smaller balls).

Now lay the spell ball on your altar between two candles of the appropriate colors, depending on the sort of spell you're doing. Place your hands on either side of the spell ball and infuse it with energy, all the while visualizing.

Say the following incantation:

*Cave, Mountain, Fire and Lake  
All the Elements now wake  
Charge this Spell Ball powerfully  
This is my will, so mote it be!*

If your intent is to gain money, put the spell balls wherever you might get money: in your desk at work, in your wallet or purse, in the mailbox; wherever. If it is a love-attracting spell, wear it close to your skin. Place where appropriate for your spell.

(Caution: spell balls can melt. Be careful! It's best to use these in the winter!) You can also string several spell balls into a necklace and wear this too.

## Uses of Baneful Herbs by Witches

In the past, when the Wicca were the healers of the people as well as the priesthood and priestesshood, many of the baneful herbs were used in practicing medicine. This knowledge was passed on by word of mouth, and was taught only the most eager and qualified pupil, by the most experienced herbal healer. These were the uses of these baneful herbs by the healers:

1. All healing aspects
2. Midwifery and abortions
3. Deadening pain (when removing arrowheads, etc.)

Herbs, especially the baneful kind, were also used as shortcuts to attain altered states of consciousness. They also came in handy when the magistrates and Witch-finders were about in the village or town. Here are these uses:

4. Inducing visions
5. Facilitating astral projection
6. Raising the power generally
7. Deadening pain during execution, especially during burning.

In light of this, an old Witch's tale should be told here. In Elizabethan times, Witches were taught that to be sure you would never be condemned to the scaffold (i.e., to be hanged), you should always carry a gilliflower with you. Gilliflower is another name for carnation. Why should this be? Perhaps because the carnation is an extremely powerful bloom; its scent is excellent for recuperating patients or those who have lost their will.

In the Burning Times, most of the Wicca were long gone from the towns and villages by the time the Witch-finders showed up, but the danger was always there. So it wouldn't surprise me at all to learn from a historical source that many suspected Witches in the 1600s wore gilliflowers, just in case!

### **Magical Baths**

It's tradition to take a Magical Cleansing Bath at two times of the year:

*Spring:* Take a cleansing bath of marjoram and thyme.

*Winter:* Take a cleansing bath of bay, rosemary, and pine.

Of course, these are in addition to your regular cleansing baths.

## Ritual Bath Salts

To one cup plain salt, add the appropriate oils until the scent seems right. The stronger the scent, the less salts will have to be used for each bath. Tint with food coloring.

### Healing

Eucalyptus	13 drops
Violet	7 drops (tint greenish blue)
Carnation	13 drops

### Purification

Rose Geranium	13 drops
Frankincense	7 drops (leave white)
Rosemary	13 drops

### Circle (to be used when a bath sachet is not available)

Rosemary	3 drops
Myrrh	3 drops
Carnation	3 drops (tint purple or leave white)
Lotus	3 drops
Mint	1 drops

### Psychic (to be used before sleep for prophetic dreams)

Cassia	13 drops
Anise	7 drops (tint yellow)
Acacia	13 drops

### Magnetic (to be used prior to going out with the purpose of meeting people)

#### Women's Magnetic Bath:

Ambergris	3
Gardenia	7
Jasmine	9 (tint pink—love)
Tuberose	7 blue—friendships
Violet	3 red—sexuality)

*Men's Magnetic Bath:*

Musk	3	
Patchouli	7	
Civet	9	(tint pink—love
Ambergris	7	blue—friendships
Cinnamon	3	red—sexuality)

Note: or add thirty drops of Venus oil [women] or Satyr oil [men]. Use this bath salt sparingly.

## Druid's Fire

Ash logs  
Elder logs  
Vervain

Make a fire of these, using the vervain as the kindling. When it is burning well, add the following herbs:

Aster flowers  
Meadowsweet  
Mistletoe  
Peppermint  
Oak leaves  
Betony

Use this fire for solar rituals.

## The Old Dances and Music

Dancing was the first form of religious expression. It is not surprising, therefore, to learn that it was once a large part of Wiccan ritual.

In Traditionalist Wicca there were three main types of ritual dance: the Circle or Ring Dance, the Following Dance, and the Leaping Dance.

The Ring or Circle Dance began with the coven holding hands in the Circle, facing in. Sometimes in the center, on the altar (or on the ground if there was no altar) was a symbol, drawn on the ground, or an object,

representing the thing that was desired (i.e., the reason the coven was working magic). This is known as the "object." The coven moved around the object with the intent of giving their wish power, and so through their physical effort the power was raised and sent through the group will of the coven.

This technique was also used for charging tools, jewelry, and so on.

An alternate type of Ring Dance had the coven leader standing in the center of the Circle, and when the power was raised to its maximum the leader told the coven to drop. The leader then sent forth the power.

If the dance was done for purely ritualistic purposes, it was usually accompanied by songs, sometimes calling upon the elements, or the gods, or just a simple seasonal song. These dances were always done deosil. Of course, if the Ring Dance was being done to banish a negative, it would be performed widdershins.

The Following Dance usually took place after the Ring Dance, if the former was done for ritual and not magic. The Circle broke off, the leader at the head. Releasing hands, the coven followed the leader across the countryside (or throughout the house, if it was a large one and the danger too great for outdoor activities). This was sometimes accompanied by all imitating animals, but this wasn't always the case. At its end, of course, the coven returned to the Circle, usually for the Feast. This type of dance usually occurred after the rituals, and was also used to train new Witches to move silently through the forest at night.

The Leaping Dance is really a variation on the Ring Dance. The coven, hands joined, leap over an object for various purposes. For instance, a stack of fruits and vegetables would be placed on the ground and all would leap over them to promote a good crop for the next harvest. Sometimes this was done with brooms, but this belongs to the feminine magic. It is said to be the origin of the Witch riding her broomstick.

The Leaping Dance was also done over sacred (small) stones, or cleansing fires. I also have a feeling that this might have been one of the old ordeals started during the Burning Times. The new Witch was laid down in the forest, alone, in the darkness, probably bound. Suddenly images passed over her; the coven ran and leapt over her. They continued this,

one by one, for several minutes until the witch's fright and anxiety were gone. She had found trust in the coven, and was welcomed in.

Music was often used, especially before the Burning Times, to accompany the ritual and/or the dances. The music was traditionally made by a flute, a drum, and a harp of some kind, though often I feel just the drum was used for its ability to keep the coven moving as one through its beat. This beat was gradually increased in tempo while energy was raised, and set the emotional tone of the whole ritual.

The flute was always played by a man, for it was a symbol of the God; the drum by a woman, for it was a symbol of the Goddess; and the harp by a youth.

For more elaborate musical compositions, bells were added, though rarely after the Burning Times, as their voices could be heard through the night air clearly at a great distance.

A sistrum was sometimes also used in place of the bells, but this was only after the Cult of Isis reached Britain through the Romans.

Many of the old songs of the Craft have been lost; some are preserved in folk songs, such as "Greensleeves" and "Summer is A-Coming In." A study of folk music will reveal much. Most of the old Craft songs were in minor keys and fairly simple of tune and harmony and wording; but they were echoed throughout the land and were one of the main ways the Wicca had to preserve and pass on their lore.

Thus, the words or lyrics often contained stories of the gods, their deeds, and relations.

Today, unfortunately, most music is pre-recorded, though many covens are going back to the old ways.

A song we used to use around 1971 ran like this:

*Diana and the Horned God  
Will appear at Sabbat Time.  
And lead us forth right pleasantly  
To sup the Cakes and Wine;  
To sup the Cakes and Wine my loves  
And dance the magic round;  
And lead us through the sacred rites  
With joy and love unbound.*

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You will notice that the order of the ritual as described in this song is backward.

Originally, I'm sure, hand clapping or stomping of the feet or even banging on the cauldron was probably used as music. Drums were then invented to take care of that part.

In magical Wiccan symbolism the drum represents the element of Earth; the flute of Air; the lyre or harp of Fire; and the bell or sistrum of Water.

I have heard of rites wherein the athame is used to strike standing stones; this would produce tones of a sort, but was probably used for inducing clairvoyance or some other faculty, so this doesn't really fall under the heading of music.

## The Story of the Sky People

In the time before time, in the vast reaches of the outer spaces, there existed a civilization on a planet much like Earth.

But this people were engaged in great civil war. In foreseeing their own destruction, the People of the Stars sent representatives of their race through space in silver needles, in search of new planets where their race might plant its seeds so that their knowledge and power would not be allowed to melt into the ground into nothingness.

One of the silver needles touched down upon the earth. The Sky People or Sky Lords mingled with Earth People, bred, and in so doing produced new priests and priestesses of the old powers. And from these people there arose the great technological/magical civilization known as Atlantis.

Mankind was taught the old secrets of tapping the forces of the universe; bending lines of energy; moving physical objects with their minds; seeing into the past, or future, or other's minds; healing the sick; calming wars and strife; as well as moving mountains, changing the courses of rivers, raising islands from the sea floor, activating volcanoes, and controlling the weather.

But for all their technological/magical achievements, the Atlanteans had a weakness—a weakness which those who had been the Sky People's adversaries were eager to capitalize on.

For the Sky People's enemies had followed the ships through space, determined to stamp out every trace of their very existence. So long as one outpost existed, these beings would not rest.

They came to Earth, found the work that the Atlanteans had accomplished, and knew that they could not bring about its destruction wholly by themselves, for they were few in number, the civil wars leaving few survivors and many dead on both sides.

Those beings plotted and influenced several of the key priestesses and priests in Atlantis. And in time this brought about its destruction.

But the blood of the Sky People lives on in our own; and the powers which they used lie in waiting to be tapped by those with the old knowledge.

And it is this power which is used in magic.

(Note: this is a legend and should be viewed as such.)

### **A Full Moon Ceremony**

To a bath, add half cup of milk, three drops white wine, a bit of lemon rind to the water. Bathe and go to the rite.

Take sip of white wine. Close your eyes and meditate upon the Moon. See it rising above the horizon, travelling upward to rest directly above you. Bathe in the light; feel it cleansing and nurturing and strengthening you. Then get up, look at the real Moon and call your thanks to it. Light a white candle and let it burn while you are up that night. Eat grapes or mooncakes and white wine, melons or lettuce and lemonade. If there is a ring around the Moon, so much the better; her powers are tripled then.

Afterward, listen to soft music and meditate.

(Note: This ceremony should be used when you cannot attend a full meeting. It is also good to give to new students who cannot or should not attend the full rituals.)

*Systems  
of Power*

The elemental system was devised and refined in the Renaissance, but its roots stretch farther back into history. It can be viewed as nothing more than a convenient system of organization for the various types of magic. Then again, it may be viewed as a very real system of powers that can be called upon to aid spells and rituals. How you view the elements is up to you.


The following discussions deal with the symbolism of and types of magic related to the elements. All of the magic contained within this book falls under the rulership of one (or more) of the elements. This is true, too, of all that exists.

An understanding of the elements will aid your magical work immensely.

Though the elements are described as "masculine" or "feminine," this should not be viewed in a sexist way. This, like all magical systems, is symbolic—it describes the basic attributes of the elements in terms easily understandable. It doesn't mean that it is more masculine to perform Fire magic, or more appropriate for women to use Water magic. It's simply a system of symbols.

Earth is the *base* of the Witch; it is this sphere in which we operate the most. Earth is also the realm of fertility and so this power is invoked to cause fruition of all magical operations.

Earth is the element of silent abundance, of foundation. It is physical, but should be lauded because it supports all the other elements; without Earth, life as we know it would not exist.

Magic of this realm is of the fruits: herbs, flowers, trees, and all growing things. The ancient gods and goddesses of the Earth—Demeter, Mah, Persephone, Kore, Ceres, Marduk, Gaea, Rhea, Dagda, Silvanus, Pan, and Osiris, among many others, represent the continuing life-force of the element of Earth.

Earth is the womb of the Goddess and the ancients buried their dead within her, laying them in a fetal position and dusting them with red powders representing the blood of renewed life. As we proceed from the Goddess, so we must return to her, on the Wheel of Reincarnation and through the Earth.

Offerings and invocations to the Earth realm should be buried.

It is also the realm of sexuality, and passions of every nature.

Fire is the one element always present on the Witch's altar, for it symbolizes the "spark of life" that resides within all humanity.

We should be wary of Fire; its touch burns, and by it we learn. Change never occurs without a death, however great or small it may be. The past must die to make way for the future.

The Fire-nature of man is the most seen—anger, spite, hostility, and in such good manifestations as industriousness, will to live, action. Unfortunately, Fire blinds us, so that these qualities take precedence, and action is accomplished without intellect; destruction without compassion; hatred without foundation.

Fire quickly spreads, but only as long as fuel exists. It must be first tempered with *Water*, to cool its flames, and be fed *Air*, to show the error of its ways.

The Sacred Fire, or sexual passion, is a gift residing within. All should enjoy and use this gift. However, when the Fire flares up into an inferno and runs a person's life, there is an imbalance and action must be taken.

Fire can have one of the strongest influences of the elements, and its scars last, but the flames can be quickly killed by immersing yourself in *Water* consciousness.

The Fire gods and goddesses include Vesta, Hestia, Vulcan, Pele, Brigit, and Horus.

Offerings to Fire should be burned in a very hot fire.

Water is the element of love, of absorption, of fertility. It is traditionally thought of as feminine, as Fire is masculine. The subconscious is symbolized by this element; rolling, always moving, germinating, like the sea which rests not day or night. The conscious mind is symbolized by Air.

The great flood so fabled today was a manifestation of the cleansing power of Water. Thus, Water is symbolic of purity, and is employed in baptismal rites the world over.

Water is cool, but never cold; comforting and gently moving. It is all around us; rain is cleansing, not only to physical objects, but also to the vibrations raised in those places inhabited by humans.

Bathing is a meeting of Water and mankind; it should be slow, drowsing, and dreamy. Never force Water to cause something to happen; it must be gently persuaded, and once you have dropped a wish into the pool of Water it will send out its rings and will come to fruition if the tides and streams be just and good. And if the wish be just and good.

# *Rune Magic*

**R**unes are symbols that, when drawn, painted, traced, carved, or visualized, release specific energies. As such, rune magic is surprisingly easy to practice and is undergoing a renaissance today.

In earlier times, runes were scratched onto birch bark, bone, or wood. They were carved onto weapons to ensure accurate shots, engraved on cups and goblets to ward off poisoning, and marked on goods and the home for protective purposes.

But much confusion surrounds these figures. Some feel that runes themselves contain hidden powers. The same is also said of the pentagram and other magical symbols. The thought here is that, simply by drawing a rune, the magician unleashes supernatural powers.

This isn't the case. Runes are tools of magic. *Their potency lies within their user.* If my neighbor happened to doodle a healing rune on a napkin and later used this to wipe his forehead, no healing energy would be transferred to him simply because he didn't put any into the rune.

Runes must be used with power to be magically effective. Carve, paint, or trace away—with visualization and with personal energy.

The ways to use runes are limited only by your imagination. For example, if a friend had asked me to speed her recovery from an illness, I might draw a healing rune on a plain piece of paper and sit before it.

While concentrating on the rune, I'd visualize my friend in a healed, whole state. Then, after building up personal power, I'd send the energy to her *in the shape of the rune.* I'd see it meshing with her body, unblocking, soothing, healing.

Or, I could carve the rune on a piece of cedar wood, again visualizing perfect health, and give it to her to wear.

Runes can also be fashioned onto food—with power—and then eaten to bring that specific energy back into the body; marked on the person with oil and visualization; carved onto a candle that is then burned to release its energies; or traced or visualized in a pond or bathtub prior to entering it.

To draw runes on paper, specific ink colors related to each of the runes presented here can be found in their descriptions below, and can be utilized, if you wish. The colors work in harmony with the runes.






Symbols are an important part of many Wiccan traditions. They're used as magical shorthand in the Book of Shadows; as a graphic representation of Wicca or a specific Wiccan tradition (on correspondence, perhaps); and to empower magical tools and jewelry.

The first ritual symbols used in Wicca stemmed largely from ceremonial magic (particularly those found in *The Key of Solomon*; see bibliography) and alchemy. Their number soon increased and became more specifically Wiccan, such as symbols for levels of initiation, the Circle, the Goddess, and the God. Traditions shared symbols among their adherents. They began to be published, further widening their usage.


Your tradition should probably utilize some symbols. Symbols (which are, in a sense, a compact alphabet) trigger powerful psychological responses, if their observer is aware of their meanings, because they speak to the subconscious mind.

You can create your own symbols or choose ones from those lists given below. I have only one warning: never use an unfamiliar symbol. If you don't know a symbol's meaning, it's best not to utilize it in any way.

## APPENDIX I

### *de Traci Regula*

In late 2008, Bill Krause called me from Llewellyn, asking if there were any materials from Scott that might make a good book. After all these years, Scott's works were still finding new audiences and there was an appetite for more of his works for a new generation of the magically inclined.

There were several things that came to my mind, but they evaded me in the many boxes, bookcases, and outdated file formats of the archives. My search was not as thorough as it could have been, mainly because confronting the loss of Scott is still something that is very painful for me to do. Bill was persistent in his requests, but it seemed like this project was coming to a halt.

Then, one evening, looking at the cover of "Whispers of the Moon" where I have it facing out on a shelf in a glassed-in lawyer's bookcase because the photo of Scott on the cover is my favorite, I realized that, years before, I had placed several notebooks and envelopes of Scott's materials on the same shelf behind it. It was all waiting inches away from where I do my own work, yet I had forgotten until that moment that I had it there. I lifted up the glass door and slid it back, and I reached at random for a tightly-packed manila envelope. On it, in the hand that I knew so well, was "The American Traditionalist Book of Shadows," adorned with a pentagram and the comment that this was the manuscript to be used for copying to send to his students. It was the core of Scott's correspondence course, which he had offered to students before his books were published—arguably the book of magic of a young wizard, drawn from his earliest experiences—the sort of thing you might expect a just-maturing Harry Potter to have created for his extracurricular classes in advanced magic for his peers. He was ardent in his belief that Wicca needed an American expression. He felt that the largely British-dominated magical scene was due for a shaking-up, one that embraced the seemingly more American qualities of equality, independence, and a less restrictive hierarchy—a Book of Shadows that emphasized a greener, more natural magic that could be practiced in a simple and sacred way by virtually anyone.

As I looked at the manuscript, I saw all of this as if through water, my vision blurred by tears catching in my eyelashes. The other works in various stages of completion that I had thought Bill might want to consider were very different from this, a complete, basic magical system which Scott had pored over with his usual obsessive care for detail and which drew directly from Scott's personal experiences of what was necessary for the young Wiccan to know. And, outside of a few friends and the students he had taken on in those brief years before his own success as an author made it very difficult for him to find the time to teach individually, it had never been seen by anyone. Some of it he had used as a jumping-off point for sections of *Wicca: A Guide for the Solitary Practitioner*, but by then he was refining his work for a much larger intended audience and taking into consideration the multiple demands of editors and various publishing needs. This document is pure from the source, just what he wanted and needed to say to the young mages of both sexes who sought him out for guidance and instruction.

May you use it wisely and well, with love for the divine, for the green earth, and for each other. As Scott would say at the end of his letters, bright blessings.

Earlier in the day, I had been a guest on a local television show, and Scott had chosen to come with me. At that time Scott kept his metaphysical interests quite close to his chest, choosing to stay in the background whenever possible. Nevertheless, he often accompanied me on various personal appearances, and it was always a comfort to know that he was somewhere in the crowd lending his support.

However, today was our Hallows celebration, and Scott and I were on a quest. We were attempting to find an open liquor store to buy several large bottles of high-proof alcohol. I had decided to present the game of "Snap Dragon" at our event, and that required special supplies. This fire tradition was extremely popular many years ago, and was a yearly custom until it sadly started to die out, and was now almost forgotten. Scott and I were eager to revive the old practice, and bring it back to life.

Arriving home, we took a large plate and carefully covered it with raisins. Next we slowly poured the alcohol over the top, being careful to saturate each and every fruit. Then with a long match we lit the platter on fire. Suddenly, the entire room was cast in a warm glow from the flaming light; we had begun the spirited game of Snap Dragon.

Abruptly, we realized that this was not a challenge for the faint-hearted. The goal of Snap Dragon is to "snap" the fiery raisins out of the

inferno and into your mouth without getting burned! Dubiously, we looked at each other, and then eyed the hot blaze before us; nonetheless, Scott and I were determined. We squared our shoulders, took a deep breath, and with faces askew, we crooked our fingers above the burning flames.

As our arms wildly flailed about in an attempt to pop the wayward "Dragons" harmlessly between our lips, the spectacle of each other gyrating, cavorting, and hopping around the table caused us both to dissolve into uncontrollable fits of laughter. ## APPENDIX III

Scott was always a giver. Of Chet and Rosie Cunningham's three kids, Scott was the most thoughtful, the least self-oriented, typical of a middle child.

Scott was also the creative one. The sensitive one. The only one who kept up with the piano lessons, the only one to sing in the church choir with Mom. One of my strongest, earliest memories of Scott was when he recreated parts of *Pirates of the Caribbean* in our back yard, with a pirate's chest of gold and a mound of jewels, inspired by our first trip to Disneyland. I must have been four at the time, and thought he was magical. Scott also collected rocks and seashells. My dad built a cabinet for him with a dozen or so flat drawers, to keep the shells in. He loved the ocean and the forests with equal fervor.

My parents owned a cabin in the Laguna Mountains, and summers would find us there, where we would grow dusty and brown in the sun. The three of us kids would hunt for frogs and tiny fishes in the marshes, unaware of how far we'd rambled. Scott always knew the way back, and he always picked flowers for Mom.

We reveled in summer thunderstorms, hanging out on our army cots on the sleeping porch, the screened windows open to the elements. Summer nights were filled with so many stars the sky looked crowded. Tall Jeffrey pine trees stood silhouetted against the night sky, perfuming the air with vanilla. Going to the mountains was our family escape—we all took on other personas there. Scott spent hours studying the rocks and flowers, the trees, searching for arrowheads and other signs of Native Americans, immersing himself in the place. All of us sank into our own private worlds, seemingly so much closer up there in the mountains than down at home. And yet, we remained a family unit—playing card games and board games, doing puzzles at one of the many kitchen tables in the rustic, octagonal main structure of the cabin, building a fire and sipping cocoa.

Scott must have been fourteen or fifteen when he started putting together Christmas stockings for my parents. It surprised me—parents

getting stockings—but he did it with such whimsy and charm. One of his gifts was seeing into people, divining what they would appreciate. He was an excellent gift giver. Once he realized the Anthurium was my mother's favorite flower, that's part of what he'd give her for Mother's Day and her birthday. Christmas, too. In hindsight, his thoughtfulness and protectiveness of my mother was very sweet.

The year I turned sixteen, for my birthday, Scott bought the two of us tickets to see *A Chorus Line* in Los Angeles. He drove us up and we so enjoyed bouncing around Hollywood (seedier in the seventies than it is now). He even took me to Capezio's, so I could get a couple pairs of pointe shoes. And the show? Outstanding. Mesmerizing. Absolutely breathtaking, and such a joy to share it with him. The ride home was filled with our chatter about the dancing and the songs.

Scott and I moved out of the family home the month I graduated high school, in January of 1978. We shared an apartment on Orange Avenue for eight or nine months. Newly in love, I was rarely there and when I was, Scott wasn't. We drifted apart as only roommates on separate schedules can drift.

When I married and moved to Los Angeles, Scott remained a part of my life. Phone calls, letters the old-fashioned way, and visits. For him, success. Book sales came, and then the book tours. In between times he'd retreat to Hawaii to recuperate and research. When I had a good job, I'd drop him a check in the mail—surely his writing couldn't be paying the bills—and he'd always call with a thank you. Visits home were fun—Scott and my husband Tom would trade quips and jokes that flew way over my parents' heads. I might catch the double entendre once out of a dozen times, and would finally give up and just watch them enjoy each other.

Then March of 1990 hit, and news of Scott's illness passed along from his tour of the East Coast. We found out just as I celebrated being three months' pregnant with my first son. My pregnancy became a joy to focus on, in those first months of uncertainty.

The terrifying turned into the mundane. Scott grew stronger again and wrote and traveled. We talked and laughed and grew closer than we

had been. The baby was born and Scott kept a respectful distance, not quite sure what to do with such a little thing.

But the disease stole him away. He grew weaker, and angry at not having the time to finish everything he'd wanted to do. Before he finally moved home so my parents could take care of him, he invited friends over, and gave away many of his books and things to people he knew would want or need them, sharing that last bit of himself that he could. He moved into my childhood room, his big iron bedstead taking up most of the tiny space, around Thanksgiving in 1992. And when he died in March of 1993, he'd fallen into a coma early in the morning. My mother held his hand, was there at his side when he finally passed that afternoon.

I was once again three months' pregnant, this time with my second son. I missed the pagan gathering for him in San Diego—my parents didn't tell me about it. There wasn't another memorial ceremony, not one that the family had planned. So it was just the family scattering his ashes up in the hills behind the cabin in the Laguna Mountains. Fourteen years later, that seemed the appropriate place to scatter my mom's ashes as well.

My private grief and regret over the lack of a more public memorial service, to this day, still hits me hard. It didn't seem right or fair, but I wasn't in charge. I spent several afternoons, over the next few months, sitting on the sand and staring out over the ocean. Sometimes weeping, sometimes angry, but always in dialog with Scott. I'd hear his laughter in the wind and the waves, and the Scott I was communing with, the Scott I missed, was the brother from my childhood, from those drowsy summer afternoons in the meadow, over the hill, and around the mountain from the cabin.

Finally, though, I started reading. I must confess, I'd never read his books until after he died. He never really expected me to be interested, I suppose. And in reading those books, I saw and grew to know the man he'd become, a deeper version of who he'd been when we were in the mountains as kids. The same, only—more. My creative, sensitive brother had grown to be funnier. Smarter. Stronger. More compassionate, more tangible, more open, even while guarding his privacy. His heart and soul

are in those books, a clear expression of his driving need to share what had taken him so much effort to learn. It shouldn't be that hard, he'd once told me. To find a different way to worship—and such a natural way—well, for those who want to, learning it shouldn't be such a difficult task.

Scott has always been good at giving. The sharing of his knowledge with the rest of us is his ultimate gift.

## APPENDIX IV

David Harrington

Scott had so much responsibility for his work that every once in a while, to relieve the stress and tension of work, he would do a project just for fun. He had never lost his childlike joy in games and toys, and he would employ his considerable creative powers in creating new entertainments. His love of fantasy was intense; he lived in it and it would come through in myriad ways, and one of these was the Witch Game. While this might be considered politically incorrect in these days of "Wicca," it didn't feel that way then—instead it was a way of reclaiming the pejorative term of "Witch."

One day he brought it over, presenting it with great ceremony. And I asked him what it was, and he said "It's my Flying Witch game."

I went, "Where did you get it?"

"I made it."

We put the game down on the floor and opened it up, and I was surprised at the ornateness of it. He had put a lot of time into placing the pictures on the box, so it resembled other board games popular at the time. He had created the full board, the game box, and all of the game pieces. He made the witches using the caps from wide-tipped markers, gluing them on top. I was amazed. "How cool!" He laid it out to work on it, since it was a work in progress, and so we would play it constantly to work out the rules and order of play and to see how it would flow. He wanted to put the game on the market and he was very proud of it. Since I'm childish too, or childlike, I enjoyed it because it was something different. I knew that whatever Scott created would be something fun, and it was. And through this, he also trained me. He would talk to me about all the things he had on the board and how they related to witchcraft, because I was still a student, and this was a great way to teach me, but also in an entertaining way, as we moved our markers around the labyrinthine turns of the game's path. He never *taught* me—he would start talking, and I would listen, and that's how I learned. The game was about a flying and thus "traveling" witch and somehow, playing it helped us think of places we wanted to go for our own magical journeys.

We explored natural magic, deciding to go into the wild and study from nature, like the old ones did, rather than from books in living rooms. We got on well because I was the first one to willingly go out with him into the wild, hiking in Borrego Springs to dig fossils, or going to Hagstone Cove to find mermaid tears, or driving to the old mission of Santa Ysabel to experience the local Mexican folk rituals of the Day of the Dead.

The “Witch Game” was very “Harry Potter”-like. When I saw the Harry Potter movies, they reminded me of the Witch Game, particularly the Marauder’s Map and some of the other magical objects. I think there is a resemblance to Scott in Harry Potter—his innocence, above all; even though he could be sharp and cutting, he always meant well. They share the same essential goodness. From my perspective, he was a leader of the groups he was in and nobody could top him, as far as I could see. He took charge like Harry Potter—not too willingly, or with a lot of ego, but simply because there were things that needed to be done and he knew how to do them, or could figure it all out. He was just so bright—and I think his precocity and warmth shines through in this early book of shadows.
